Studds and Frank to Introduce **Employment Non-Discrimination Bill**

(Washington, D.C.)- In a major effort to ward off the pressure building from the anti-Gay initiatives building in 9 of the states, U.S. Representatives Gerry Studds (D-MA) and Barney Frank (D-MA) announced on April 21 that they will jointly introduce federal legislation to ban job discrimination based on sexual orientation. This will be the first legislation to focus specifically on workplace protections for Lesbians and Gay men. The plan is to introduce the bill in May,

"The right to be secure in one's livelihood is a bedrock principle with which every American can identify," said Studds

"Discriminating against honest, hardworking people because they are Gay or Lesbian makes no sense--morally, socially or economically," said Frank.

The bill is being pushed by Gay lobbyists from the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), and others.

70 Acts will Entertain PrideFest Goers Over Two Days and Evenings on Two Stages at June 11-12 Festival

(Milwaukee)- With more than 70 acts composed over 200 singers, dancers, comics and actors and other entertainers from three states, Wisconsin's PrideFest 94 has become the largest Gay and Lesbian entertainment festival in the Upper Midwest.

In order to accommodate the greatly increased number of performers, PrideFest has added a second stage, the Harvey Milk Stage, which will join the outdoor Cream City Foundation/Alyn Hess Stage.

PrideFest 94 will be held June 11 and 12 at its new site just north of Milwaukee's War Memorial Art Center located right on Lake Michigan.

PrideFest has succeeded in producing the biggest, most diverse and highest quality entertainment lineup ever seen at a LesBiGay event in Wisconsin or, for that matter, most other states as well.

Organizers say that last year's large crowd convinced many performers that it was worth their while to perform at PrideFest. Unlike past celebrations, there was no special effort made to cover bare spots in the lineup.

Every act was either viewed in person or required to submit a tape before being added to the lineup. In fact, so many good performers were turned away because there was no room in the lineup that organizers considered adding a third entertainment stage. That idea was rejected because of cost considerations.

There will be three different revues. Hur-

ricane Productions will present a special twohour Womyn's revue on Saturday at 1:00 p.m. In honor of Stonewall, Michael Ross, aka Echo Chambers, will be presenting a revue of minority impersonators, Saturday at 5:30 p.m. BJ Daniels will close the festival on Sunday evening with his BJ Daniels Revue.

Dance troupes include the Shoreline Line Dancers, the Iberian Dancers with their colorful Hispanic dances, the hip hop troupe, Foreplay, and the Minneapolis-based troupes Borderline and the Purple Creek Cloggers.

Singers will include Chicago's Judii Lowe, Josie Santiago, the Cream City Chorus, the Fest City Singers, Singsational, Garret James, Julie Darrough, Appleton's Jill Clark and the Ladies of the Valley, Estee Gatson, Chicago recording artist Erik Washington, and Smart Answer also from Chicago, Green Bay's Kitty Rosman and Jeff Jennings and many others.

The big Sunday band lineup includes several big names. Milwaukee's best Reggae group, David Robinson and Road Damage return to the PrideFest Stage. So does the John Schneider Orchestra with its smooth swing sound.

Two R and B bands, Dr. John and the Hearaches 12 piece R and B All Star Band, and Stokes and The Old Blues Boys will make their PrideFest debuts.

Saturday two alternative rock bands, Well and Blarney Castle, make their PrideFest debuts. MOOK will bring its performance art

style to its PrideFest debut during the Pride Showcase Saturday evening.

Last year, PrideFest experimented with a special Saturday evening concert: The Pride Showcase Candle Light Concert. This year's three-hour show will include a dramatic recreation of Stonewall. Concert goers are being urged to bring a candle to help light up the park with Pride.

PrideFest 94 Co-Chair, Bill Meunier, says the entire community has reason to be very proud of this lineup. "We have worked throughout the year to round up the best singers, dancers, and bands that we could find It's a shame we had to turn down so many fine performers.'

(Milwaukee)- Miriam Ben-Shalom is one of four awarded the prestigious Stonewall Awards in recognition of her long-time activism for equal rights for Lesbians and Gays. The award brings with it \$25,000.

The Stonewall Awards are administered by the Anderson Prize Foundation. It was founded in 1990 in Chicago as a not-for-profit charitable and educational organization, to promote education about and awareness of the concerns of the Gay and Lesbian community.

The Foundation is named for the late Paul A. Anderson, a futures trader in Chicago, who provided the initial funding as well as a bequest of \$1,250,000 to endow the prizes after his death. There are no conditions of any kind attached to the award.

Besides Ben-Shalom, Franklin "Frank" Kameny of Washington, D.C., Barbara Smith of Albany, New York, and Rick Osborne of San Diego, California also won Stonewall

Ben-Shalom, a native of East Troy, Wisconsin and a long-time resident of Milwaukee, gained national prominence when she opposed her discharge from the U.S. Army in 1976 when she told the truth about her sexual orien-

Up to that time, she had received many commendations and was one of the first women to become a drill sergeant.

Ben-Shalom took her case to court and 11 years later won reinstatement, but was not allowed to re-enlist, whereupon she launched a second court challenge which she won and then lost on appeal. The U.S. Supreme Court

declined to hear the case.

Ben-Shalom was one of the first public speakers on behalf of the right of Gays to serve in the armed forces. She has lobbied for the civil rights of Lesbians, Gay men and all people. She is a frequent speaker nation-wide and has been Grand Marshall in many Gay Pride parades, including in Milwaukee.

She is currently a member of the PrideFest Board in Milwaukee, serving as Vice President and Volunteer coordinator. She has given a portion of her award to the PrideFest celebration. She is a member of the Stonewall 25 Armed Forces Veterans Coalition, among other duties

In addition to being a high school English teacher in the Milwaukee public schools, she is an instructor in the continuing education program at the Milwaukee Area Technical College.

She is also currently giving "serious consideration" to running for Mayor of Milwau-

Ben-Shalom first heard that she had won the Stonewall Award when she got a Federal Express package. When she opened it up, she found a packet of information. She said that at first she thought it was from someone asking her for a donation of some kind, perhaps "a con thing of some kind."

It was only when she called Allen Schuh, head of the Anderson Foundation, that she found out what had happened.

When Schuh clarified the situation, her

Marge Beil New Contact Person in Mayor's Office for Gay Community

(Milwaukee)- Marge Beil, Staff Assistant to Milwaukee Mayor John O. Norquist has recently accepted the assignment of being the contact person in the Mayor's office for the Gay/Lesbian community.

The person who formerly held that assignment was David Riemer who yielded it when he became Norquist's Chief of Staff.

Beil, who has worked for the Mayor since March of 1993, emphasizes that this is an assignment, not an appointed position. She is not a liaison between the Mayor's office and the community, she said. Nor is she a spokesperson for the community to the Mayor.

Instead, she is a sort of ombudsperson, a trouble-shooter, a person who tries to help solve problems, a position she occupies for other communities such as older adults, labor

As such, she said, anyone in the LesBi-Gay community can call her, for example if they have a problem cutting through red tape. She will assist them or refer them to the proper office.

Beil is no stranger to politics. She worked for Tony Earl, running the former governor's campaign in Milwaukee. It was while working with Earl, she said, that she had contact with the Gay community.

However, she said, that was 10 years ago. Things have changed.

Beil said that she would be willing to accept invitations from community organizations and groups to meet with them.

Education Association OKS Money to Fight Anti-Gay Initiatives

(Seatac, WA) (AP) The more than 800 delegates to the Washington State Education Association's annual representative assembly voted overwhelmingly for a resolution against two anti-Gay initiatives. The teachers organization also authorized spending \$75,000 to try and defeat the two initiatives being pushed by the Religious Right.

The resolution approved on April 16 said the initiatives, if approved for the Fall ballot and passed by the voters, "would limit the human and civil rights of individuals and censor curriculum and programs in public schools."

Cobb County to Welcome Gays to Olympics

(Marietta, GA) (AP)- "We really didn't mean anything by it" is what Cobb County officials seem to be saying in their new proclamation saying that there would be "no discrimination" in Cobb county during the Olympic Games. "If someone is Gay, they're welcome in Cobb County, as they always have been," said County Commission Chair Bill Byrne. The proclamation came in response of Olympic officials hesitation over allowing Cobb County to host the volleyball competition. Gay activists have been working to get Olympic volleyball removed from the county because of a resolution last year condemning Gays.

However, the proclamation may be a case of "too little, too late." Gay activists say they are far from satisfied with the proclamation, while Olympic officials labeled it as a "good first

step."

New Hampshire Senate Kills Pro-Gay Bill

(Concord, NH)- On Thursday, April 22, the New Hampshire state senate on a 13-10 vote, killed a bill that would have forbidden discrimination in housing, employment and public accommodations based on sexual orientation. Immediately after the defeat, Republican Governor Steve Merrill said that he would "aggressively fight discrimination against Gays and Lesbians" and that he expected the attorney general's office to do the same.

Observers credit the defeat of the bill to the strong opposition of the Roman Catholic Church. A majority of the Senate is Catholic. The bill had passed the House on a 226-131 vote.

Once it was clear the bill was doomed, one senator pleaded in vain with an opponent who champions animal rights causes to give Gays and Lesbians the same roof over their heads and food that she argues dogs deserve.

Frank Urges Gays to Avoid Extremes

(Washington, D.C.)- Member of the Gay community should stress mainstream themes if they want to win broad political support, said Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA). Frank, speaking at a forum on civil rights for Gays held April 25 at the National Press Club, said self-expression, while healthy, does not necessarily translate into an effective political movement.

"The Gay rights movement shouldn't stress the most extreme aspects of Gay culture if it wants to gain political support and strength," he said.

Hawai'i Move to Block Same-Sex Marriages

(Honolulu)- The Hawai'ian legislature moved to counteract a court ruling that could make the state the first to recognize same-sex marriages. On April 25, the state House gave final legislative approval to a measure that defines marriage as the union of a man and a woman. A spokeswoman for Gov. John Waihee refused to say if he would sign the measure.

Rep. Terrance Tom who supported the measure said, "If this Supreme Court (Hawai'i) decision is not reversed, mark my words, you'll have women's rights and homosexual rights

from coast to coast."

In addition to defining marriage as heterosexual, the bill creates an advisory commission to suggest laws extending the legal and financial benefits enjoyed by straight couples to same-sex couples.

Oregon Voters Oppose Anti-Gay Initiative

(Portland, OR)- A majority of Oregonians oppose an anti-Gay initiative that the Oregon Citizens Alliance (OCA) is trying to get on the November ballot, according to a poll published on April 22. Poll respondents rejected it 57% to 36%. OCA's last anti-Gay measure, Measure 9, claimed 44% of the vote. Still, both sides say they believe the election will be close.

Activists Sound Alarm for Safe and Clean Water

(Washington, D.C.)- Environ-mentalists and health activists from across the country released a report on April 14, 1994, that put the nation on notice that our drinking water continues to threaten the health of many Americans. Danger on Tap: Protecting America's Drinking Water was released one year after a parasite outbreak killed 104 and sickened over 400,000 people in Milwaukee.

"Polluted water is killing us," said Brett Hulsey, Midwest Representative of Sierra Club and co-author of the report. "Our water isn't safe. Everyone is at risk. Our members of Congress need to reject the pending legislation to weaken our water laws. We are relying on them to strengthen our laws to keep out pollution. Pollution prevention is the way to end the toxic threat.

The report shows that micro-organisms that caused the Milwaukee disaster are widespread in our nation's water systems. Milwaukee residents are not the only people who are getting sick.

Between 1986 and 1992, the Centers for Disease Control reported 102 outbreaks sickening 34,155 people in 35 states. Pregnant women, children, the elderly and people with HIV or AIDS are high risk victims.

The Milwaukee outbreak was the largest

history

Danger on Tap tells only part of the story. "The situation in America's drinking water is actually much worse," said Diane Cameron, an Environmental Engineer for the Natural Resources Defense Council and coauthor of the report.

What's the solution? Fight, don't switch. "Switching to bottled water is not the answer," said Velma Smith, director of Ground Water Project for the Friends of the Earth. "Often bottled water comes from public treatment systems somewhere else that is just as risky as tap water. We have to stop and fight for safe, clean drinking water everywhere."

Milwaukee's MACT Receives \$565 Grant

(Milwaukee)- The National Association of Black and White Men Together (NABWMT) has awarded the Milwaukee chapter of Men of All Colors Together (MACT) a grant of \$565. This grant will fund a support group for persons with HIV and provide supplemental income to members with HIV or AIDS needing assistance with activity fees.

Lutheran Church Congregation Faces Suspension Over Retaining Gay Pastor

(Madison)- A third San Francisco Bay Area congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in American (ELCA) faces suspension from the denomination for retaining an openly Gay pastor.

The ELCA is the largest Lutheran denomination in the United States with almost double the membership of the more

conservative Missouri Synod.

Ross Merkel of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Oakland, California, proclaimed himself a Gay man last June. Merkel first notified Bishop Lyle Miller of his intention to make public his same-sex marriage, then he announced from the pulpit that for the last 11 years he had been living in a monogamous relation-ship with another man.

The ten-member discipline committee of the church's synod took up the case in February, 1994, ruling that Merkel could no longer be retained on the pastoral roster of the synod. The committee gave St. Paul's congregation until March 25, 1994 to remove Merkel from his post as pastor of the church.

The deadline is long past. Merkel remains the pastor of St. Paul's, and now the congregation faces further action by the synod

for non-compliance.

During his hearing before the discipline committee, Merkel was defended by retired Bishop Stanley Olson. Olson argued that even under the present statement of the ELCA on human sexuality, a monogamous Gay pastor such as Merkel, could be retained.

However, the committee found the present wording of the church's statement clear and Bishop Miller stated that it was "painful and necessary" for the synod to remove Merkel from the pastoral roster.

Observers say that it is likely that St. Paul's will be suspended by the synod pending a revision of the ELCA positions on human sexuality in August, 1995.

This is the fate of two other Bay Area congregations which retained openly Lesbian or Gay clergy.

St. Francis Lutheran Church is currently

under suspension for retaining an open Lesbian on their pastoral staff.

First United Lutheran Church also has been suspended for retaining an openly Gay

minister as their sole pastor.

Though these churches are still officially

within the ELCA, the openly Lesbian or Gay clergy have been removed from the official synod of the Sierra Pacific Synod. Should the ELCA take a more favorable stance to permanent monogamous same-sex relationships in 1995, it is possible that all three churches would be returned to full status as members of the synod.

Churches which are under suspension for non-compliance may not send representatives to meetings of the synod.

Should the ELCA retain its ban on open Lesbians and Gays serving as clergy, it is likely that the ELCA and these three congregations will sever their ties to each other.

There are no indications that the synod will contest possession of the church properties should the congregations be removed from the synod.

The present position of the ELCA is that active Gay or Lesbian relationships, even within the bonds of permanent monogamy, are not acceptable. Many ELCA congregations accept and even encourage monogamy for their Gay/Lesbian members, and these congregations are tolerated within the ELCA in spite of the denomination's present stand. However, the ELCA draws the line at Lesbian or Gay clergy.

Currently, the ELCA is revising its statement on human sexuality, a process which many hope will result in the passage of an official document at the August, 1995 meeting in Minneapolis.

Among issues being studied by the commission on sexuality is the church's stand on Homosexuality.

The first draft of the proposed statement has drawn a great deal of criticism from both the clergy and Laity in the ELCA. The primary issue of contention is the positive stance of the document on Lesbians and Gays, especially the treatment of the biblical material on the subject.

With the high numbers of Lutherans in Wisconsin and Minnesota, the present controversy over ordained Lesbians and Gay men and the church's position on Lesbian and Gay laity promises to have a significant effect on the religious landscape of the upper Midwest

The meeting, attended by 42 people (90% of them from Milwaukee and Madison), chose the name "Action Wisconsin" with the subtitle, "A Congress For Human Rights."

Most of the discussion was dominated by debate over the new name. It was decided from a slate of 7 options to be called "Action Wisconsin: A Congress For Human Rights."

"This organization is concerned about the rights of all people. We must understand that none can have full civil rights unless all have human rights," said Dale Johnson, President of the Board of Madison's United.


The design should incorporate the goals



Let Your Voices Be Heard: Homophobia in the Schools Project Needs Your Help

Virtually all of us who are Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual have extremely painful memories of the pervasive homophobia we faced in school. A dynamic new coalition has come together in Madison in an attempt to address these problems in the Madison public schools. GLADE (Gays, Lesbians and Allies for Diversity in Education) needs you to tell your stories, and to network with friends and other groups to encourage them to come forward as well.

GLADE is collecting contemporary stories documenting the incidence of homophobia in the Madison public schools from four perspectives: 1) Gay and Lesbian parents; 2) Gay and Lesbian teachers and school personnel; 3) Gay and Lesbian students; and 4) parents of Gay and

MASN And Mary Alice Mowry Deserve Kudos, Not Criticism

Lay off and lighten up, Madison Magazine! Conservative founder James Selk's slick monthly rag began by unjustly deriding the Madison AIDS Support Network in a blatantly onesided piece they published a few months ago. Complete with a heart-tugging illustration that pictured haggard PWA's desperately knocking on a locked MASN door, the article painted a picture of MASN as a \$1,000,000 agency tragically out of touch with the people it serves. This month, the smear campaign continued when the magazine gave Director Mary Alice Mowry a 'power play" award for her alleged insensitivity.

Let's get a few things straight. Being big and successful is not inherently evil. MASN's 10year history of extraordinary growth and development has not been driven by greed or avarace or power hungry administrators. The fact that a well-staffed and well-organized agency with a \$1,000,000 budget has arisen in such a short time is directly linked to one unavoidable reality:

the overwhelming size and the scope of the epidemic in south central Wisconsin.

Madison Magazine focused on the complaints of a small and vocal group of clients on an advisory committee who felt that the vast majority of the agency's funds should go directly to people with HIV and AIDS. On the face of it, that seems to make sense. However, as MASN officials pointed out, money for support services is money going directly to help clients. Money for fundraising and administrative staff is not a drain on resources. On the contrary, it produces more money that can be used to help the people served by the agency. Most significantly, however, it's important to realize that at least half of the mission of the Madison AIDS Support Network is its vital work in the areas of education and prevention.

No MASN staff person, board member or volunteer would deny the compelling need for the compassionate delivery of services to people with HIV and AIDS. However, this important use of funds is only part of the picture. The Madison Magazine article offers the rather condescending and paternalistic assertion that since the people with an ax to grind against the agency have AIDS or HIV, they must be right and they must speak for all other serum positive people. The last thing that people with HIV and AIDS want is to be separated out from the rest of the community--whether that means being shunned and ignored, or whether it means being placed

In fact, dozens of other MASN clients and family members called Madison Magazine in the weeks following the publication of the original story to try and tell the rest of the story, the story of an agency that has brought compassion and respect to the lives of the people it serves. They expressed understandable concern that the reputation of the agency had been wrongly tarnished and that its valuable work would be hurt.

However, despite the size of this outpouring, the magazine appeared to be dumbfounded in knowing how to respond. A retraction was out of the question. The publication of letters to the editor was also out of the question--the magazine, zealously protective of its narrow view of the world, had a policy against them. (One letter was published.) In taking its second swipe at Mowry and MASN last week, it's obvious that no one at the magazine was listening.

Born at a time when ignorance, prejudice and denial were rampant, there's no denying that the birthing process of MASN was a difficult one. Starting with its roots as a small grassroots operation, the growing up process has been equally difficult--it's a little like someone experiencing the terrible two's, a difficult adolescence, and a mid-life crisis all in the space of a few short years. The politically volatile nature of Madison inevitably made the arguments about the mission of the agency that much more strident, and the urgency of the needs of those affected by the epidemic understandably made the debate an emotional one. Despite all this, much was accomplished due to the dedication and conviction of the people involved. However, until recently, the turnover of executive directors and board presidents was occurring almost yearly.

Recently, so much of that has changed for the better. The leadership of a strong and responsive board of directors has done much to bring stability and a renewed sense of purpose to the organization. A professional and highly motivated staff has forged effective working relationships with each other and other community organizations. MASN has one of the largest and most dedicated groups of volunteers of any agency in this part of the state. However, what's especially ironic and unjust about Madison Magazine's recent ravings is its attempt to demonize Director Mary Alice Mowry. No one is perfect, but Mowry is far more deserving of kudos than criticism in terms of the valuable difference she's made in just two years at the agency.

Mary Alice Mowry brings a lifetime of experience as a social activist--and a depth of sonal commitment to all of the communities affected by HIV and AIDS--to her work at MASN. Returning to Madison in 1992, after many years of work as an articulate and well-respected advocate in the Twin Cities, Mowry was uniquely suited to the job. Armed with an intimate knowledge of the Madison community, but not encumbered by old animosities and preconceptions, she was able to bring a fresh approach to the challenges facing MASN.

Mowry has earned the respect of many for the rare combination of knowledge and political expertise that she brings to her position. In Minnesota, openly Lesbian State Rep Karen Clark speaks glowingly of Mowry and her accomplishments, a perception shared by our own Rep Tammy Baldwin who calls Mowry "an exceptionally talented and articulate leader for our community." If Madison Magazine had any sense at all, they'd be working to spread understanding, instead of engaging in tabloid journalism. And they'd be nameing Mary Alice Mowry their Woman of the Year.

Madison Judge Northrup's Coming Out A Tribute to His Late Father

As a publication dedicated to the premise that coming out is the most powerful thing that an individual can do in advancing understandings about Gay men, Lesbians and Bisexuals, we nonetheless never want to underestimate the highly difficult and individual journey each person must take in reaching that decision. For community leaders--particularly those of earlier generations or of different ethnic or cultural backgrounds--that decision can be a particularly difficult one. Many view the choice as that between remaining hidden, but effective, advocates who can quietly move our community forward versus being out and potentially losing the respect and influence that can help to change things for others.

It's a complicated dilemma. And a dilemma made even more complicated when remaining in the closet means denying the integrity and love of one's life partner. Inevitably, each per-

son's choices must be honored.

However, the poignancy of those choices becomes especially pronounced upon the death of a partner. Recently, a community leader faced the death of her partner of more than two decades, and yet the newspapers reported their relationship as that of "roommates." No judgment is appropriate, but one cannot help but sense the weight that such non-recognition of the reality of the loss must add to the burden of grief she felt.

On Friday, April 22, the Madison dailies carried the obituary of Larry G. Small, a remarkable man who died from complications of AIDS at the age of 47. They noted his work as a computer programmer for a private business and the Milwaukee schools. They noted his love of the outdoors, of nature, and animals. They said that he was an inspiration to all who knew him. And it listed countless family members and friends who survive him.

For many of us, however, there was a special power in one very simple and matter-of-fact statement: "Survivors include his soul-mate and life partner of twenty-one years, George Northrup." For Northrup, a well-respected Madison judge, it was a coming out. For our community, it was a gesture with powerful meaning. And as a reverent tribute to the memory of a precious and much-beloved partner, no more eloquent statement of love and respect could be

No Secret Meetings

TO THE EDITOR:

I am writing to alert your readers to a secret meeting which took place on April 20,, 1994, in a River Hills home between a selfselected group of Gays and Lesbians and a staff member in Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist's Administration. Once again, a few of our own appear to be more interested in ensuring their places in a politician's Rolodex than advancing an inclusive agenda for Gay and Lesbian civil rights in Milwaukee.

This particular group of Queers, who all seem to be active with the newly-formed (and also very secretive) Human Rights League(HRL) of Greater Milwaukee, have a long history of holding similar meetings. When the activist groups, Queer Nation and ACT UP used non-stop demonstrations to force the Mayor to meet with representatives of our community after his Pride Parade funding veto in 1992, it was this "HRL" group that excluded front line activists from that meeting and asked the press not to report on it. In the uproar that followed that decision, it appeared that this HRL group had learned to be more inclusive.

The secret meetings continued however, and while the Mayor's office (which never told the group which Queers could and could not be at the meetings), viewed these meetings as being representative of our community's concerns, no agenda or goals for these meetings have ever been shared with the community at large.

Even worse, this HRL group is apparently so ineffective at or afraid of using grass roots power to influence political decisions that no accomplishments of all these meetings have ever been announced.

A few weeks ago, this HRL group was told that Marge Beil, a Norquist staff person, would be the new contact person for the Gay and Lesbian community. The change occurred as the previous contact, David Reimer, was promoted to Chief of Staff.

Rather than share this information with the community through the Gay press and a public meeting so that we could all access this resource, a private soiree in another city was held with only this self-selected group being invited. No press and no community leaders who are not a part of this elite group were

Clearly, this was an attempt to maintain control over an information and power loop that this group has tried to control through secrecy for years. The implied message to Ms. Beil was that these are people who count.

Now, as the anger and distrust that is bred by such secrecy is surfacing, there is talk of an all-inclusive meeting with Ms. Beil and the Mayor in May (this one may actually be in Milwaukee). While such a meeting is a great opportunity, it will be occurring after the damage was done.

Why is all this important to talk about in public? In two years, Mayor Norquist will be seeking your votes again. When we collectively ask him, "What have you been doing for us for 4 years? Where is that openly Queer member of the Fire and Police Commission you promised? Why have you been silent as Queer teens are abused in the public schools?," etc., he will be able to honestly respond that he has been working closely with a group of Gays and Lesbians who have not complained about his performance, a group that believed that the best response to his parade funding veto in 1992 was to publicly volunteer to work for his re-election cam-

The danger to us all is very real as the religious right begins to organize against us in Wisconsin. Our chance at attaining equal rights could be sold off so that a few people can feel important.

Of course, this could only happen to us now with our unspoken permission. I encourage your readers in Milwaukee to regularly contact Marge Beil at the Mayor's office with issues of concern to Gays and Lesbians.

We can make it clear from the outset that she needs to listen to the wide diversity of views and concerns in our community, and that the Mayor is actually expected to do something for us to get our votes

Call and introduce yourself to her now at 286-2200, and come to the May meeting with specific questions and expectations for

the Mayor. We all must be included if true gains are to be made for our rights. Dan Fons Milwaukee

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20,000 CommunitySpirit Long Distance Phone Customers 'Improperly' Switched to Straight-Owned Company

(Chicago)- In what may become a landmark case in telecommunications history, thousands of Lesbian and Gay long-distance customers of CommunitySpirit are flooding their State Public Utility commissions and the FCC with phone calls to express their outrage over being improperly switched to Members Long Distance Advantage, a long-distance program offered by Trans National Communications (TNC) of Boston, Massachusetts, from CommunitySpirit, the nation's only Lesbian, Gay and Bi owned and operated long-distance program.

Eric McNulty, a TNC spokesman, acknowledged that "the customers are all with us." But a matter of dispute, which will be settled in federal court, is whether the customers belong to CommunitySpirit or to

McNulty admitted that TNC is not Gayowned, but "we consider ourselves Gayfriendly. We have many openly Gay people working in our organization, and we're active locally in publicly supporting organizations like AIDS Action."

According to Jeffrey Vitale, President of Overlooked Opinions in Chicago, TNC has "improperly" switched some 20,000 CommunitySpirit Customers to Members Long Distance Advantage (MLDA) without a valid Letter of Agency for each customer.

"We have been embroiled with TNC in a legal battle that began when we terminated business relations with TNC because of TNC's continued and on-going breach of contracts," Vitale said.

"During this battle," Vitale continued,
"TNC filed for injunctive relief asking the
US District Court to order CommunitySpirit
customers onto TNC's long distance
service.," Vitale said, adding that this
"suggests and act of desperation."

Vitale explained that with the loss of the

CommunitySpirit account, "TNC lost an estimated 25 to 35% of their business."

Each CommunitySpirit customer was mailed a letter which, Vitale said, infringed on CommunitySpirit's federally registered trademark.

Overlooked Opinions had contracted with TNC in November, 1992, to provide customer service and billing services to individuals and members affiliated with Overlooked Opinions, the nation's leading market research and political polling firm specializing in the Gay market.

Long distance customers of Overlooked were to be provided with long-distance service obtained for Overlooked by TNC which purchases bulk long-distance time and operator assistance services through US Sprint

By contract, TNC was forbidden from using the names, addresses, phone numbers and long-distance usage data from Overlooked's customers for any purpose other than fulfilling their contractual obligations.

According to Vitale, around November 1, 1994, Overlooked notified TNC that it was in breach of contract for the following reasons:

1. Poor customer service which included homophobic treatment of customers;

2. Non-payment of fees;

3. Unreasonable pricing;

 Failure to provide Overlooked with the required auditing reports;

5. Improper bad debt practices;

6. Refusal to provide long-distance service to Overlooked customers;

7. Unreasonable delays in calling card distribution; and

A on-going unilateral cancellation of non-subscriber calling cards.

Overlooked says that because none of the

Company above was remedied, Overlooked terminated their contract with TNC on February 17, 1994. Medical College AIDS Researcher Kelly Appointed to Editorial Board of

(Milwaukee)- Jeffrey A. Kelly, Ph.D., professor of psychiatry and mental health sciences and director of the Community Health Behavior Program at the Medical College of Wisconsin, has been appointed to serve on the International Board of Editors of the British Journal AIDS Care, which focuses on the medical, mental health, social and prevention aspects of AIDS.

Dr. Kelly is also a member of the Scientific Committee of the International Conference on Biopsychosocial Aspects of HIV Infection and an associate editor of Health Psychology, the journal of The American Psychological Association. He was also instrumental in securing a recent \$4 million grant from the National Institute of Mental Health to establish at the Medical College one of four national Centers of AIDS Intervention

Many Older Gays and Lesbians Living Lonely Lives in Isolation

Marsha Bond's lifetime dream is to open a retirement community in Atlanta for Lesbians. Not to shut straight people out, but to give those older women-many of whom have never made their sexual orientation public--a place to finally open up.

"I would like to provide a setting for people to retire where they feel comfortable," said Bond, 49, a gerontologist. "I'm sure there are Lesbian and Gay people in retirement communities who are very isolated and get sick of going to parties where people have their children and grandchildren in common."

For now, it remains a dream.

When Bond, a little over a decade ago, founded Women of Wisdom, an Atlanta group for older Lesbians, she discovered just how hard it is to get older women to participate. Not everyone is ready to take advantage of the more open atmosphere-especially older Gay men and women.

Experts in the field say that at least until recently, after a lifetime of hiding, older Gay men and Lesbians are almost impossible to locate, even for research purposes.

"Many 80-year-olds went through shock therapy and were institutionalized for being Gay," said Sandy Zimmerman, President of the National Association for Lesbian and Gay Gerontology.

The strides made by Lesbians and Gay men in recent years is no more apparent than at a conference in Chicago held in late 1993 of the American Society on Aging, where the problems of America's aging Gay population was the subject of a host of sessions dedicated to Lesbian and Gay issues.

Researchers at the conference said that if they could conduct more reliable research on older Gay people, they could verify a few trends they only suspect, including that:

Many older Gay men and Lesbians have been prematurely placed in nursing and personal care homes because they didn't have children or families who accepted their sexual orientation and would help care for them as their health failed.

Older Lesbians who are forced to live in a group setting for health reasons prefer female-only environments, while older Gay men don't care as much about being in a single-sex home.

Many older Gay men may be more isolated than older Lesbians. Whereas many older Lesbians were empowered by the women's movement, as a group, elderly Gay men did not have that kind of liberating and collective experience.

"What older Gay men don't have is that whole era of consciousness raising," said Will Hubbard of the Virginia Polytechnic Institute of Blacksburg, Virginia.

But even those who have been liberated run up against a legal system that hasn't. Gays and Lesbians of all ages still face--and often lose--tremendous court battles when they attempt to leave their belongings to their partners when they die. Juries often side with families contesting wills over partners of the same sex.

In right-to-die and competency issues, partners are treated as no more than a close friend.

"We may consider ourselves bonded and what we have is every bit as committed as a marriage could be," said Shirley Brown, 64, who is in publishing in Atlanta and has a lifetime partner. "Still, society may decide that what we have is not to be taken seriously."

The reason for contesting a Gay person's will usually isn't an issue of money, lawyers say. In all likelihood, the family still is angry about their relative' sexual orientation. If a person dies from AIDS, the family may also blame the partner.

"One hates to see the legal system give vent to a person's spite and anger," said Jeffrey G. Sherman, a law professor at the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Gay men and Lesbians can make the law work for them, lawyers say. A living trust, which is harder to contest than a will, is one way to better ensure an estate is left to the right person.

Also, a durable power of attorney for health care, a document that delegates healthcare decisions in the event a person can't speak for themselves, ensures that a partner has a say in right-to-die issues.

Lawyers say it is important for someone who has been diagnosed with AIDS to get their legal affairs in order before the disease progresses. Many wills of AIDS victims are contested on the ground that the person suffered from disease-related dementia. "Unfortunately, this claim can be made plausible to a jury," Sherman said.

Lesbian and Gay gerontologists formed the National Association for Lesbian and Gay Gerontology in 1978 mainly to support each other. There are well over a 100 members. With their increased acceptance, the group has turned its focus to educating heterosexuals who provide services to older Gay and Lesbian clients—when they can find them.

"I'm completely in the closet here," said one 82-year-old retired advertising worker in Atlanta. She lives in a personal care home and does not want her name disclosed because she is concerned that other residents will chastise her if they know she is a Lesbian.

"I have nothing in common with these people," she said. "They have all been married. They all have grandchildren."

In her day, it was unthinkable for a Lesbian or Gay man to have or adopt a child, she said.

Now, after suffering a stroke and the loss of her same-sex spouse, she is lonely. She would love to live in the home Bond dreams of building



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Pat Robertson's Ghost Writer, Mel White, Comes Out of the Closet

Mel White, the current dean of Dallas Metropolitan Community Church, has made it his personal mission to do everything in his power to stop the Radical Right's attacks against Gays and Lesbians. White knows the enemy in this "culture war" having himself been a Fundamentalist Christian, as well as a respected and trusted colleague of such renowned Religious Right figures as Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell, Oliver North and Tim and Beverly LaHay.

White was a dedicated "bible believing" Christian since his childhood. He was a writer and award-winning maker of Christian films. As a writer, White acted as the ghost writer for the autobiographies of Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson and other prominent figures of

the Religious Right.

During his years of involvement in the Religious Right, the main enemy was "atheistic Communism," but in 1990, the Soviet Union began to crumble and the leaders of the religious movement declared a new war against the "homosexual agenda.," Indeed, Jerry Falwell sent out a mailing announcing an "Official Declaration of War."

During all these years with the Christian Right, White had a secret that was making him miserable and slowly driving him mad--

he was a Gay man. For 25 years White struggled to become a heterosexual, going to Christian counselors, even undergoing shock treatment. Finally, he

decided what had been obvious for so long: he

White decided he had to come out of the closet. He had to try to reason with the leaders of the Religious Right, many of whom were long-time friends. It didn't work. They cut him off, and the "culture war" continues.

White is deeply alarmed by the activities of his former employers, and believes that American democracy is seriously threatened by "a religious Third Reich" that would include the extermination of Gays and Lesbians. He has vowed to fight this every step of the way.

As the German public of the 1930's dismissed the Nazi threat as lunacy, so today the American public is seriously underestimating the threat from the Religious Right, White believes. He warns that Pat Robertson, Pat Buchanan, Jerry Falwell and a host of others have demonstrated that they intend to "take back America" and that the public had better wake up before it's too late.

(Tom Flint:) -- During your interview on "60 Minutes," the interview ends with you saying no one would choose to be Gay if they had a choice. What did you mean by

(Mel White) -- That's not what I said. I was so shocked at the way "60 Minutes" ended

I was talking about the problem of choice. The Religious Right is saying we "choose" to be Gay--to be evil. I said nobody "chooses" to be Gay. You are Gay as a gift from God. Once you accept it, you find it's a wonderful thing.

They took my quote completely out of

(TM) -- What kinds of things are you talking to people about?

(MW)- People are asking me how to respond to these threats from the Religious Right. At MCC in Dallas, our constant theme is come out wherever you are. We've got to get people to come out in every possible situation. As we come out, people who know us start questioning the homophobic rhetoric because they know a Gay person.

We have got to set up a project monitoring the Religious Right. In Dallas, we have 73 people collecting information (on the Christian Right Wing) so we will be able to pass it on to the Gay community and to our supporters; what the lies are.

Most Gay people don't listen to the "700 Club," and don't read their mailings, fundraisers filled with hatred. Once we get the information out to the community, they see how dangerous the Religious Right is.

(TF)-- In your Book, Stranger at the Gate: To be Gay and Christian in America, you suggest that Focus on the Family, based in Colorado Springs, is perhaps the most dangerous of all.

(MW)-- James Dobson and his lobbyist in Washington, Gary Bauer, are as dangerous as any of them. They're right up there with Pat Robertson. Dobson has the little spots on CBS radio all day long and this gives him such legitimacy

Dobson's message is so filled with hate and so filled with misinformation and it is broadcast all over the country. Perhaps the single most listened to radio broadcast in the country is "Focus on the Family." The network is extensive. They're influencing in every way all of those anti-Gay initiatives.

Dobson and Bauer are both working to mobilize their masses to raise money. They hope to have a budget of \$40 million in a few years to get our rights taken away from us.

"Focus on the Family" is organizing, raising money, training volunteers, using a media network, direct mail. They're collaborating with the Christian Coalition. They're They're everywhere.

(TF)-- Jeff Kemp, son of (former Bush Administration Housing and Urban Development head) Jack Kemp, is head of the Focus group in Washington State. He says his group is not anti-Gay.

(MW)- He is lying. Did you know that Tim and Beverly LaHay headed up Jack Kemp's candidacy for the presidency (in 1988)? The LaHays were the national chairs. Beware of Jack Kemp because he is the most presentable politician on the Religious Right, but he's surrounded by really raving homophobes.

(TF)-- In your book you mention R.J. Rushdooney, founder of the Christian Reconstructionist movement, and his intention to exterminate Lesbians and Gav men. This sounds so far out that most people seem unable to believe it.

(MW)-- It's for real. I have a hand-written letter from R. J. Rushdooney at our church in which he says the bible is clear that homosexuals should be put to death. Just beneath this veneer of civility they hold that we should be put to death. If they continue this avalanche of hatred where will it take us?

They call me a fanatic because in the book compare the Fundamentalist Christian movement to the Third Reich. But in traveling around the country and seeing what is really happening, I think we're already way down the path toward a sort of Fascism of the Religious Right taking over the country

(TF)-The parallels with Germany in the '30's are remarkable. The war against degenerate art, the worship of "traditional values," the propaganda that Gays are rich and powerful. These are the same things that were said about the Jews.

(MW) -- It is exactly the same thing. People think I'm hysteric, but we have very good reason to be nervous. There's a very good possibility that we're going to be sacrificed.

President Clinton was sincere about lifting the military ban, but he had to "sacrifice" us for a "greater good" -- the economy, the presidency. The more you understand the history of people being at first marginalized and then sacrificed, the more you realize that Gays and Lesbians are really being set up. If we don't awaken our Gay brothers and sisters across the country, and their heterosexual friends, we are going to be in real trouble.

All new volunteers receive comprehensive training to prepare them for the work they



Fun and Facile, Film 'Backbeat' Offers Compelling Picture of the Beatles

Oh, rejoice! It's Spring, when the fluff of life happily can be the stuff of life, a time when a film like **Backbeat** fits in perfectly with its fun and facile story.

To be fair, there is tragedy in this film about the genesis of the Beatles and the fifth member of the group, Stuart Sutcliffe, but it comes at the end and only lightly punctuates what is essentially a romping paean to youth and unbridled, raw artistic genius.

At its best, Backbeat offers a compelling picture of Sutcliffe (Stephen Dorff) and John Lennon (Ian Hart), the pair who, along with three others, started the Beatles in Liverpool, England, in 1960.

It's hard to imagine that there's anything fresh to mine from the story of the Beatles' rise as the century's biggest rock icons, but writer and director, Iain Softley, manages to find something new.

Sutcliffe's life and love form the film's centerpiece. He was an art school student when he was recruited by classmate Lennon to play in his band. Also in the group were Paul McCartney (Gary Bakewell), George Harrison (Chris O'Neill) and drummer Pete Best (Scot Williams).

The film begins with the fab five traveling to Hamburg, Germany, to revel in the thriving rock scene there. It's never clear, however, just why the bad sets its sights on Germany; the viewer is just tossed in as the band races off.

In Hamburg, Sutcliffe's interest in his music is ambivalent at best. He seems to be blithely going along for the ride when he spots an enchanting woman in the crowd, photographer Astrid Kirchherr (Sheryl Lee). Suddenly, the painter in Sutcliffe has found his muse and he all but abandons the Beatles.

Kirchherr has been credited with giving the band its singular style and look. In the film, she cuts Sutcliffe's hair in a long, floppy mop top. And as a member of the city's avant-garde, she was a natural magnet for Sutcliffe's artistic exploring.

Simultaneously, Lennon emerges as a man who has the rare talent of making anger and hostility somehow funny and amusing, instead of caustic and harsh. Ian Hart gives this man real depth—a vulnerability and a sweetness—to make Lennon's vitriol more palatable.

And just what is Lennon mad about? For one thing, he's seething with the prospect of losing his best friend to a woman. This

triangle becomes the most beguiling part of the film: John loves Stu, Stu loves John--but Astrid too, and Astrid loves Stu and maybe John.

In the end, what seems to motivate Lennor more than anything is a pure, driving ambition to become the legendary pop icon that he indeed became. For this, he leaves Stu to Astrid and goes into history.

Where the film falters is in the weak portrayal of the rest of the band, who appear as little more than stick figures with a few speaking parts and a lot of time clowning around. There was more than one triangle of various kinds going on there. But perhaps, one is enough in this film.

This film will delight you with its sheer boisterousness and love of rock 'n' roll. It's charming and it's bittersweet, and, like a Spring day, you'll leave feeling invigorated and refreshed.

Continuing 'Tales of the City' Saga Reveals Much About New PBS Head

Amristead Maupin's Tales of the City and an up-date from the last issue of Light, reveals more about PBS where the hit show was broadcast, than it does about anything else-including the tastes of the majority of Americans who watched it.

PBS, if you remember, said that it had canceled the hit because unlike vulgar commercial stations, it doesn't sink to sequels.

PBS also let it be known that the show cost too much. A strange reason since Britain's Channel 4, which originated the project, Concert Time to picked up almost all of the \$8 million tab.

Both reasons are as phony as they can possibly be. Lindsay Law, the producer of American Playhouse, who brought the series to public TV, had been pursuing corporate and private sponsors. And PBS does indeed air sequels. Witness the popular Sunday show Are You Being Served-Again for one.

So what happened? Two events seem significant. One is the arrival of a new PBS president, Ervin Duggan.

The second is a new, all-out campaign against Tales by Donald Wildmon's American Family Association: Very quietly, in late March, members of Congress were sent a 12minute bootleg videotape darkly highlighting the series' four-letter words, fleeting nudity (a sprinkling of breasts), pot smoking and one prolonged Gay kiss.

Duggan's pre-PBS job was as a Bush Administration appointee, backed by the National Association of Evangelicals, to the Federal Communications Commission where he fell to his knees and pledged his fealty to "decent family values."

Repeated efforts to get Duggan to stop hiding behind flacks and explain himself have been to no avail. Meanwhile, the millions of

(New York) (AP)- The continuing saga of viewers who delight in that kind of adult drama that they can't get on commercial TV, have a good right to feel betrayed.



Madison's United Hosts Second Annual Community Awards Dinner on June 3

(Madison)- Following in the wake of an extremely successful first year, The United will be sponsoring its second annual community banquet on Friday, June 3 at Madison's Inn on the Park. Cocktails will begin at 7:00 p.m., with dinner at 7:30.

The dinner, which will cost \$25-\$35 on a self-selective sliding scale, is crucial to the fund-raising efforts of The United, a social action agency providing a wide array of services to the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual community. The United is expected to serve more than 18,000 people in 1994.

While those numbers reflect the tradition of leadership and visibility The United has provided in its 16 years in Madison, they represent a more than doubling of the number of people requesting services at a time when resources have remained constant.

The United's Director, Jane Vanderbosch, has fond memories of last year's dinner. "Just seeing everybody celebrating together was so wonderful. We worked so hard all year-it was really fun to play together."

"Just seeing the size of our community as we filled that big room was powerful," she added. "It was a refresher course on where we've been as a community and where we're going."

"In the space of a couple of short hours, we found ourselves going from laughter to tears and back again. There was such a sense of community, of enjoying each other's company," said Dale Johnson, The United's President, who served as MC at the dinner.

He recalls how a memorable running gag was created when people at one of the tables responded to the hotel's mediocre meal with an act of "banquet civil disobedience"—they had a pizza delivered to their table. Hotel staff were not amused but the audience was in stitches throughout the evening. (Johnson offers assurances that with the change of venue, this year's dinner, by contrast, will feature "really good food.")

Among those honored at last year's dinner were Lois Stauber and John Quinlin, who received the first annual Susan Green Awards as Woman and Man of the Year. (Green, a nationally known civil rights activist, served as Director of The United from 1985-'86 before her death of cancer at the age of 33.)

Stauber is the driving force behind Apple Island, a women's community space which sponsors a wide variety of social and cultural events.

Quinlin was honored for his contributions in the realms of politics, community activism and journalism.

Many in the audience were moved to tears as each spoke movingly of the support of the people who have been important to them, including the unconditional love of the parents who were there for them that night, and who received an emotional standing ovation from the crowd.

Honored as Volunteers of the Year were

John Nees and Sharon Hayes. Nees, a newly retired UW professor and former Shorewood Hills village board member, spoke eloquently of his journey in coming out as a Gay man relatively late in life. He brought an insightful depth of understanding and sense of history to the evening as he spoke of how far we still must go, while instilling a very tangible sense of how very far our movement—and each of us as individuals—has come.

Hayes, a longtime community activist and co-founder of the Lesbian Parents Network, spoke with great emotion about her experiences as a Lesbian parent. She movingly communicated the hopes and fears of the parents of LesBiGay families who face the severest consequences of any of us from being visible, but whose courage and love for their children compels them to be courageous advocates of the rights of all of us.

David Clarenbach received a long and sustained ovation in accepting his award as Ally of the Year. It was a much overdue recognition of the contributions he made as the principal author of Wisconsin's first in the nation Gay and Lesbian Rights law, and his subsequent work for LesBiGay rights and the rights of people with HIV and AIDS.

Mary Alice Mowry, the Director of the Madison AIDS Support Network (MASN), proudly accepted the Organization of the Year Award, much-deserved recognition of the important work that MASN does in providing a better understanding of the lives of LesBi-Gay people in its daily work.

Other highlights of the evening included some somewhat whimsical slide show histories of our community provided by openly Gay County Supervisor Dick Wagner and a collective of Lesbian activists.

The dinner's organizers are pulling our all of the stops to make this year's dinner an even bigger success. A special outreach effort is being made to encourage the attendance of leaders from the community-at-large and other allies. At press time, special donations were being sought to make the dinner affordable for people who might otherwise not be able to attend.

Table captains are also needed. (Their role is to encourage others to attend the dinner, distribute and collect money for tickets, and report back to The United.

The awards nominations committee has received numerous names from the community and will be announcing its decisions shortly. (See next edition of Light for details.)

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Victory Fund Expected to Support a Record 20 Lesbian/Gay Candidates

(Washington, D.C.)- Members of the Victory Fund have contributed more than \$200,000 directly to the campaigns of openly Lesbian and Gay candidates in 1994 races, according to Executive Director William Waybourn. Only four months into the new year, the Victory Fund is only \$2,000 away from surpassing its 1993 record of \$202,883.

"This is a great tribute to both the dedication of our members and the quality of our candidates," Waybourn said. "We are proud of our ability to raise money for our own."

In order for candidates to receive the Victory Fund recommendation, a candidate must be openly Gay or Lesbian; support federal Gay and Lesbian civil rights legislation and similar state and local anti-discrimination laws; advocate aggressive public policies and campaign positions relevant to Gay and Lesbian health and wellness, AIDS research, education and treatment, and women's reproductive freedom; and demonstrate electoral viability.

The last criteria is the most difficult, as candidates must document all aspects of their campaign strategy, including qualifications and personal history, budgeting, fund-raising, targeting, direct mail, staffing, volunteer recruitment and deployment, endorsement,

previous voting patterns, demographics and opposition research.

"Viability helps determine winnability,"
Waybourn said. "And we're looking for
qualified openly Lesbian and Gay candidates
who, but for their lack of money, could win
their races."

1994 is proving to be a banner year for the Victory Fund. Besides surpassing its 1993 record of contributing \$200,000 directly to recommended candidates, Waybourn predicts that the national donor network will support at least 20 candidates this year, a 60% increase over the 1993 total.

Milwaukee's Historic Brewers' Hill Area Property Values Increase 40%

(Milwaukee)- While some large cities in other parts of the country are floundering, in the last two years, residential property values in inner city Milwaukee, led by Brewers' Hill, rose an average of 7.6% according to city figures released Friday, April 22.

These same figures show that values in Brewers' Hill rose by 39.6% from 1992 to 1994.

Brewers' Hill is located just north of downtown and takes its name from the fact at one time there were three breweries at the bottom of the hill. It is a national and local historic district roughly bounded by Walnut Street on the south, roughly North Avenue on the north, King Drive on the west and Holton Street on the east.

It is an area in which there are homes of various architectural styles ranging from the predominate Italianate of the 1870's to Federal style, Stick style, Gothic influence and Queen Anne, among others. Several buildings still stand that were built in the 1850's.

To give you an idea of how far things have come on "The Hill," in 1981 the area could have been most properly called "a slum." The old homes were in bad need of repair. Many of them were in a state of collapse and condemned by the city and slated for demolition. The largest house in the area, a Cream City Brick building, sold for \$750.

Today, all that has changed.

Over the past decade and more, Brewers' Hill has become one of the most vital and growing areas in the entire city. New businesses are occupying the old buildings along N. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive. (Once known as North Third Street, this was at one time the second busiest shopping district in Milwaukee.)

Area homeowners have restored (and are restoring) their homes to their original

Victorian elegance. As a consequence, Brewers' Hill has become a city show place. Last year's afternoon neighborhood open house tour attracted 1,200 people.

There is also new home construction. All new houses must conform to 19th Century architecture. One such new house was completed last year. Two more are slated to go up this year.

One of the many factors making the area attractive is its proximity to downtown. It is also on several major bus lines.

Residents agree, however, that one of the qualities that makes the area attractive is the heterogeneous nature of its people. Far from being a inner-city copy of a suburban enclave, Brewers' Hill is home to African Americans, Hispanic and Asian people and people of other ethnic cultures and backgrounds.

There are people with traditional families and non-traditional families as well. Many Lesbians and Gays own homes and live in Brewers' Hill.



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

HRCF's Policy Director Daniel Zingale, said that the bill is being introduced now for several reasons. One is to forestall the anti-Gay initiatives threatening in the states. Should these initiatives pass, he said, as unfriendly as Congress is now to Gays, the climate will get even worse. "The chilling effect on the Hill will be enormous," he said. Few people in Congress will want to buck the home vote.

The second reason is that with a certain irony, the timing of the bill couldn't be better.

HRCF's Executive Director, Tim McFeeley, said that "several recent national polls make it clear that Americans by "large margins" oppose work-place discrimination against Gays

By HRCF's most recent poll, 76% of Americans do not believe employers should be able to discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation, up from 49% in 1980. HRCF's findings are substantiated by other, similar

The favorable atmosphere is enhanced by the fact that the Clinton Administration has

opposed discrimination in the federal bureaucracy. Also, in a recent survey, 225 of the 435 members of the House of Representatives have stated that they do not discriminate against Gays in their offices.

Part of the strategy for this bill includes Congressional hearings on job discrimination against people based on sexual orientation that could take place within the next two

In line with this, HRCF has announced a plan to document cases of discrimination based on sexual orientation. The organization will ask Gay and Lesbian people to participate in a program called "Documenting Discrimination," an attempt to collect information on anti-Gay discrimination nationally. HRCF will present the individual stories to Congress when it considers the antidiscrimination bill.

We will be distributing documentation forms for people to fill out at Lesbian and Gay Pride events this Summer, and will be mailing them to organizations throughout the country," McFeeley said.

Documentation forms may also be procured

by calling HRCF's Public Policy Department at (202) 628-4160.

Unfortunately for the bill's chances, there

is only six months to go before the end of the 103rd Congress.

Paula Ettelbrick, Director of Public Policy for the National Center for Lesbian Rights said that it indeed mattered whether the bill got passed or not. However, she said that Whether it fits within the technical time frame in terms of how the bill gets through is, in some ways less important" than the hearings on the bill.

Ettelbrick placed great emphasis on the hearings because they will go a long way toward educating the public about the discrimination Gays and Lesbians face in em-

The information that comes out in the hearings should, she said, help persuade voters to oppose the anti-Gay initiatives in the

Observers agree that getting the bill through will not be easy. The lobbyists are preparing for the massive attack by the hate groups of the Religious Right, a pressure tactic that has been credited with forcing Clinton to back off from ending the ban against Gays in the military.

Pro-Gay lobbyists note that no similar Gay effort ever materialized to counter the Religious Right. It is in the hope that a similar situation can be avoided that HRCF is seeking out stories to document discrimina-

In addition, according to NGLTF's David Smith, NGLTF will be taking advantage of computer networks to get the word out and "mobilize constituency support."

Included in the bill is an exemption for religious groups. Ettelbrick said she was "uncomfortable" with including a religious exemption because it supports the notion that equal rights for Lesbians and Gays is a moral

"However," she said, "there is a political reality facing us in Congress that none of us That reality is that a religious exemption would be included anyhow, so it might as well be included from the start.

first reaction was "Why did you pick me? There are so many others more deserving.

Schuh told her that "you don't want to know how many people submitted your name.'

"I tell you that I feel so honored," she said. "There are so many people who have done so much. I feel so damned honored. I really don't know what to say.

Ben-Shalom admitted that the award came at a good time. Twenty-five years and more of activism had begun to take its toll. She was tired, dispirited, and had begun to wonder what she was accomplishing.

"I guess in a very real and important way," she said, "I've been reminded." The battle has been long and hard-fought, but now and again there is applause.

As she reflected on her life, she thought of the young people coming up. "Maybe," she said, "it was time to step aside." But now, with spirits raised, in the spirit of the award, she will continue. "I guess I'm back on the road again," she said.

How did it all begin, she is asked.

"It began very simply," she replied, "in 1973, with a kiss on the cheek." She goes on to explain.

A good friend of her's, a woman named Jeanine, and she went out one night to a "notorious heterosexual bar." There was a man there, an obnoxious sort, who started coming on to them. They put him in his place and then proceeded to "have a few brews."

Later, they "staggered home like two fiddler crabs." In her bedroom, she turned to Jeanine and said, "I know that I love you. Does that mean that I'm Gay?'

Jeanine replied, telling her that she loved her too. Then Miriam leaned over and kissed her on the cheek.

"I tell you," Ben-Shalom said, "it was like darkness had been lifted from me, like a pure white light had come. All the puzzle pieces fit. I knew I was Gay. It was that clear to me.

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



In December last year, I wrote to a friend in Los Angeles, asking him to send me a copy of a Gay-activist newspaper. To my delight, I received a copy of Wisconsin Light in the mail. Most foreign Gay material is banned in South Africa and your newspaper is my first contact with the overseas Gay and Lesbian media. I was amazed!!

Instead, Native Americans refer to "those who are two-spirited-having two spirits, male and female.

Tafoya added that in Native American cultures they use the terms "winkte" and depending on the language, to describe what early fur traders termed the berdache.

It was apparent that the pride of Stonewall was in the air and that "two spirits" dwelled among, what Tafoya termed



Depression and Bi-Polar Illnesses Focus of New United Support Groups

(Madison)- The United hopes to form a Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual-sensitive group for people who experience depression or bi-polar illness. People who would be interested in such a group are asked to leave a message for Jane at (608) 258-8582 or John at (608) 242-9694.

"While there are other resources in the community available to people, such as the Dean Foundation's bi-polar support group, we wanted to try something different," says John, a project organizer. "We want a support group where other group members' homophobia isn't another issue that people have to confront in addition to everything else. Also, unlike the Dean group which can consist of upwards of 30 people on a given night, we want to organize groups that are small enough for people to be heard--more like a half dozen or so people in each group."

"If there's enough interest, we hope that we can form a variety of groups, with a number of different focuses," he adds. "My own specific interest is in forming a group for people who've been dealing with bi-polar illness (also known as manic-depression) over the longer term. While there's lots of clinical information out there, I hope that we can go to a deeper, more personal, level in sharing information about how we integrate our experiences with this illness into our daily lives."

"We want to rise above having the illness define us as individuals, but we also want to be able to confront directly the complicated challenges this illness presents to us in everything from the expression of our creativity to our relationships with those close to us," he

"As Gay men, Lesbians and Bisexuals, we see everyday the power of sharing our stories with each other as we create a sense of community in the face of homophobia. The creation of these support groups would add a new dimension to the power that our love and support for each other can bring to our lives," he said.

For many years, the United has been a catalyst for the creation of safe, sensitive support groups for LesBiGay people dealing with a whole range of life challenges from alcoholism to experiences with sexual abuse.

"While these support groups shouldn't be confused with therapy, they represent one of the great strengths of our community--our ability to reach out to each other, to find strength in both the commonality and diversity of our life's experiences," says the United's Director, Jane Vanderbosch.

The United is making a special effort this year to identify the need for new support groups and to nurture their development. A support group facilitator's training is tenta-

tively scheduled for late Summer or early Fall. The United also maintains a list of counselors who are LesBiGay sensitive.

Following that, she called the Gay Peoples Union Hotline. The first person she talked to was Alyn Hess. He invited her to the next GPU meeting. It was at this meeting that

Ben-Shalom joined the military in 1974, "to see if I'd like it." She found she liked the

military life "very much."

This was the exact time when Leonard Matlovich appeared on the cover of Time and everyone in the army was talking about Gays.

Because Ben-Shalom defended Matlovich out loud, she was called in and asked if she was a Lesbian?

She told the truth.

That was a tremendous decision then, as it is now. But now, Senator Russ Feingold has read into the Congressional Record public praise for her honesty. She is moved by that.

She remembers her past, a time when Gay life was "rough," a time when the Milwaukee cops arrested you for holding your lover's hand. Things have changed, "but those were dangerous days," she said. When you went to a bar, like the Ball Game, "you never knew when it was going to get raided."

when it was going to get raided."

After the GPU meeting, she decided to go to a Gay bar. "So, I walked into the River Queen, where Sharon Dixon, now owner of Fannies, was working as a bouncer.

Ben-Shalom at once spotted a women, a most ravishing women and was instantly attracted. When she went up to introduce herself, the woman told her "she" was a man. But "she" handled it so well, Ben-Shalom recalls, that they became good friends.

Ben-Shalom has many memories of the River Queen. For example, there was the time when she and Dixon had to take an obnoxious patron out and teach him some manners—which they did. "I've never forgotten that," Ben-Shalom said.

She cites the people in her past who have been role models to her: Sharon Dixon, Alyn Hess and many, many others. "I hope I have honored them well," she said.

Where now?, she is asked.

Besides her many other activities, she will continue to teach. "Students need to see a Gay person doing normal every-day things," she said. She has gotten her share of cat-calls from bigoted students, but she will go on, just as she always has.

She is optimistic about Gays eventually serving openly in the military. "It will be solved in the courts," she said. "And it will be won in the next two years."

She speaks lovingly of Milwaukee, and lovingly of teaching, and wishes that she could simply settle back and be a classroom teacher, but that's not in the cards. She is an activist, she said, because "it is the right thing to do."

Get your friends together. Come for the weekend, come for an afternoon, but be there. Have a great time and get counted.

2) Let those who vote against us know of your displeasure. Senator Kohl along with Congressmen Barca, Kleczka, Klug, Roth, Sensenbrenner, Obey and Petri voted to put the ban on Gays in the military on the statute books. Let them know what your think of the

If you don't know how to do that, just grab your phone book and look up their numbers in the Federal Government section. Give them a call, or better yet, send them a letter.

3) Boycott Zima and other Coors products. As shown in the last issue of Wisconsin Light any LesBiGay who purchases Coors is funding our enemies.

If you really can't march, at least stand on the curb in support of those who can. Join in at the end of the March and follow the parade to the PrideFest grounds at the War Memorial Center. A Pride Parade with 3,000 to 4,000 people in it isn't much by some big city standards, but that would constitute a major demonstration here. It would be noticed.

The point is that if you look over this list, you can see that none of these actions take a lot of time or effort. They are just common sense things that we need to do in order to change people's attitudes.

We have to get out of the mode of thinking "It would be nice if..." We have to start making those "ifs" into reality. And we need to do that now.
