

Over 5,000 AIDS activists circle White House

Washington — Approximately 5,000 AIDS activists encircled he White House with red ribbons Oct. 12, for the first time not so much making a demand for leadership on AIDS from President Bush, as waving him goodbye.

The thousands of activists converged on the Ellipse behind the White House as the culmination of a weekend of grief, pain and hope surrounding the fourth full display of the Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt in Washington.

Chanting rounds of, "Three more weeks. Three more weeks," the demonstrators mocked the president's low standing in the polls as they denounced his AIDS policies.

But for all the anger directed at President Bush, the crowd's message also appeared to a warning at a possible future President Clinton.

"We need to send a message to the future occupant of the White House that there will be no business as usual on AIDS," said Margaret Cantrell of ACT UP/D.C., "Red ribbons are not enough. We're tired of symbolism. We're tired of empty gestures. We need some real leadership and some real action from the President of the United States."

Thousands of chanting demonstrators, ranging from heterosexual couples with small children and senior citizens in wheelchairs to the more usual collection of young Gay men and Lesbians, marched around the Treasury Department, the White House and the Old Executive Office Building making a human chain over a mile long.

As they marched and cheered Bush's predicted political defeat, the demonstrators blew whistles and air horns every seven minutes to commemorate the estimated one AIDS death which takes place every seven minutes in this country.

"My gut feeling is that this is the last demonstration we're going to do during the Bush Administration cause Bush is outa here," said Michael Petrilis of ACT UP/D.C., the leading organizer of the action. "This is our last call to bash Bush."

Eventually, as the hundreds of demonstrators filed past the gates of the White House, the front of the line made its way back around the block, completing the circle of red ribbon which ringed the federal buildings.

After the 5,000 activists completed their circle around the White House, they again gathered on the Ellipse where they staged a mass die-in, covering a large chunk of the 13 acres of grass with human bodies.

"We die, Bush does nothing," came up the voices from the ground as a lonely siren wailed from a bullhorn.

FIRST DEBATE

Several of the activists were particularly annoyed at Bush's comments during the Oct. 11 presidential debate, where he dismissed AIDS demonstrators and a massive candlelight vigil commemorating the quilt appearance two days earlier as work of "the extremes."

They were especially taken aback by the President's repetition of his charge that "\$4.6 billion" is being spent on AIDS, a figure Bush again suggested was far higher than that spent for cancer treatment research.

"That's a very misleading number," said Carlton Lee, a staffer with the National Commission on AIDS, noting that the oft-cited figure counts not only specific line-items for AIDS spending, but many fuzzy estimates on total Medicare, Medicaid and Veterans Affairs entitlement spending for AIDS patients. No such accounting has ever been suggested for other diseases, he noted, and if it were done it would far outstretch AIDS spending.



Gov. Clinton's response to Bush's comments, likewise, did not earn rave reviews in the crowd that was splattered with Clinton/Gore t-shirts and buttons.

"Bush lied through his teeth," said ACT UP/D.C.'s Cantrell. "Clinton gave us a lot of pretty rhetoric. But whether he lives up to his promises, we'll have to wait and see."

Asked how AIDS activists could counter Bush's alleged mischaracterization of the government's AIDS funding, Lee quipped offhandedly, "I was hoping Clinton would do it last night," but took care to note that after the debate, the Clinton campaign did issue a statement pointing out Bush's tactic.

Lee noted that AIDS activists are now taking pains to educate "the people who need to know" in the Clinton campaign in hopes that the Democratic nominee will counter Bush in person the next time he cites the allegedly misleading AIDS spending figure.

Lee was equally damning of the President's statement about HIVinfected basketball star Magic Johnson, who resigned from the National Commission on AIDS citing Bush's alleged disinterest in the epidemic.

During the debate, Bush suggested that Johnson took little interest in the commission himself, only attending one meeting before resigning. In fact, of the six commission meetings held during his tenure, Johnson personally attended two and sent the head of his foundation to the remaining four as his representative.

"I would also point out," Lee added, "that Magic, having attended two meetings, has attended twice as many as the President's own Secretary of Health and Human Services, Dr. Louis Sullivan, who has attended one meeting of the commission during his three years as a member."

Should a Clinton Administration replace Bush's, some activists noted, the pressure would be eased on activists who have spent much of the last ten years attacking the executive branch for inaction on AIDS. With Congress cutting AIDS spending from the President's already meager increases, they suggested, their anger could soon turn to the other end of Pennsulvania Avenue.

Clinton easily wins Gay/Lesbian poll

Chicago — Bill Clinton is the overwhelming favorite of Gay and Lesbian voters nationwide, preferred by 92.2% of those registered and intending to vote in November, compared to 3.2% for George Bush, 1.1% for Ross Perot, 2.5% for other candidates, and 1.0% undecided. The results are based on a poll conducted by Overlooked Opinions, Inc., the nation's only market and opinion research firm specializing in research on the Gay and Lesbian community.

A large turnout of Gay and Lesbian voters is expected in November: the poll shows that 95.3% Gay and Lesbian citizens 18 and above are registered and intend to vote, representing approximately 17million votes.

Support for Clinton is strong even among Gay men and Lesbians who are Republicans: 63.9% of Gay and Lesbian

Republicans plan to vote for Clinton; only 25.8% of Gay and Lesbian Republicans plan to vote for Bush.

Bush's support among Gay and Lesbian voters overall has ended. In 1988, 18% Gay and Lesbian voters reported voting for Bush, while this year only 3.2% plan to vote for him.

The Republican party has suffered a loss of Gay and Lesbian support as well. In 1991, 11.0% Gay and Lesbian people considered themselves Republicans. Currently, only 6.9% do — a loss of 37%. Among those people who were Republicans last year 18% have become Democrats and 12% now report no political affiliation. In comparison the Democratic party has enjoyed increased support among Gay and Lesbian voters, from 63.6% in 1991 to 69.4% currently.

The poll results are based on a national statistical sample, projectable to the national Gay and Lesbian community, of 3,000 Gay and Lesbian persons. The poll was conducted in the last half of September, 1992, by mail, and had a 75% response rate. The sample error is +/-1.7% at the 95% confidence level.

A smaller national sample of 300 Gay and Lesbian persons was contacted by telephone on October 2 and October 3, 1992, shortly after Ross Perot re-announced his candidacy. The survey showed that over 88% of those contacted were aware of Perot's candidacy, but that no statistically significant shifts had occurred in the results of the September, 1992, poll.

Congress passes \$2.1 billion AIDS budget

Washington — Congress on Oct. 3 approved a record \$2.1 billion in spending for federal AIDS programs in the coming fiscal year. While the dollar amount keeps the fight against the epidemic far behind were it needs to be, AIDS lobbyists say, the amount is as much as could be expected in this tight fiscal year.

"This is just indicative of how difficult this year was," said Jeff Levi, head lobbyist for the Washington-based AIDS Action Council. "We did reasonably well."

Final AIDS dollar amounts in the Labor

Health and Human Services money bill came to approximately \$2.09 billion for the 1993 fiscal year. An additional \$100 million for housing programs for people with AIDS was included in a separate funding measure.

The final AIDS dollar figures mark a \$130 million increase in AIDS spending over the previous year's funding levels. While that marks a considerable dollar increase — compared to spending increases for other diseases — the percentage increase again marks what amounts to funding equal to 1992 levels.







Among the most closely watched programs in the spending bill are those administered through the Ryan White CARE Act, which channels federal funds for AIDS care to cities and states disproportionately affected by the epidemic. This year Ryan White programs saw an increase of approximately \$72,000 dollars over present spending levels, most of which will go to bring new areas into the program as they qualify for assistance.

These increases now bring total spending for all Ryan White programs to \$348.19 million, still far short of the amount authorized for the first year of the program's existence in this, its third year.

Particularly distressing to AIDS lobbyists was the \$115.39 million in aid to states approved in the bill, which they saw as far sort of what is needed to face the epidemic in many hard-hit rural and suburban areas.

Cuts made last year to the AIDS prevention and education efforts of the Centers for Disease Control were partially restored in the 1993 bill, allowing for \$500.54 million or that agency's AIDS efforts.

While still not completely restored, the \$5 million cut from the CDC last year was seen as severely hampering community based AIDS prevention efforts, particularly in minority communities.

Funding for HIV research at the National Institutes of Health, estimated to come to \$877.37 million in this year's bill, is actually somewhat unclear, as for the fifth year AIDS spending is not specifically earmarked in the legislation. This figure does not include AIDS related spending for several sub-agencies formerly under the control of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration, which are now under the NIH umbrella.

AIDS research at NIH — considered at great risk at the beginning of this year's budget process — did rather well, while still falling short of what scientists dealing with AIDS said would be needed for fiscal 1993. Final spending for AIDS research came in at slightly over \$4 million over President Bush's funding request, but \$36 million over 1992 funding.

The AIDS activities of the Food and Drug Administration saw only a minor increase, coming in at \$75 million, roughly equivalent to what they requested.

The major victory on AIDS funding this year, however, came in a separate bill where \$100 million was approved for federal housing programs for people with AIDS, marking a doubling of funding for that effort.

The housing programs, realized by a 1990 omnibus measure, are just his month being funded for the first time.






National News Briefs...

ACTIVIST ACQUITTED OF DISPENSING AIDS DRUGS

Orlando, FL - A Florida jury has acquitted Alfredo Martinez-Garcia of charges that he illegally dispensed codeine and morphine to people suffering from AIDS. "The state should be helping people, not prosecuting them," said Martinez-Garcia after the verdict was read.

Martinez-Garcia, director of an AIDS support group and a well known Gay activist, admitted that he distributed the drugs without a license. But in defending himself, he said: "What I did was morally and ethically right." He said poor people could not afford the drugs or work through the frustrating bureaucracy of the federal, state and local health systems to get access to the drugs.

Defense attorney Ed Leinster said of the verdict and of his client's actions: "Maybe it will say to people, 'Let's do something about this,' instead of making pariahs out of people who are trying to do something."

MARY FISHER TO REPLACE MAGIC **JOHNSON**

Washington, DC - President Bush has appointed Mary Fisher, the HIV-positive woman who addressed the Republican convention, to replace Magic Johnson on the National Commission on AIDS. Fisher's father, Max, is honorary financial chairman of the Bush-Quavle re-election committee.

"A lot of people would have me not support the administration," Fisher commented recently. "What good would that do? We need to have people working within the system to make change." Jeff Levi of the AIDS Action Council said he

hoped Fisher could succeed where Johnson and others had failed: to spur the Bush administration to greater action against AIDS.

LAW STUDENTS SEEK TO OUST MILITARY

Hartford, CT - Gay students at the University of Connecticut Law School have filed suit seeking to oust military recruiters from their campus because of the Pentagon's ban on Gay and Lesbian personnel. The suit is based on Connecticut's recently passed Gay rights law which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment and public accommodations.

One factor complicating the lawsuit is another state statute which declares that the military has the right to recruit anywhere that private companies can. The plaintiffs must prove that the presence of military recruiters would cause "irreparable harm" to the campus community.

The co-chairman of the Law Students Association filing the suit is Joseph Steffan, a highly honored midshipman who was discharged from the Naval Academy at Annapolis just weeks before graduation after his superiors learned he is Gay.



the struggle for Gay and Lesbian rights.

Vidal notes that since the collapse of the Soviet Union, "queers" have replaced "commies" as Public Enemy Number 1. Homophobia, says Vidal, "is an ongoing psychopathic hatred that has made the United States the laughing stock of the entire world." He wants to encourage Gay groups to "stop quarreling over correctness" and work together to combat homophobia. To that end, Vidal addressed the annual fundraiser of the Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies in New York on October 2 outlining a plan of action.

Vidal's latest book is a satire of the New testament called Live From Golgotha. He can also be seen in the Tim Robbins' movie Bob Roberts, a satire on politics.

DIGNITY/TWIN CITIES EVICTED AGAIN

Minneapolis, MN — Despite the fact that the St. Stephens parish council had invited Dignity to meet in its church space. Archbishop John Roach has ordered the group of Gay and Lesbian Catholics to be evicted.

This is the second time Dignity has been forced out of Catholic parishes since a 1986 Vatican statement ordered such evictions. Dignity had appealed its earlier eviction to the Minneapolis Human Rights Commission, which ruled the Catholic archdiocese guilty of discrimination. But that decision was overturned on appeal.

The Lutheran-Episcopal Center and the United Ministries Center at the University of Minnesota have both offered Dignity meeting space.

LAW MAGAZINE'S FOCUS ON GAYS DRAWS PROTESTS

San Francisco, CA — California Lawyer magazine, which recently featured a cover story on "Gays at Law: Life in a Straight-Laced Profession," has drawn criticism from some readers, many of whom are members of the California Bar Association.

Attorney G. Sharp called the cover photo of two Gay men "utterly

repulsive." Donald Ingoglia wrote: "Showing two smiling Gays on the cover illustrates how sick our society has become." James P. Carroll wrote: "It is a sad day when I must make apologies for my professional organization's publication." Carroll was particularly chagrined when his grandson asked him if he subscribed to a Gay magazine.

Editor Jane Goldman said the virulent reaction to the story showed how deep-seated homophobia remains among attorneys.

PRISON INMATE DROPS AIDS

Madison — Prison inmate Roger Hillman has withdrawn his lawsuit against the Department of Corrections in which he charged that prison authorities illegally exposed the fact that he is HIV-positive. The suit was dropped October 2, just days before it was to be heard by the State Supreme Court.

Hillman, 43, signed a stipulation dropping the suit and promising not to pursue further legal action. He had charged Columbia County jailers with making public the fact that he is HIV-infected. State law mandates the confidentiality of all medical records, including any person's HIV status.

The agreement Hillman signed was forged by five attorneys involved on both sides of the case. No reasons for Hillman's action and no further details about the agreement were made public.

GRACE APOLOGIZES TO GAY COMMUNITY

Milwaukee — Corporate executive J. Peter Grace issued an apology for making anti-Gay slurs at the opening of a new Ambrosia Chocolate Co. plant in Milwaukee October 6. Grace referred to New York Gov. Mario Cuomo as "Cuomo the homo" and Mayor David Dinkins as "Dinkins the pinkens."



Lesbian community for the inadvertent use of an offensive term," Grace said in a statement. "While there was no malice intended, I now realize that there is no place in our society for remarks of this kind in any context."

Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist, who was present when the remarks were made, called them "distasteful." Gov. Tommy Thompson, who was also present, issued a statement saying "Grace was correct in apologizing for his statement."

ACADEMIC RESIGNS FROM AIDS TASK FORCE

Whitewater — A faculty member at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater has resigned from the Chancellor's Task Force on AIDS, citing the group's inaction and lack of progress.

In his letter of resignation, David K. Runyon of UW-Whitewater's Art Department noted that the Task Force had not met for six months. He asked: "AIDS has been with us for a decade, and what have we done on this campus?"

Runyon wrote that although the Task Force passed a motion to include representatives of student groups, none were invited to the next meeting. The Task Force also agreed to include representatives of the Madison AIDS Support Network and the Milwaukee AIDS Project. Not only have these groups not been invited to participate, wrote Runyon, but UW-W administrators said that they would not be allowed to vote on matters anyway because they are not a part of the campus community.

Runyon suggested that choosing someone from the medical profession as chairperson might raise the credibility of the Task Force.

CONSERVATIVE ACTIVISTS TO LEAVE WISCONSIN

Milwaukee — Conservative activists Craig and Jan Parshall, who have been leaders in the anti-Gay and anti-abortion movements in southeastern Wisconsin for the last ten years, are moving to Washington, D.C.

Attorney Craig Parshall, who has defended anti-abortion demonstrators and orchestrated major protests against Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian Pride celebration, will take a job with the Rutherford Institute, a Christian-based law firm.

Jan Parshall, who has moderated programs on Christian radio and TV stations and hosted her own call-in show, "Wake Up America," will be taking a job as assistant to the president of Concerned Women for America, a right wing group.

Many in the Gay community applauded the move.

A place for us in politics

Representing the Republicans was Scott Evertz, chair of the Milwaukee East Side Unit of the GOP and Jim McFarland, a former member of the Madison Common Council. The panel was moderated by Dr. Gary Hollander.

Dahmer case cops plead guilty, await punishment

Milwaukee [In Step] — To everyone's surprise, the two officers fired for dereliction of duty in the Jeffrey Dahmer murder case, pleaded guilty before the Milwaukee Fire and Police Commission October 13. The Commission will decide their punishment at the end of the month.

Officers Joseph Gabrish and John Balcerzak responded to a call about a naked boy running in the street on May 27, 1991. They turned 14 year old Konerak Sinthasomphone, who was drugged, back into the custody of Jeffrey Dahmer who, hours later, killed the boy. The officers could be heard laughing about the incident over their police radios, and Balcerzak ignored the pleas of Good Samaritan Glenda Cleveland who called the station to ask about the boy. Dahmer killed four other men before he was finally apprehended last July.

For the past year, both officers have consistently proclaimed their innocence. Balcerzak told the press: "I believe I was as good a cop as I've ever been on that night and throughout my career." The guilty pleas surprised everyone.

In exchange for pleading guilty to the general charge of failure to conduct a proper investigation, other charges against the officers were dismissed. Those violations included: failure to take proper police action; failure to interview witnesses and get detailed statements; failure to take an "incapacitated" child into protective custody; failure to consult a

To the surprise of some in the audience, Evertz and McFarland also saw a place for out Lesbians and Gay men in the GOP in moving the Party away from its far right wing.

Evertz added that he feared that Gays and Lesbians were becoming "too monolithic" in their allegiance to the Democrats.

Questions were taken from the floor. There was little acrimony or rigorous debate. commanding officer; and failure to follow up on a citizen's phone call.

A PLEA FOR LENIENCY?

The deal was apparently reached in last minute negotiations between attorneys for the police union, representing Gabrish and Balcerzak, and attorneys for the city, representing the Police Department and Chief Philip Arreola, who fired them. Commission Chairman Nick Padway said Arreola, who did not appear at the hearing, sat in on the earlier negotiations.

Some observers suggested the guilty pleas put the men in a better position to ask for leniency during the punishment phase of the hearing in late October. The Commission can decide to uphold the firings, or impose lesser penalties such as a 60 day suspension. Both officers have been collecting paychecks while awaiting their appeal.

Glenda Cleveland, who arrived at the hearing expecting to testify, was surprised at the turn of events. She said Gabrish and Balcerzak should not be given their jobs back: "They created the problems for themselves and, like everyone else, they should suffer the consequences."

United Way may take future action against Scouts

Milwaukee [In Step] — At a meeting October 13, the Board of Directors of the United Way of Greater Milwaukee decided to continue funding area Boy Scout Councils but agreed to re-examine its own anti-discrimination guidelines and to consider withdrawing financial support if the Boy Scouts continue to exclude Gays.

Queer Scouts of Milwaukee, as part of a nationwide pressure campaign against the Boy Scouts of America (BSA), has lobbied the local United Way to discontinue funding the Boy Scouts until the BSA's stated policy of discrimination is reversed. Wisconsin law prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation.

Several Board members voiced disapproval of a statement adopted by the Executive Committee which acknowledged the BSA's discriminatory policy but said the matter should ultimately be resolved by the courts. The statement said the that "wide variety" of programs funded by Milwaukee United Way "make it possible for individuals

"I don't understand the statement, and discrimination bothers me generally." Board member Martin Stein was quoted in the Milwaukee Journal. Other members expressed discomfort with the passive method of deferring to the courts on the issue.

The full Board did not vote on the Executive Committee's statement but agreed to re-evaluate its own anti-discrimination policy and see of some reconciliation could be found between local Boy Scout councils and those who are prohibited from membership. If such reconciliation cannot be achieved locally, the Board agreed to work with other United Way chapters to influence the BSA nationally. No timelines for action were set, however.

Dan Fons of Queer Scouts told In Step he was disappointed that more aggressive action against the Boy Scouts was not taken by the Board. But he was also encouraged by the fact that Board members took the issue very seriously and that some members took strong stands against the BSA's policy.

controversy to all 36 United Way Board members. The packet included the text of BSA's policy excluding homosexuals and information from Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays about the low self-esteem and isolation Gay youth often feel in our homophobic society.

The packet also included excerpts of the Report on Youth Suicide issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, which found that suicide is the leading cause of death among Gay and Lesbian youth. One third of all teen suicides are attempted by Gays and Lesbians.

"We think the evidence we presented them with is having an effect." said Fons. "Now, we have to keep up the pressure to see that they follow through with their resolutions." Fons and a handful of peaceful protesters picketed outside the Board meeting before it began.

Anti-Gay initiatives come down to wire

mounting a last ditch effort to defeat the anti-Gay measures.

An October poll showed that 52% of Coloradoans oppose Initiative 2, which would prohibit state and local governments from enacting anti-discrimination laws to protect homosexuals and would void such protections currently in place in Aspen, Boulder and Denver. Thirty-six percent support the measure and 16% are undecided.

Bobbie McCallum, spokesperson for the Equal Protection Campaign (EPOC) which opposes the initiative, told In Step that the large block of "undecideds" was a cause of concern but said the last few weeks of the campaign would feature a media blitz to solidify the majority in opposition.

Governor Roy Romer, Senator Ted Wirth and Rep. Pat Schroeder — all Democrats — have come out against the measure. Jesse Jackson made a strong appeal for Coloradoans to oppose the initiative. Even actress Whoopi Goldberg, in a national mailing encouraging support for EPOC, said: "I've never heard of such a thing! Trying to constitutionally deny rights rather than protect rights. Trying to dehumanize people. And in beautiful Colorado."

Colorado for Family Values, which proposed the measure, has distributed literature linking homosexuality with child molestation and perversion and depicting Gays as a threat to the family.

McCallum said the Equal Protection Campaign is stressing that Initiative 2 is not a so-called "lifestyle" issue, but an issue of discrimination and equal rights. Many groups, including the Colorado Bar Association and the League of Women Voters, along with business leaders, concerned that the state will lose tourist and convention dollars if the measure is passed, are allied with EPOC. Gov. Romer is EPOC's honorary chairman.


JESSE JACKSON IN OREGON

The "No on 9" campaign, which opposes the anti-Gay referendum in Oregon, got some inspiring support from Rev. Jesse Jackson who told a huge crowd

in Portland that isolating any group of people is "an ungodly, arrogant, sinful act."

Measure 9 declares homosexuality to be "abnormal, wrong, unnatural and perverse," lumps it together with bestiality and pedophilia and forbids any unit of state or local government from using public funds or facilities to "promote, encourage or facilitate homosexuality." Municipal Gay rights laws would be voided, Gay teachers could be fired and schools and universities could be forced to remove books or materials about homosexuality.

"Whether or not you like the Gay lifestyle — that's not the point," said


Oshkosh to Host Quilt

the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt is scheduled to visit Oshkosh in the Spring of 1993. The 800 panel section of the Quilt will mark the first display of the memorial in the Fox Cities area, and is considered a major public education event by local AIDS organization (ECHO), the UW-Oshkosh Women's Center, and the Drug Abuse Correctional Center, the Quilt will be on display April 29-30, and May 1-2, 1993, at Kolf Sports Center on the UW-Oshkosh campus.

The Quilt began in 1987 as the brain child of a small group of San Franciscans seeking a way to express their loss and work through their grief. The idea quickly spread throughout the community and by the fall of that same year 920 panels were displayed for the first time in Washington, D.C. 



The deadly language of 'Traditional Values'

The political rhetoric extolling 'Traditional Family Values' barely disguises the hatred that threatens the health and safety of Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual persons.

"The inflammatory language of political leaders and public figures has serious consequences for Lesbian and Gay people," says Don Wert, Associate Administrator of Regent Hospital and nationally-known speaker on Lesbian and Gay health issues. "Many Lesbian and Gay individuals have believed the deadly lies that they are sick, criminal or damned '

Jackson. "The point is are you for equal protection under the law? Would you do unto others as you would have them do unto vou?"

The Oregon Citizens Alliance (OCA), like its counterpart in Colorado, has also engaged in a fear campaign demonizing homosexuals. Gay activists are concerned the climate of hatred may have contributed to the deaths of a Lesbian and Gay man, Hattie Mae Cohens and Brian Mock, whose home was fire-bombed September 26. They had been harassed for weeks by skinheads who used racist and homophobic slurs. Four suspects have been arrested.

Governor Barbara Roberts, a long-time Gay supporter, has repeatedly spoken out against Measure 9, saying it would tarnish the state's progressive image and harm it economically. Both Senators Robert Packwood and Mark Hatfield oppose it, and many religious groups, including the Oregon Board of Rabbis, are part of the "No on 9" coalition.

In mid-October, polls indicated the vote would be close. "No on 9" activists anticipate last minute smear tactics on the part of the OCA. They plan to continue utilizing both the media and grass roots contact with voters until election day.

Ellen Ratner. Vice President of the National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation, says, "Lesbian and Gay people already face barriers to obtaining appropriate health care. The proponents of 'Traditional Values' want to enact policies that further damage the Lesbian and Gay community."

Shame and fear shape the lives of many Lesbian and Gay persons who accept the assumptions and stereotypes of heterosexist culture. In most parts of this country, Lesbian and Gay people live with realistic fears of losing their jobs, housing, custody of children and basic civil rights if their sexual orientation is disclosed or discovered.

"Americans can do a better job of reaffirming traditional values; we need to reclaim the revolutionary idea that all people are created equal," says Wert. 'This means inclusion of Lesbian and Gay relationships and families. Our lives depend on it."

Gay Games IV efforts hailed

At its annual meeting in San Francisco, The Federation of Gay Games marked the 10th anniversary of Gay Games I and hailed the progress of New York in '94, the organizing committee for Gay Games IV.

Representatives from the Board of Directors of New York in '94, including Executive Director Paula Pressley, attended the weekend-long meeting to update Federation members on the plans for Gay Games IV in New York. Forty-one Federation members and supporters from a total of five countries attended the meeting.

Federation Co-President Susan Kennedy cited the following accomplishments of New York in '94 as evidence of significant progress: reaching the quarter-million dollar fundraising milestone; designating Kennedy Travel of New York City as the official travel supplier for Gay Games IV; formally designating competitions in 26 sports; and signing contracts with its first two major venues.

Susan Kennedy said, "It is very clear that New York in '94 is committed to putting together a wonderful event. The organizers of Gay Games IV have worked hard to make significant progress, especially in the areas of fund-raising and venue selection. The Federation will continue to do what we can to provide New York in '94 with the support they need.

Paula Pressley said, "I am pleased to receive such glowing praise from the Federation of Gay Games as we continue to make very significant progress in organizing Gay Games IV. The fact that we have surpassed the one-quarter million dollar mark a full two years before the Games reflects our intense efforts and highlights the wide-spread support we enjoy. We will continue our hard work to cultivate this support so that in June of 1994, thousands of participants may take part in the biggest and best Games ever."

Gay Games IV recently announced that

Ice and Figure Skating have been added to its official list of 24 sports certified for competition. The Games has also selected Split Rock-Pelham Bay Park Golf Course in The Bronx for its golf competitions and The Paramount Theater in Madison Square Garden in Manhattan for Physique and body-Building events.

Paula Pressley also recognized the progress of the on-going "One for the Games" campaign, which asks all Gay and Lesbian sports groups to earmark \$1 of even fees for support of Gay Games IV. This campaign enables supporters the world over to contribute to the presentation of Gay Games IV.

A revised Request for Proposals has been issued by the Federation's Site Selection Committee for cities wishing to be considered as sites for Gay Games V in 1998. To date Manchester, United Kingdom; Amsterdam; The Netherlands; and Sydney, Australia; along with Houston, Texas and Atlanta, Georgia, are among the cities which have expressed interest in hosting Gay Games V. Request for Proposal packets must be requested by March 1, 1993 by writing to the Federation Site Selection Committee at 584 Castro Street #343, San Francisco, CA 94114. Completed bids must be returned by July 1, 1993.

The Gay Games were founded by the late Tom Waddell, M.D. — who competed in the decathlon for the United States at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City — as a celebration of Lesbians and Gay men and as a 'peoples olympics' open to everybody regardless of sexual orientation. The Gay Games IV theme, Unity '94, is an expression of the founder's dream that inclusion be a corner stone of the Games.

Gay Games IV will take place in New York City during the third week of June, 1994. Gay Games IV is an Olympic-style

'93 DC March issues streamlined demands

Denver, CO [In Step] — The National Steering Committee for the 1993 March on Washington for Lesbian, Gay and Bi Equal Rights and Liberation took place October 3-4 in Denver. Almost 200 representatives from across the U.S. discussed financial matters and issued a streamlined list of demands.

Discussion focused on the necessity for greater fundraising efforts. Each of 17 regions was expected to raise \$1,000 toward the march but only four regions had raised the money. So far, the balance sheet for the March shows \$22,672 in income and loans. Expenses and accounts payable total \$24,703. Costs for the construction of the stage alone are expected to be \$75,000. Local and national fundraising efforts are deemed a priority.

The March on Washington is set for Sunday, April 25, 1993. It was decided that the following day, April 26, some sort of civil disobedience demonstration would be organized at the Capitol building.

The Steering Committee also released an action statement about the purpose of the march and a streamlined list of demands, which narrows down and focuses the dozens of demands previously adopted.

ACTION STATEMENT AND DEMANDS

The Action Statement reads: "The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender movement recognizes that our quest for social justice fundamentally links us to the struggles against racism and sexism, class bias, economic injustice, and religious intolerance. We must realize if one of us is oppressed we are all oppressed. The diversity of our movement requires and compels us to stand in opposition to all forms of oppression that diminish the quality of life for all people. We will be vigilant in our determination to rid our movement and our society of all forms of oppression and exploitation, so that all of us can develop to our full human potential without regard to race, religion, sexual orientation/identification, identity, gender and gender expression, ability, age or class."

Following are the seven demands of the March on Washington:

 We demand passage of a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexeal and Transgender civil rights bill and an end to discrimination by state and federal governments, including the military; repeal of all sodomy laws and other laws that criminalize private sexual expression between consenting adults.

• We demand a massive increase in funding for AIDS education, research and patient care; universal access to health care including alternative therapies; and an end to sexism in medical research and health care.

 We demand full and equal inclusion of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender people in the educational system, and inclusion of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender studies in multicultural curricula.

 We demand legislation to prevent discrimination against Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender people in the areas of family diversity, custody, adoption and foster care, and that the definition of "family" includes the full diversity of family structures.

 We demand the right to reproductive freedom and choice, to control our own bodies, and an end to sexist discrimination.

 We demand an end to racial and ethnic discrimination in all forms.

• We demand an end to discrimination and violent oppression based on actual or perceived sexual orientation/identification, race, religion, identity, sex and gender expression, disability, age, class, AIDS/HIV infection.

The final National Steering Committee meeting will be held next February in Washington, D.C. Thompson and Kowalski try to rebuild their lives

Clearwater, MN — For Karen Thompson and Sharon Kowalski, the completion of their legal battle means the start of a more private campaign to find meaning in a relationship permanently transformed by a tragic accident and years of enforced separation.

In a recently published interview with Partners Magazine for Gay & Lesbian Couples, the women recount the history of their relationship and Thompson's efforts to return Kowalski to a home she built to accommodate the disabled woman's special needs.

Thompson, 44, and Kowalski, 35, have been partners for 12 years. They were separated for eight of those years when Kowalski was disabled in a car accident caused by a drunk driver. The separation was imposed by Kowalski's parents and enforced by the courts until the Minnesota Supreme Court upheld a lower court decision awarding Thompson legal guardianship of Kowalski on December 17, 1991 — the couple's anniversary date. The court declared the women "a family of affinity which ought to be accorded respect."

The Partners interview includes comments from Kowalski, who has severe speech, locomotive and short-term memory problems. Kowalski used a digitally-voiced speller system and relied on Thompson as interpreter. Thompson related a number of touching episodes, as well as one that caused her embarrassment.

Describing Kowalski's state of mind, Thompson remembered an occasion when "Sharon wasn't cooperating with a nice, straight speech therapist's work agenda. She typed out that she'd like to make love to me instead. The therapist turned red, but recovered and said, 'I guess that does sound much more exciting than any of the options I gave.'"

Thompson said her partner's openness about sexuality allowed her psychologists and therapists to testify in the couple's favor in their last court battle. Thompson also said she'll need a lot of help to meet

Kowalski's special needs.

"My... our dream would be to get Sharon home sometime soon. What has slowed us down is the fact that we are so far in debt from the legal fees, and I can't care for Sharon by myself. Even with 12-14 hours of attendant care a day, I'd have to cover 10-12 hours. Both day and night Sharon needs to be turned, be given tube feedings, those kinds of things."

To raise the money it will take, Thompson has been giving talks nationwide as well as continuing her college teaching schedule. Kowalski still resides part-time in the Trevilla of Robbinsdale rehabilitation facility, but is spending increasing amounts of time at the couple's Clearwater home near the banks of the Mississippi River.

"The one thing that's remained very clear through it all is that Sharon still loves me and I will always love Sharon," she said. "I want Sharon home with me as long as that's where she wants to be."

and would eventually broaden the entire concept and shape of the leather world. The organization was called Samois, and what made it so different was the fact that it was formed by and for Leatherwomen.

Many leatherwomen found themselves shunned by the mainstream Lesbian communities (and many still do) due largely to the misconception that S&M play is actually abuse, and women engaging in such play are propagating and encouraging violence towards women. Unfortunately for many of these pioneers, a large number of leathermen viewed their entry into the existing leatherbars and clubs as sacrilegious as opposed to the natural evolution of the leather community.

More recently, many straight people and Bisexuals have emerged from the leather closet and now openly and vocally explore the leather lifestyle.

As you can see, the leather community continues to grow and evolve. The lifestyle is not for everyone, but those who are intrigued or excited by the possibilities need not fear it because of

old misconception, myths or lies. Leather is not about abuse; it is about exploring the pleasure and freedom that can be found by expanding the sexual and sensual envelope. Those who discover a place for themselves in the world of leather can find support, pleasure, and a level of brotherhood and sisterhood that is not common in most communities.

Frequently, the word used to describe this is 'Belonging!'

make the leather community more inclusive after a long history of exclusiveness.

The modern leather community traces it's roots back to the aftermath of World War II. Many soldiers came home from the predominately male environments of the battlefields of Europe, Africa, and the Pacific and found themselves unwilling to return to the 'normal' family centered small towns and farming communities they had grown up in. In addition to coming to terms with their homosexuality. they also brought back an ideal of masculinity based on the discipline and power structures of the military. Many of them also returned with a respect for and an eroticism of uniforms and the sense of authority and power they conveyed.

Many of these men gravitated to New York and San Francisco where they began to forge an underground network amidst the existing homosexual communities in these, and eventually other major cities. They created bars, leather and motorcycle clubs, and playspaces; all with very specific procedures, rules of conduct, and dress codes. Those Leathermen who failed to comply with the rules and regulations were ostracized. This was the

Old Guard, and they continued to dominate the lather scene until the late seventies and early eighties (depending on geographical area). They also helped to create the Lesbian and Gay rights and pride movements in the sixties and seventies (the Stonewall riots and marches were started by drag queens and leathermen).

Many leatherpeople were also at the forefront of AIDS fundraising and activism, even before the disease had a name.

In the late seventies and early eighties, new trails were blazed in the leather community. The rigidity of the Old Guard was being eroded by the openness and aggressiveness of many newcomers to the scene. These new arrivals did not wish to travel through the slow and lengthy processes of initiation and apprenticeship that were required to gain acceptance and support by the Old Guard. This marked the decline of the Old Guard and the rise of the New Guard (not a very original name, but then they weren't that radically different from their pre-decessors).

In 1978, a new club was formed in San Francisco which sent shock waves through the American leather community

When asked how she sees the future of the relationship, Kowalski typed out "Love."

Legal fees to bring Kowalski home have exceeded \$220,000, while therapeutic and disability equipment cost another \$41,000. Contributions to help cover these costs can be sent to the Karen Thompson Legal Fund, 3070 Fulton Circle, Clearwater, MN 55320.

AIDS foundation defies Marines

San Francisco, CA — The San Francisco AIDS Foundation continues to defy the United States Marine Corps by publishing an AIDS prevention advertisement which features a man with an emblem of the Marine Corps tattooed on his arm.

The man is embracing another man and is pictured alongside three other couples under the headline "Sex is Good." The ad, according to the AIDS Foundation, is intended to urge those who are sexually active "to be sexually responsible as well."

But the Marine Corps fired off a letter to the AIDS Foundation charging it with unauthorized use of the Marine emblem. The Corps also ordered the foundation to "remove the advertisement from future distribution and destroy the advertising layout." "The San Francisco AIDS Foundation has no intention of destroying this ad," said the group's Executive Director, Pat Christen. "We believe it is a good ad. We find the Marines' response to our ad silly at best, lethal at worst... The content of the letter alone is reason enough for ongoing AIDS awareness efforts."

The letter from the Marine Corps read, in part: "The use of the emblem... could create the inference that the Marine Corps is somehow partially responsible for the spread of AIDS in the San Francisco area... Further, your use of our emblem could be viewed as tacit approval of homosexuality by the Marine Corps. As you are no doubt aware, neither the Marine Corps or the Department of Defense permits homosexuals to serve in their uniformed tanks."

"This ad in no way suggests that the Marines are responsible for spreading AIDS," replied Les Pappas, the man who created it. "The ad was developed to encourage people who may be at risk for AIDS to get an antibody test. Any sexually active person may be at risk for AIDS. This includes sexually active Marines and former Marines, tattooed or not, whatever their sexual orientation may be."

Regarding the Corps' concern that the ad implies a "tacit approval of homosexuality," Christen said: "Its inanity speaks for itself. 'The few, the proud, the ignorant' seems to be the Marine Corps motto for addressing AIDS.'"

Christen has continued to place the ad in San Francisco newspapers and magazines during October, AIDS Awareness Month.

Welcome to Leather Worlds

Welcome to Leather Worlds. This is the first in a continuing series of columns addressing the history, make-up, practices, and issues in the leather community. We welcome your comments, suggestions, and questions. Please address these to Tony Terry in care of In Step magazine. Now, a little introduction.

What is Leather?

Aside from a material made by tanning the hide of an animal, leather has become a catch-all word encompassing Lesbians, Gay men, heterosexuals and Bisexuals. It refers to people involved in a wide range of activities including leather and/ or latex sensuality, sado-masochism (the pleasure/pain principle), bondage, fisting, roll playing relationships (i.e. master/slave or daddy/boy), and much more. It runs the gamut from practitioners of long term immobilization bondage to people who simply enjoy the look and feel of a leather vest or harness.

What these things have in common is a set of absolute rules; all play must be SAFE, SANE and CONSENSUAL! The leather experience is built on trust, and all leather encounters must take place between consenting adults in sufficient control of their faculties to guarantee their own safety and the safety of their partner or partners. This means guarding against potential physical injuries as well as taking all necessary precautions against

the transmission of HIV and all other sexually transmitted diseases.

Beyond the premise of Safe, Sane and Consensual, the activities of leatherplay are limited only by the imaginations and experiences of the participants.

This makes the leather community and the leather lifestyle incredibly diverse and multifaceted. There have also been great strides made in the last fifteen years to


Madison benefit dinner dance





For those who feel strongly about this, MAP will accommodate you by coming to you rather than you having to visit them. Since that time, I've found a lot of good staff people at MAP, and received help in obtaining information and benefits. Remember you have a high level of control on information about yourself; don't ever be afraid to exercise that control.

The next time I'll talk about doctors and

hospitals. Several columns will deal with humor — there isn't enough, and those of us caught up in this are the best source of finding something funny in our lives. I'll also talk about family, friends and the public. Future topics will include home care, drug information, depression, insurance, activism, and planning that funeral before someone else does it for







Positively HIV

by Arnie Malmor

A Sometime Serious, Sometime Irreverent Commentary on Living with AIDS

This occasional column of personal views and observations will deal with issues related to living with AIDS. As the sub-heading implies, this will not always be a serious endeavor. One of my goals is to provide an outlet for those of you who have questions and/or comments about your own status. I also hope to provide insight on how to treat friends and acquaintances who may be HIV positive or who have AIDS. For obvious reasons — I'm not a doctor and don't play one on TV — medical comments will be limited to my own experiences and to published literature. And so the odyssey begins.

(Please, no threatening phone calls or anonymous letters — it's too late).

It was a dark and stormy night... oops! Wrong story. Actually I've just always wanted to use that line.

In early 1991 I noticed that my regular 3 mile run was becoming difficult. I didn't think a lot about it, but I also started losing weight. So, on the advice of friends, I got an HIV test and found out I was positive. Since my doctor wasn't sure of my problem - my lungs sounded clear, as were the x-rays - we had the lab do a T-cell count. The results came in at under 100. We assumed that I had pneumocystis pneumonia (PCP) and I started treatment with Bactrim. However, for the first time in my life, I had a negative reaction to a drug: I became really sick. I staved home from work, didn't eat and hardly drank any fluids. Over the next week my doctor checked on me by phone, and we began to realize that my mental processes had slowed down.

MADISON'S COOL VIDEO CLUB 626 W. Washington Ave. 608/256-8765 I finally dragged myself to see him, by which time I was quite dehydrated. He looked at me and said "You have to go to the hospital today or you're going to die." My immediate reaction was, "No, I can't, I'm moving in three days." But since dying didn't have any appeal, I postponed the move and went to the hospital — for a 10 day stay. It was indeed PCP. While in the hospital, I acquired an additional doctor, an AIDS specialist, called in by my family practice doctor. (I'll cover hospitals and doctors in a later column.)

Thus began a redefinition of my life. On a bad day, and even I have them, one cannot help thinking about dying with AIDS. However, on a good day one is living with AIDS. I prefer good days. In fact, I tend to ignore the disease as much as I can.

One thing I should mention, because it does color my views, is that I never had any doubt that I would be HIV positive. The result is that I have little or no anger to vent; there is no one to blame. And in fact, unless you've had sex with only one person in your life there never will be anyone to blame. I don't think this issue deserves much time or energy. The concept of innocent victims (us vs. them) is patently absurd. No one sets out to become the victim of a disease.

The first real issue that develops after diagnosis is your ability to exercise control over who knows you have AIDS. There are certain legal requirements imposed by the State, but beyond that you should control the flow of information. Many people are initially uncomfortable with the idea of dealing with the



Unicorns of Madison and Leather United of Chicago for their generous donations to The Sanctuary concerning urgent humanitarian needs."

The Sanctuary exists at one of Milwaukee's oldest homes on the near South Side. It has evolved as an oasis for the needs of the poor for nearly 13 years. Originally it provided basic human needs for the homeless, dispensing food and clothing, finding shelter, and counseling on drug and alcohol abuse. Over the years needs have changed, so that help is now provided for the working poor, families of moderate means and the elderly who still live in their own homes.

The Sanctuary is not a non-profit organization. Their literature says, "Jesus, while on earth, paid taxes, and told us to 'render unto Caesar...'. We in turn pay taxes on any donation, as income. The remainder is used to fund the Sanctuary." The current operating deficit averages about \$300 per month. To eliminate the deficit and continue providing its services, the Sanctuary




Plus. These guys know how to delight a crowd!
