Gay Republicans Hold National Convention As Dole Returns Money

Cincinnati—A Gay Republican organization decided to embrace rather than boycott this city that has been a battleground over Gay civil rights.

The Log Cabin Federation held its three-day national convention beginning Friday, August 25, at a downtown hotel.

"Coming to Cincinnati is absolutely the right thing to do," Abner Mason, president of the federation, said. "Let's sit down and talk. Let's sit down and figure out what we have in common and what we differ on, and how we can live with that."

Richard Tafel, the group's executive director, told a community forum that the organization's mission is "education, not confrontation."

Some Gay activists urged an economic boycott of Cincinnati after voters in 1993 amended the city charter to forbid enactment or enforcement of any laws based on sexual orientation. The vote rescinded part of a 1992 human-rights ordinance that forbade discrimination against Gay people in housing, employment and public accommodations.

At least three organizations canceled conventions in Cincinnati in response to the charter amendment. A federal court battle over the 1993 ballot initiative could end up in the U.S. Supreme Court.

"It's very easy to boycott a city," said Tafel, a Baptist minister who graduated from Harvard Divinity School. "It's high moral ground ... but it does not move us forward. All we're saying is, we want to be treated fairly."

Phil Burress, chairman of Equal Rights, Not Special Rights, the coalition that backed the 1993 charter amendment, said Wednesday, August 23, he had not spoken with the Log Cabin Republicans.

Burress said Gays in Cincinnati are subject to the same treatment as other groups; the 1993 vote was about repealing special rights for "those people," he said.

Log Cabin delegates planned to talk with Cincinnati politicians, business executives and religious leaders who are both for and against Gay civil rights.

The Washington-based federation was founded in 1978 in the San Francisco area. Its membership grew in 1992 after GOP presidential candidate Pat Buchanan criticized gays as contributing to moral decline in America, Tafel said.

The federation has about 10,000 members and 43 chapters in 35 states.

Federal Judge Won't Overrule Wisconsin High Court in Lesbian Visitation Suit

Madison—A Madison Lesbian trying to prevent her former partner from getting child-visitation rights appears to have lost a bid to have a federal judge intervene in the matter.

U.S. District Judge John Shabaz refused Wednesday, August 23, to block the visitation, saying he most likely has no authority to rule unconstitutional a landmark Wisconsin Supreme Court decision in the case last June.

Shabaz, declining to take any immediate action, said he expected to issue his final decision within a week.

The Supreme Court's 4-3 decision said Gays and Lesbians have the right to seek the visitation rights.

As reported in *Light*, the case involves Elisabeth Knott, who had a child through artificial insemination in December 1988.

After she and her partner, Sandy Holtzman, ended their 10-year relationship in 1993, Knott told Holtzman she could no longer see the child, but Holtzman has fought to be granted visitation rights, contending she helped raise the boy as a son.

Knott's lawyer, Charles Schutze, told Shabaz that the state high court had acted as a legislature in interfering with Knott's constitutional right to raise her child as she sees fit.

"This case is a prime example of why cre-

ating law should be left to the Legislature and not to the Wisconsin Supreme Court," Schutze wrote in his court brief.

Schutze urged Shabaz to bar Dane County Circuit Judge George Northrup from granting visitation rights to Holtzman.

But Holtzman's lawyer, Judith Sperling Newton, and assistant attorney general James McDermott argued that Knott had to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court if she wanted to contest the Wisconsin Supreme Court decision.

Shabaz said he was almost certain that Newton and McDermott were right.

Schutze wouldn't say whether he plans to appeal the state high court decision to the U.S. Supreme Court.

10,000 Pre-Register for AIDS Walk Wisconsin VP Al Gore and Tipper Gore Help Generate Record Turnout

Milwaukee—With more than two weeks yet to go before the September 17 AIDS Walk Wisconsin, registrations for the huge AIDS event are running twice as high as last year.

The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) reports that with just over 10,000 people having pre-registered, a record crowd that could reach as high as 15,000 will be on hand for the Sixth Annual AIDS Walk.

A major reason for the increasing support for the AIDS Walk this year is the unique leadership given by its honorary chairs Vice President Al Gore and Tipper Gore.

"I'm looking forward to being at AIDS Walk Wisconsin and sharing the spirit of compassion and commitment with the concerned citizens who will be part of this important day," Tipper Gore told *Wisconsin Light*.

"I will be in Milwaukee on September 17, to do my part to call attention to AIDS as an epidemic that touches people everywhere," Gore continued. "The Midwest is no exception. This tragic disease knows no geographic bounds and it affects us all."

"Registrations are double what they were a year ago and the number of teams are at least three times higher," said ARCW Executive Director Doug Nelson.

"The AIDS Walk this year could well become Wisconsin's largest fund-raising event for any cause," Nelson said. "We're thrilled that it's AIDS that is generating such a huge, positive response from the community," Nelson said.

Nelson reported that over 800 teams are now registered with from two to over 200 members per team.

"This year we are seeing intense competition among teams for the top prizes," Nelson said. "There are teams from big corporations, health care systems, Gay and Lesbian bars, and families, all of which are working hard to get pledges and raise money."

Nelson reported that such team building is the strategy that has made AIDS walks in large cities around the country generate millions of dollars.

"Especially in Milwaukee the number of teams have skyrocketed this year, which is a great sign that we are going to raise record amounts of funds," Nelson said.

Nelson praised Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian bars for their support of the Walk.

"The owners and the employees of the bars have been terrific in helping us rally support for the Walk," Nelson said. "We have never had this much support before we are very grateful."

Debate Over Cross-Species Transplants Enters The AIDS Arena

San Antonio, TX—Residents of the world's largest baboon colony here have donated a heart and two livers to humans in the past. Now, researchers and doctors will try bone marrow.

A 7-year-old baboon was picked up by University of Pittsburgh officials in the third week in August from the Southwest Center for Biomedical Research to extract its bone marrow. The marrow, material in bones that produces blood, is intended for a Jeff Getty, 38, an AIDS patient from Oakland, California.

The experimental procedure, formulated by Pittsburgh researchers, was tried in 1992 on a 56-year-old AIDS patient, but the graft didn't take and the man died a few weeks later.

The upcoming attempt was approved in late June of this year by a federal advisory panel that said it wanted to see whether the baboon's marrow cells, which naturally resist the AIDS virus, will merge with the human cells to form a hybrid immune system that could fight off the disease.

The operation could take place as soon as late September in San Francisco.

"I think even though most of the panelists had strong reservations and felt it shouldn't go forward in general, they felt that since it was only one patient and his family was there, then

what the heck," said panelist Jonathan Allen. "My concern is, once you've allowed one, you've essentially opened the door."

Allen is one of the nation's most vocal critics of cross-species transplants. He believes AIDS itself was at some point passed from monkeys to humans, he said, and fears further maladies via such tissue transplants.

Such a fear prompted foundation officials to search for a "cleaner" baboon than the two already in Pittsburgh and approved for use. The Olive baboon awaiting the trip north has fewer simian viruses than most of the group's 3,065 baboons, said foundation spokesman Stacy Maloney.

He said the animal, which likely will die from the procedure, will have to be approved by the federal government for the operation in San Francisco.

"Hopefully (the marrow) will boost his immune system," Maloney said. "In theory it's interesting, but there's no data to support it. You can liken this to frontier medicine."

The foundation, which began in 1958, has experience in using baboons for human tissue donations. A month-old California infant dubbed Baby Fae held the world's attention 11

National News Briefs

NEA Grant Brings AIDS Quilt To Washington

San Francisco—The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) has contributed \$20,000 to help bring the entire NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt to Washington, D.C. October 11-13, 1996. As the first major contribution specifically earmarked for the monumental 1996 display, the NEA grant kicks off The NAMES Project's aggressive fundraising campaign for the DC96 display. This is the second time the NEA has helped fund a display of the Quilt in Washington.

"The 1996 display of the Quilt in Washington, D.C. will serve as a lasting and living memorial to an epidemic we pray will end soon," said Jane Alexander, Chair of the NEA. "Almost a year ago, I visited the home of The NAMES Project in San Francisco. The AIDS Memorial Quilt was folded carefully on shelf after shelf after shelf, each panel stitched lovingly by a friend or family with a name, a date and an artistry which bespeaks a thousand words."

"During national elections crucial to the well-being of people with HIV and to the pace of AIDS research, this display of the Quilt will focus the eyes of our leaders on the need for every individual in this country to bring an end to AIDS," said Anthony Turney, Executive Director of The NAMES Project Foundation.

Update on Hawaii

Honolulu-AP—The head of a state commission studying the issue of same-sex marriage says it may be hard to come up with a set of recommendations within the four month time period set by the governor. The panel, headed by former governor Tom Gill, is supposed to report to lawmakers before the start of the next legislative session on whether same-sex couples should have the same legal and economic benefits afforded straight couples.

Ward Stewart, a Gay activist, said that he doubted that the commission would come up with any recommendations, no matter how much time they are given.

Work Showing Promise in Delaying AIDS Onset

Tucson, AZ-AP—Preliminary research on mice is showing promise in delaying the onset of AIDS and may hold hope for prolonging the lives of HIV-infected people, University of Arizona researchers say. Through the use of amino acids, mice injected with a mouse AIDS virus were able to fight the damage to their immune systems, said Ronald Watson, a professor of family and community medicine in Tucson.

However, Watson stressed that this potential new treatment is not a cure. "Mice still are infected, and they still will die, but the treatment should be able to keep them alive longer. He added that experiments on humans could be done now, but are many dollars away.

The treatment involves synthesizing a clump of a body's amino acid (called a peptide), removing it and then reintroducing it into the bloodstream. This causes the overworking immune system to slow down because the peptide is disruptive.

Watson explained that when the HIV virus is in the body, the immune system fights it constantly, eventually breaking down from overuse—a key cause of AIDS.

Developer Says Drug May Stop Spread of AIDS

Tokyo-AP—A new drug has shown promise in limiting the spread of the AIDS virus and will be subjected to expanded human tests in the U.S., one of the developers said. Japan Tobacco, Inc., said the drug, AG-1343, showed the ability to block enzymes involved in the multiplication of the AIDS virus, HIV, in limited human tests in Britain. The drug is being developed by Agouron Pharmaceuticals Inc., of La Jolla, California, and Japan Tobacco, Japan's government-owned cigarette maker. If the trials go well, the firms plan to seek approval for the drug from the U.S. Drug Administration next year and put it on the market in 1997.

Existing drugs that block the spread of HIV tend to have major side effects with large doses.

Non-Discrimination Law Passed in Virginia Beach

Virginia Beach, VA-AP—The city of Virginia Beach, home to Pat Robertson's media empire, has joined a handful of others in Virginia to protect its Gay and Lesbian employees against job discrimination and sexual harassment. Though the decision has pleased Gays and Lesbians, one local pastor says he hopes to collect "thousands of signatures" to convince the City Council to reverse the policy amendment.

"I think they city of Virginia Beach has enough problems without trying to protect the sodomites," said Rev. Rod Bell of the Tabernacle Baptist Church. "They're contrary to the word of god." Gay activists in Robertson's city do not see much chance that Bell will be successful.

Mugabe Condemns U.S. Congressmen and is Condemned in South Africa in Turn

Harare, Zimbabwe—When President Robert Mugabe denounced Gay people as "sodomists and sexual perverts" and banned an exhibit of Gay-themed books at a book fair, he shocked some participants and sparked a boycott.

But it was mostly foreigners who protested, displaying the wide disparity in Zimbabwe between traditional African culture and Western libertarian values.

"He took the populist approach. He knew he was on safe ground domestically," said Ozias Tungwarara, executive director of the independent Zimbabwe Human Rights Association. "Most of our people will say homosexuality is abhorrent."

Like much of Black Africa, Zimbabwe has wrestled with growing Western influence brought by television, films and the sway of donor nations and aid groups that purposefully or unintentionally promote their values.

One of Africa's largest book fairs, which opened August 1 in Harare, put the conflicting views face-to-face.

The Gay and Lesbian Association, in sponsoring the exhibit, said it was trying to increase awareness of how Zimbabwean Gays are shunned due to centuries of prejudice. The group disputes claims that being Gay is "un-African" and a foreign influence, pointing out the local Shona language had a word, "ngochani" for homosexual before the colonial era brought foreign settlers.

Rejection of homosexuality is deeply rooted, said Peter Sibanda, an official of the Traditional Healers Association.

Ancient Zimbabwean culture demands that couples marry and raise children early in adulthood. "If this does not happen, you become a social outcast," he said.

Mugabe on Friday, August 18, lashed out against a protest letter from 70 U.S. congressmen accusing him of bigotry.

"Let the Americans keep their sodomy, bestiality, stupid and foolish ways to themselves," Mugabe told ruling party supporters. "Let the Gays be Gays in the United States and Europe."

Human rights groups in Zimbabwe say Mugabe, who has ruled since white minority rule ended in 1980, has used the Gay issue to draw attention from official graft and worsening economic hardships.

In South Africa

On Saturday, August 26, Mugabe arrived in South Africa to jeers and catcalls from hundreds of Gay protesters and their allies.

Mugabe, who was in South Africa for the August 28 summit of the Southern African Development Community, brushed past reporters and ignored shouted questions. He slipped out a rear exit and sped away in a limousine, taking a back road into Johannesburg to avoid demonstrators who were lined up along the main airport road.

Phumi Mtetwa, a 22 year-old student and leader of the Gay and Lesbian Organization of the Witwatersrand, said Mugabe's arrival could have a salutary effect on Mugabe.

"He must come to this country and learn from the human rights culture here," she said.

In contrast to their hostility to Mugabe, the demonstrators repeatedly voiced approval for South African President Nelson Mandela, whose African National Congress insisted on including clause in the post-apartheid constitution guaranteeing equal rights for Gay people.

South Africa is the only country in the world whose fundamental law expressly forbids discrimination based on sexual orientation.

Dole (R-KS), reputed front runner for the GOP nomination to the presidency had returned a contribution of \$1,000 to the group.

According to Nelson Warfield, a Dole campaign spokesman, the money was being returned because the Senator does not agree with Log Cabin's views on the issues.

"It is our policy to decline contributions from political groups that have an agenda that is not in line with Senator Dole's position on the issues," Warfield said. He added that the check hadn't been returned before because it had "slipped through the cracks."

Rich Tafel, Executive Director of Log Cabin voiced disappointment at the Senator's unexpected action.

"We were encouraged by the Dole campaign for months to support them financially, and any indication that they were unaware of our involvement is dishonest."

Deb Price, a journalist whose column about Lesbian and Gay issues appears in *The Detroit Free Press* and other newspapers, wrote in her column that Dole's campaign decided to give the money back two days after learning she would be writing about the contribution.

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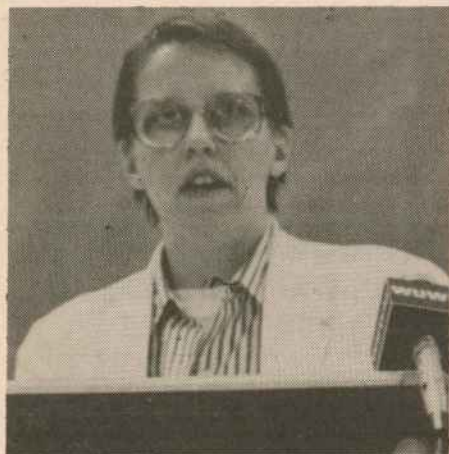

Jamakaya to Receive Community Activist Award from Progressive Milwaukee

Milwaukee—Jamakaya, the well-known local journalist whose columns have appeared in *Wisconsin Light* for over seven years, has been selected for a Community Activist Award from Progressive Milwaukee. The award will be presented by State Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison). Jamakaya will be honored with other progressive activists at the group's dinner on September 30.

"Jamakaya's politics are as well-crafted as her articles," said Tammy Johnson, Progressive Milwaukee organizer. "Her activism over the last 20 years has made important connections between the LesBiGay, feminist and labor movements. That's important work that needs to be recognized."

Jamakaya's political work began at UW-Milwaukee in the mid-1970's, where she was active in women's health issues, marches for the Equal Rights Amendment, pro-choice pickets and other noisy protests for women's rights.

Her love of words and background as a historian soon introduced her to the power of journalism as an arbiter of justice. From 1979 to 1983, she published and edited *Amazon: Milwaukee's Feminist Press*.

Her brand of journalism didn't keep her out of the fray. After publishing a picture of a "Wanted" poster of the much-hated Police Chief Harold Breier on the cover of *Amazon*, she found herself an object of harassment, receiving 4 jay-walking tickets in a two month

period.

Jamakaya also came to write for *Wisconsin Light* and *In Step Magazine*. Her extensive coverage of the Jeffrey Dahmer case won her a journalism award from the Gay Press Association in San Francisco.

She also directed the Women's Alternative Health Clinic at the Brady East STD Clinic for three years and was a founding member of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMMM).

Twenty years after becoming an activist, Jamakaya's commitment hasn't let up. She recently assumed the role of editor of *In Step* and is busy completing an oral history project on women in the Wisconsin labor movement.

While she says she'll continue her work, recognized or not, she seemed pleased by the award and the stature of its presenter.

"I'm very grateful," she said, "and flattered by this award, especially because it recognizes the range of my writing and political work. And I am floored that Tammy Baldwin is coming down to Milwaukee just to present me with this award. That's way cool."

The award to Jamakaya marks the first time an out Lesbian has won the award. At the organization's last awards ceremony, AIDS activist Christopher Fons, was among those honored.

Jamakaya will be honored along with five other Milwaukee activists at the Progressive Milwaukee Dinner and Awards Celebration to be held Saturday, September 30, at 6:00 p.m., at the International Building, 611 W. National Avenue.

The five others to be honored are: Rep. Spencer Coggs (D-Milwaukee) for leading the fight for justice in Milwaukee and Madison; MacCanon Brown for her efforts to keep Wisconsin Avenue open and prevent low-income people from being displaced; the Coalition for Justice at Steeltech/United Electrical Workers Local 1127 for organizing a successful drive for better conditions and union representation for central city workers; Eloisa Gomez for her role in expanding the voice of near-south side residents in economic decision making; and Ollie Thompson as Volunteer of the Year for a lifetime of service to the community.

HRL to Sponsor Candace Gingrich at Town Hall Meeting in Milwaukee in October

Milwaukee—Candace Gingrich, half-sister of Speaker of the House, Newt Gingrich, is touring the country as a spokeswoman for the National Coming Out Project of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. She has visited 31 cities since April, speaking to LesBiGay groups about ending the discrimination that afflicts this community.

Now, she is coming to Milwaukee.

Ms. Gingrich will be the featured speakers at a Town Hall Meeting and Reception on Wednesday, October 4, 1995. The Town Hall Meeting is being sponsored by Milwaukee's Human Rights League for Lesbians and Gays (HRL).

The meeting will be held at Centennial Hall, 733 N. 8th Street beginning at 6:30 p.m.

In her Milwaukee speech, Ms. Gingrich will continue, as she has done nation-wide, to challenge Gay men and Lesbians to be more public about their sexual orientation and their identity.

"When people know someone who is Gay or Lesbian," she said, "they're more supportive of the issues, they're more understanding of the issues."

Following her hour-long presentation, HRL will host an informal reception for her and the LesBiGay community. Refreshments will be served and community members will have the opportunity to speak with her. Photo opportunities will also be available.

Tim Baack, a spokesman for HRL, said that Ms. Gingrich's visit to Milwaukee is an important reminder of the need for Lesbians, Gay men and Bisexuals to use their coming out as a means to advocate for their civil rights.

"It is critical that each of us strive to bring together the personal with the political as we come out to family and friends," Baack said. "In doing so, we remind those who wish to silence us that we will continue to fight for our basic human rights, our equal rights as citizens of this country. By coming out, we send the message that discrimination, hate and violence against us will not be allowed to continue."

In Arkansas

Speaking in Little Rock, Ms. Gingrich was asked about her brother's statements on Gay people.

She responded that "They no longer hurt," but she does "feel angry." Even so, she said, "I personally do not think that Newt my brother is a homophobic person. However, that's not reflected in his public policy."

Speaker Gingrich, who had left home and was married by the time his sister was born, has compared homosexuality to alcoholism or nearsightedness. He also has spoken against a

bill she supports, one that would prohibit firing individuals from their jobs because they are Gay.

Gingrich is considered presidential material, but Ms. Gingrich has said she will not vote for him if he does run. She told her Little Rock audience that she probably will support President Clinton in his bid for re-election next year. She said she voted for him in 1992.

"I'm not going to support any candidate who doesn't support equal rights for Gays and Lesbians no matter what party they're from, no matter who they are," she said.

Ms. Gingrich has spoken to thousands of people on her tour around the country, holding town meetings and urging others to come forward about their sexual orientation. She said she realizes the risks involved, but added, "I don't think we really gain things of importance in our lives until we risk something."

Most recently, she said, a Gay teacher in Rochester, NY, came out after speaking with her. He appeared on a television news broadcast that evening, she said, and to her knowledge has not suffered any repercussions.

"He said 'I want to do this.' He's an educator and one thing as an educator he was basically bound to do is to dispel ignorance," she said.

At the meetings on her nationwide tour, she tells her story of coming out.

In general, she said, "My being a Lesbian dispels a lot of myths and misconceptions that people have about Gays and where they come from, what families they come from. If you listen to a lot of the Radical Right leaders you would think that we live under rocks or hide in caves somewhere, and we come from dysfunctional, broken, bad homes. What I think this shows a lot of people is that Gays and Lesbians are part of the American family."

Ms. Gingrich said she planned to visit about 50 cities.

Applause for the ACLU

The Wisconsin chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is to be praised for taking the lead in fighting public moneys being distributed to support religious schools. The idea of tax dollars going to support sectarian schools is one dear to the heart of the Religious Right and to State Rep. Annette (Polly) Williams (never a friend to the LesBiGay community) and it has to be stopped and stopped here. Otherwise it will spread nationwide.

We find it difficult to think that in those religious schools, Gay people will be treated honorably and well. On the contrary, we think that Gay teens who go to those schools—and there will be many—will suffer badly, and we along with them as homophobic bigotry is elevated from vice to virtue.

We find it difficult to think that there will be adequate sex education beyond abstinence and guilt. In this age of AIDS, this is intolerable.

We find it difficult to think that in many of those schools, valid scientific theory will not be obscured by mythology.

There can be no quarrel with people having their own schools where their particular choice of faith is taught. But people who do not choose that faith should not be made to support its diffusion—especially when it harms them. In other words, as someone said, "Believe what you want, but not on my dollar."

Gay people—and progressive people everywhere—have a vested interest in seeing that public moneys—their money—does not go to support religious schools. We applaud the ACLU and the other groups as they carry on their fight to preserve the American system of public schools.

The Time Has Come

Madison does it all the time.

Milwaukee should do it too: elect an open Lesbian or Gay man to public office.

As luck would have it, a golden opportunity has presented itself to do exactly that. The Third Aldermanic District seat is up for grabs. A great many LesBiGay people live there, enough to put in "one of our own," if everyone just gets out and votes.

We have said before that those public officials who are Gay-friendly, ones who are sympathetic to our issues and our cause of equal rights, are great. They're indispensable. But having said that, we remain convinced that all things being equal, we should choose to support someone who is openly "us."

We remain convinced that no matter how Gay-friendly someone might be, if they are not themselves Lesbian or Gay and are not out, then they cannot really understand, really feel in their gut, what it means to be one of us.

One openly Gay man has already thrown his hat in the ring in that District. We commend him, but we think that competition is a good thing and there should be more.

We heartily encourage all who are openly Lesbian or Gay to run for that seat.

The time has come, long since come, for Milwaukee to have an open Lesbian or Gay man in public office.

Remembering the Cream City Foundation

It may be hard to believe, but the cool, crisp, metallic days of Autumn are fast upon us. With them comes the Donor Choice Program, our opportunity to support deserving organizations in their work throughout the year. One of those organizations is the Cream City Foundation.

The Foundation—or CCF—seldom boasts of what it does, but its work in our community is broad and indispensable, making grants to groups and organizations so that that allows them to carry on.

For example, there are approximately 20 people intending to go to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force's Creating Change Conference in Detroit. Here, community activists receive needed training and information for the battle for our civil rights. The Foundation granted them \$3,000 so that they might go.

For example, one of the best things to come to our city in a long time is the LesBiGay history exhibit, "Long Road to Freedom," sponsored by PrideFest and Attorney Steve Brondino. There will be a gala opening in Milwaukee's City Hall on September 5. To make the opening truly memorable, CCF gave a grant of \$1,000.

These are but two examples of the Foundation's work that includes making PrideFest itself possible.

Please keep the Cream City Foundation and its work in mind when you are asked to give. In our opinion, there is no organization in our community more worthy of your support.

Juneau Park

TO THE EDITOR:

Editor's Note: The following letter was sent also to Milwaukee Police Chief Philip Arreola, and Mayor John Norquist among others.

Though I have not personally witnessed the pogrom you are conducting in Juneau Park, I've heard a number of accounts of it, some from observers whose reliability I trust.

The pogrom apparently has been in progress since at least Thursday, August 10, according to one observer. Two observers say they saw 7 officers, 5 men and 2 women, leaving the park one afternoon at the end of their entrapment shift.

The resources you spend on this sort of thing, and conducting it at all, are a matter of political policy for you and Mayor Norquist to decide, and I won't comment on that.

There is, however, one alarming report I've heard. This is that in the course of your entrapment activity, a victim groped one of your decoys and was immediately thrown to the ground by that decoy and later handled very roughly by other officers. I can't vouch for those facts nor locate the person who mentioned the incident originally. I mention it because if it's true, it shows poor behavior on the part of your officers.

When a police decoy is trying to entrap someone into a sexual offense, that officer should be trained to expect that physical contact is likely and should not use such contact as an excuse for brutality. If the officers you have assigned to entrapment duty cannot handle it, I suggest you get rid of them.

One sometimes wonders if you have control over

your department in certain areas. For example, I previously wrote you (November 4, 1992) about an officer who was violating a city ordinance by taking a dog to Juneau Park. Sgt. Clasen reported to me that the matter was under investigation. I can believe there was an investigation, for the next time I saw the offending officer in the park, he gave me a dirty look. However, he again had his dog in the park in violation of our city ordinance.

If the lack of discipline shown by the officer with the dog is typical of your department, then I'm inclined to believe the account of the entrapment decoy who used the touch by his victim as an excuse for unwarranted brutality.

What Price Equality?

I have been an activist in the LesBiGay community for over 12 years. I have worked in numerous organizations. I and others in the community have been striving for equality in every avenue possible.

So you can imagine my surprise and elation when several years ago I saw my first copy of the "Shocking Gray" mail order catalogue for the Les-BiGay community. Finally, I thought to myself, our community rates high enough and someone out there was out enough to go after our community's business. A catalogue just for us: with items designed just for us.

How expensive the prices were too! Well, I thought, it is a Gay business, besides there were no local businesses in Milwaukee selling these items, at that time. I thought I should be supportive.

So I placed my first order. It went off without a hitch. I received my merchandise and was very happy.

Then came the following orders I placed. My second order was a bit larger and I had friends of mine order things with my order. After waiting about three months and not hearing a word, I called Shocking Gray to ask about my order. To put it nicely, they were not very organized.

After a couple of transfers and call backs, I found out some items were on back order, a pitfall with any mail order catalogue. So, I waited for them to fill my order.

Two more months went by and still nothing. I called again. Finally, I received part of my order along with an apology and two \$5 gift certificates for my troubles. I thought, what a nice way to say "I am sorry." However, I was still undecided whether I wanted to do business with them again.

About one year went by and several catalogues later. I decided to use those gift certificates before they expired. So, I placed another order. What a mistake. I waited for about three months without hearing anything from Shocking Gray, then I received a mailing telling me that everything I ordered was on back order.

So, I waited again. Three more months and I decided to call. Again, confusion reigned supreme. Shocking Gray thought some of the items were already sent. I told them they were not. They stated that they would get back to me.

After about a month, I had to call them back. Still more confusion. At this point I was getting upset. So I asked to talk to someone in charge. I was transferred to accounting. After going through all that had happened to me, not only on this order, but with the previous order as well, I was assured that the items I had ordered would be sent in a couple of weeks.

So I waited—and waited—and waited. Three months went by and nothing, not a mailing, not a call, nothing. So, I called them back. Again I was transferred to accounting. I soon found out that she is the only person in accounting.

After she was able to find my order, she stated that the items were on back order. By this time, I had had it. I requested my money back, all of it, including the gift certificates. She stated that Shocking

Gray would cut me a check and mail it out in a couple of weeks.

Needless to say I never received the check and after I called twice again, I still have not received the check. So, I placed a written complaint with the State. They are no trying to deal with Shocking Gray.

The point to all this is simple. Neither I nor anyone in our community should be treated this way. And we should not be supporting any business, straight or Gay, that cannot show its customers respect. There are now enough local LesBiGay businesses that want our business that this community need not support companies like Shocking Gray.

I hope that no one else is experiencing this from Shocking Gray, but if you are, please file a complaint with the State. This way, if enough complaints come through, maybe we can put Shocking Gray out of business.

And for the rest of the community, I hope you all learn from my mistake and DO NOT order anything from Shocking Gray. Spend your money with the local businesses like: AfterWords, Designing Men, and Tie Me Down, just to name a few. Our money is power. Spend it wisely.

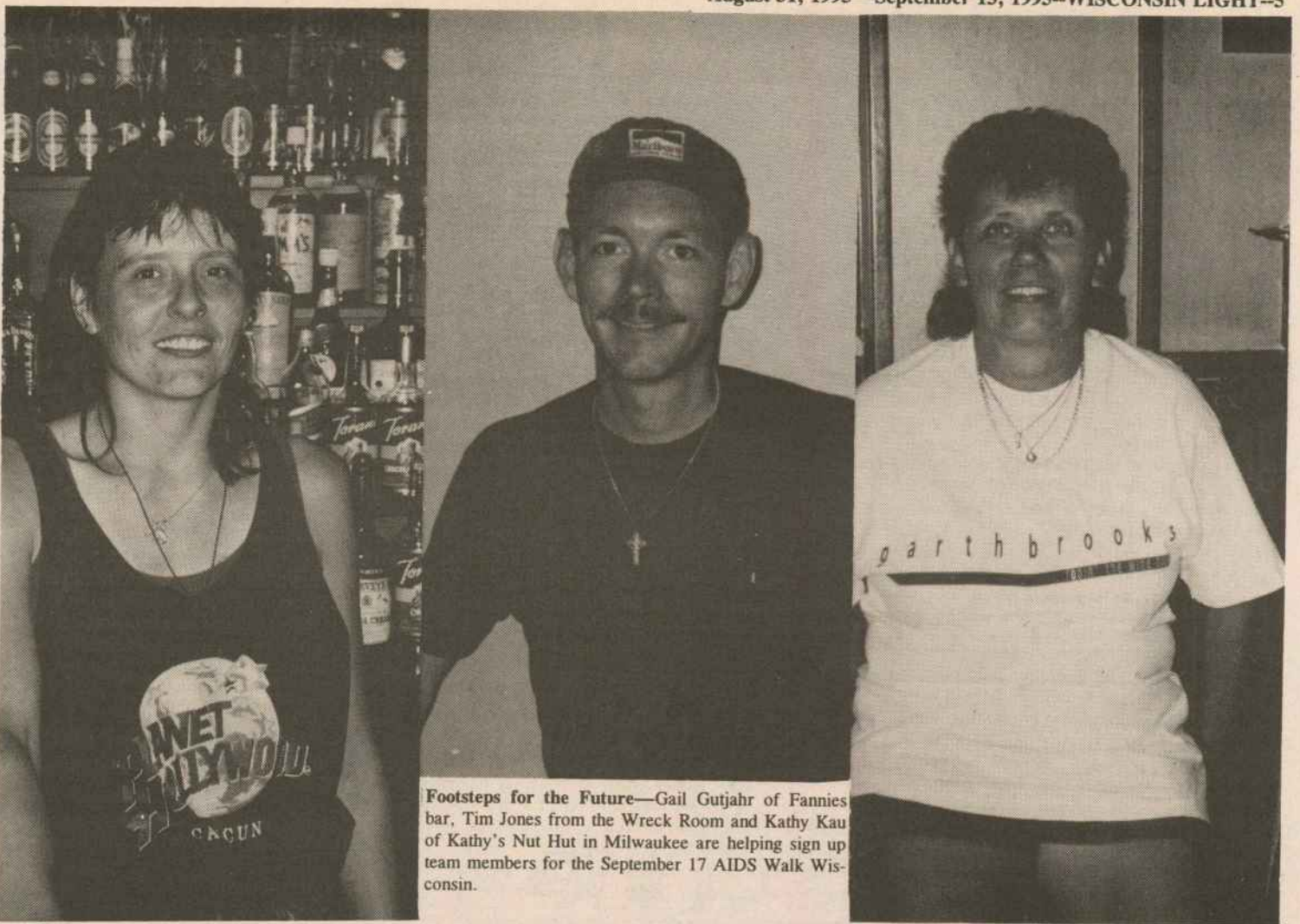

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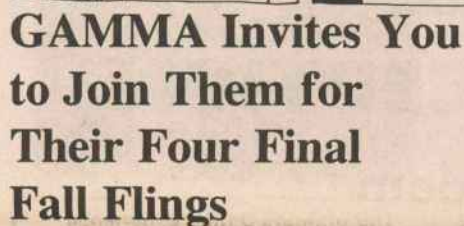

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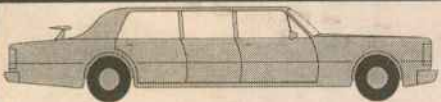

'Wong Foo,' is One of the Funniest Movies Since 'La Cage'

Take a spoonful of **La Cage Aux Folles**, and add a healthy heaping of **Priscilla Queen of the Desert** and you have **To Wong Foo 'Thanks for Everything' Julie Newmar**.

This rollicking romp is sort of a **Wizard of Oz** in reverse. Instead of Dorothy going from the drab countryside of Kansas, its Oz escaping to the drab countryside of Nebraska.

There are obvious parallels between **Wong Foo** and **Priscilla**.

Where **Priscilla** is at times dark and pessimistic, **Wong Foo** is a light hearted, thoroughly entertaining look at the eccentricities in all of us Gay and straight.

When Noxema (Wesley Snipes) and Vita (Patrick Swayze) tie for first place in a Drag contest in New York they win a trip to Hollywood. While celebrating they run across one of the losers, Chi Chi (John Leguizamo) Vita takes pity on Chi Chi and invites her to join them in their trip.

This of course means cashing in their tickets (purchased by a hysterical Robin Williams) and taking a Caddy across country to Tinsel Town.

Along they way they leave a Sheriff laying in the road (wondering if he dead), anoint Chi Chi as a "drag princess" (because "they are four steps to being crowned a drag queen") and have a good old time.

Good that is until the inevitable breakdown of their car which lands them in Syndersville Nebraska.

It is here that the movie really takes off as the three bring out the best in cast of townspeople most of whom are just as abnormal as the three heroines.

The three come up with a theme for the towns big event of the year the annual Strawberry Pie party, "Red and Wild". They take over the local beauty parlor and do makeovers on the towns women, beat up an abusive husband and help a young girl find her true love.

Meanwhile the Sheriff is trying to track down the three "homos" checking out floral shops, and ballet schools. All this sets up a hilarious Strawberry Pie Party confrontation between him and the townspeople.

Wong Foo tells us that deep down inside we are what we are and only by being ourselves can we ever achieve acceptance. Its a worthwhile message and a very entertaining messenger.

A Pow-Wow is an event where American Indian people gather to renew old friendships and make new ones through traditional Indian songs and colorful dances. Because the Indian Summer Festival Pow-Wow is a competition pow-wow, it draws drummers, singers and dancers from many Indian nations throughout the country. And during "intertribal" dance, all are invited to join in.

On the festival's five entertainment stages, contemporary American Indian performers cover the range of musical tastes from country to blues to jazz to rock. Past headliners include national personalities Buffy St. Marie, Rita Coolidge and Crystal Gayle.

Saturday is again Country Night, with a fiddle and jig contest and line dancing added to the line up.

In the cultural area, American Indian artists from across the U.S. share their traditions and skills. Featured artistry includes basket weaving, wood and stone carving, fingerweaving, horsehair art, beadwork and totem pole carving.

Cultural performers add to the uniqueness of the festival, with hoop and social dancing, magic and more. Demonstrations and a tournament bring the action of the original American Indian sport, lacrosse, to the festival.

An environmental area focuses on preserving the earth and its creatures.

The fine arts and crafts area features American Indian-inspired works for browsing and buying.

Another popular part of the festival is the traditional Indian villages, where authentic dwellings are re-created.

Festival goers can sample some American Indian favorites such as Indian fry bread, Indian tacos and buffalo burgers.

In the vendor area, more than 70 Indian traders from all over the country will offer an array of American Indian handiwork, publications and other merchandise.

'The Usual Suspects' is an Unusual Film that Provides More the Second Time Around

Los Angeles— In the press notes for *The Usual Suspects*, the director speculates that viewers will enjoy his film even more the second time. That's because you need a scorecard to keep track of this densely knotted thriller the first time around.

Like trying to wriggle out of a tightly bound rope in the dark, this slick neo-noir pulls and tugs in several directions at once, and each twist comes cluttered with clues, and people with strange names and possible motives. And with a time-line that jumps all over the place, the plot becomes as convoluted as a compulsive liar's imagination.

Clever, perhaps too clever for its own good, *The Usual Suspects* ultimately pays off with a darkly satisfying punch line. Problem is, you might get too lost along the way to enjoy it.

What makes this film so engaging, despite its muddled storyline, is the caliber of the ensemble cast, the thug "suspects" of the title: Gabriel Byrne as Keaton, a flinty ex-cop turned thief trying to stay out of trouble; Stephen Baldwin as the fiery McManus; Kevin Pollak as smart-mouthed Hockney; and the mumbling Fenster (Benicio Del Toro).

As he recounts his movements during an interrogation by U.S. Customs Agent David Kujan, played with ferocious intensity by Chazz Palminteri. Verbal takes us on preposterous flashbacks that account for the first meeting of the five conspirators: a lineup of the usual suspects.

As the five sit stewing overnight in a holding cell, they plan a retaliatory jewel heist from a corrupt police smuggling ring. That sets in motion a series of crimes the five are compelled to commit, which ends when they blow up a boat that's supposedly laden with \$ 91 million in cocaine. The explosion leaves behind 27 charred bodies with only two survivors. One is a badly burned Hungarian gangster who can only mutter the name "Keyser Soze." The other is Verbal.

The fiery spectacle of the burning boat serves as both the opening scene and the last installment of Verbal's outrageous narration.

Verbal is pathetic as he details these wanton activities; he's obviously too stupid and too enfeebled to have committed them. And just who is this Keyser Soze, anyway? According to Verbal, he's a crime boss so notorious he'd

tactic and one that easily could backfire by alienating viewers. But it's the final scene that redeems *The Usual Suspects*, a moment that draws chuckles and "if-only-I'd-seen-it-coming" gasps and groans.

And as the director predicts, you'll certainly enjoy this film even more the second time around.

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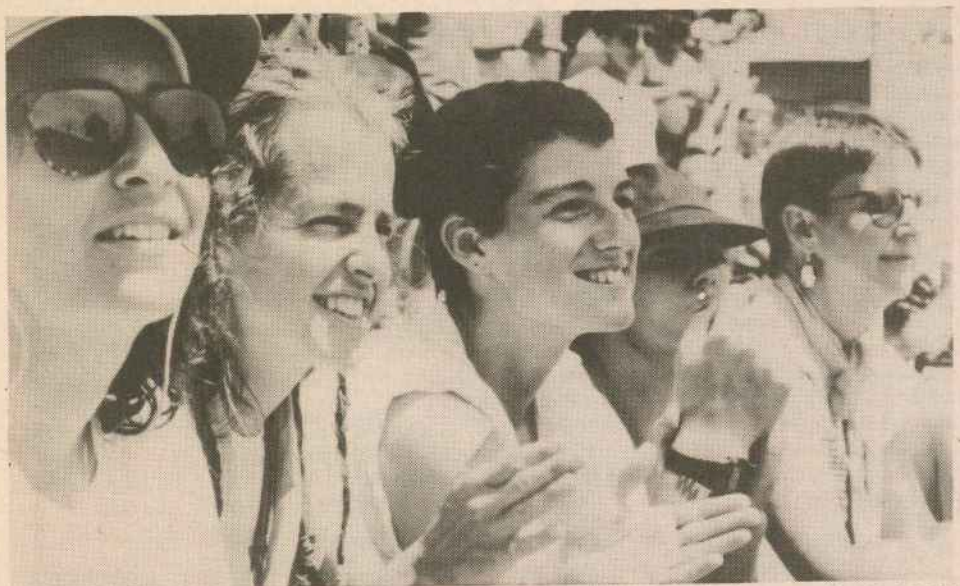

'Ballot Measure 9' Might Just Be the Most Frightening Movie You See This Year

When we were first given press information on **Ballot Measure 9**, there was a glimmer of hope that Heather MacDonald's film might be some sort of takeoff on that marvelous Ed Wood masterpiece **Plan 9 From Outer Space**. After all, both are independently made horror flicks spotlighting the bleakness of the American landscape.

Sadly, neither Vampira nor Ed Wood's trademark angora sweaters are anywhere to be found. Instead, MacDonald has turned her camera on some truly frightening creatures. No phony costumes or cheesy makeup, these every-so-scary creatures look just like the people next door. There's a good reason for this. They are.

In fact, **Ballot Measure 9** might just be the most frightening film that most Lesbians and Gay men might see this year.

Ballot Measure 9 tells the fascinating and frightening story of the 1992 anti-Gay initiative in Oregon that sought to prevent and revoke laws which protect Lesbians and Gay men from discrimination.

Before groaning sets in, stop. Forget that Heather MacDonald's film is actually one of those dreaded documentaries. Without any media hype or big name personalities anywhere to be found, **Ballot Measure 9** is a movie that deserves an audience.

In 1992, Fundamentalist groups organized test cases in Oregon and in Colorado, seeking to revoke laws protecting Gay men and Lesbians from discrimination. Unlike Colorado's mildly worded referendum, Oregon's Measure 9 sought to tie homosexuality to pedophilia and sadomasochism. Sponsoring group, Oregon Citizen's Alliance, was particularly effective in convincing the good citizens of Oregon that through recruitment, anyone and everyone's child was at risk. Instilling fear and hate into their small, usually sleepy communities, the campaign often took shockingly violent turns.

While Lou Mabon, Chairman of the Oregon

Citizen's Alliance, his sweet wife Bonnie and grandfatherly Oren Camenish, Klamath County regional director for the OCA, seem unlikely villains, many of their followers took few pains to mask their hate and homophobia.

Said one young man, "It's totally different when you're beating up a Gay person than when you're beating up a citizen. I don't take their money. I just beat 'em and make 'em hurt and make them think about next time... maybe... you know... because I'm not prejudiced and I don't like people who are prejudiced... you know, but when it comes down to fags..."

At another point in the film, an attractive young man suggests that he would take all the homos and put them in Illinois. (Illinois?!) "Everyone's gonna be Gay and then the little kids are gonna grow up and see them being Gay and they're gonna want to be Gay. But if we keep them off the street and they're gonna want to be like us." (Don't think so!) Even the two young women with him can only look on with bewilderment.

In the end, Measure 9 was successfully defeated by the narrow margin of 53% to 47%. The age group most supportive of the anti-Gay referendum were those 30-44. Surprisingly, the largest group voting "No on 9" were those over 60. Bottom line, as several individuals ask at the end of the film, what was actually won? Well, nothing, really. This hard-won, bloody battle simply maintained laws already on the books.

Ballot Measure 9 is an absorbing and frightening cautionary tale. Not only presenting those behind Measure 9, MacDonald is equally effective in portraying everyday individuals becoming real, if unsung heroes. In the end, **Ballot Measure 9** is a powerful and inspiring film. Okay, nay-sayers are going to say, "Oh it can't happen here!" Do you suppose that's what they used to say in Oregon?

'Lord Of Illusion' Proves that Lots of Special Effects Do Not a Movie Make

Gay audiences have been eagerly awaiting the release of **Lord of Illusion** ever since Clive Barker's name splashed across headlines earlier this year following his "coming out." Would homoeroticism successfully join Barker's usual and unique mix of blood and mysticism, fantasy and gore? In **Lord of Illusion**, the answer is, well, yes and no.

There is something richly satisfying about a truly effective horror flick. Whether it is Freddy Krueger in the **Nightmare on Elm Street**, one thru whatever, or Boris Karloff as the original Frankenstein or even cute little Heather O'Roarke in **Poltergeist**, we embrace these figures, monsters and victims alike and transform them into popular culture icons. We live vicariously through these characters and, in doing so, can experience a range and intensity of emotion that we would probably just as soon not experience in our daily existence.

In his books, particularly his imaginative masterpiece, **Imajica**, Barker has successfully set new standards for the horror and dark fantasy genres, uncannily blending the believable with the extraordinary. Unfortunately, what has served Barker so well on the printed page, has simply not found its way to the big screen in **Lord of Illusion**.

Barker's jumbled and convoluted plot in **Lord of Illusion** defies any simple summary, but here goes... A shady detective, Harry D'Amour (Scott Bakula), a bit run down on his luck, finds his way to California on some sleazy case that soon gets forgotten when Harry runs across a fortuneteller masquerading as a pin cushion.

Sensing something amiss, Harry follows the magical trail that leads him to Philip Swann (Keven J. O'Connor), a spectacularly uncharismatic illusionist. Swann dies. A beauti-

ful girl is in danger. A diabolic cult figure rises from the dead. Lotsa blood. Lotsa special effects. Happy ending. Movie over.

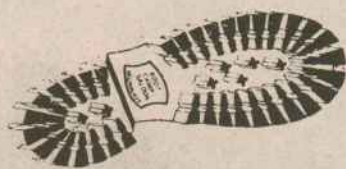
In the end, **Lord of Illusion** is just way too predictable. As if a shell game, Barker seems to think that if you throw in enough blood and plenty of computer-generated special effects, the audience will be fooled into thinking that there's some point to all this.

I don't think so.

Sure, Scott Bakula looks pretty good without a shirt on and there is one fabulously staged sequence filled with writhing muscle boys bedecked only in black leather g-strings, but these few highlights do not a movie make.

Lord of Illusion is mildly entertaining, but save your money and wait 'til it hits a budget theatre or video (either ought to happen soon enough), or better yet, go out and buy one of Barker's truly imaginative and frightening books.

'The Brothers McMullen' Plays it Straight In All the Right Senses of the Word

The Brothers McMullen isn't probably the sort of flick that loyal readers of **Wisconsin Light** might expect to see reviewed. True, it is a small, independent film playing at the Downer, but nary a Gay or Lesbian character is anywhere to be found. In fact, **The Brothers McMullen** might just be the host heterosexual movie to hit the east side in a very long while. So, what's in it for Gay audiences? Good question.

The basic story from the multi-talented Edward Burns has the three McMullen brothers looking for love in all the wrong (and occasionally a few of the right) places while steering way clear of any hint of commitment.

Oldest brother Jack is married to a wonderful girl, Molly. Teachers both. Molly wants a family, so what does Jack do? Naturally he goes out and has an affair. Not for or out of love, mind you. Just carnal desire. Men are, when all is said and done, pigs. Gosh, everyone knows that.

Middle brother Barry (played by the sleepily handsome Edward Burns) dumps any girl when the word "marriage" (or wedding, engagement, commitment, or god forbid, children) pops up in the conversation. Cupid's arrow is clearly destined for the loveless romantic writer in the person of Audrey, a gorgeous actress, who initially just steals Barry's apartment and later, his heart. Too romantic!

Youngest brother Patrick is a good Catholic who has apparently spent much of his youth masturbating and then endlessly whining about the inevitable fires of damnation. No wonder his only friends are his brothers. In love with a ditz Jewish girl from the garment district,

Patrick balks when Sally's daddy offers to pay for not only the wedding, but also for their apartment and a job for the fresh out-of-college Patrick. Sounds like daddy-to-be is pretty much sewing up Patrick's life, pun fully intended. Patrick freaks, naturally.

The Brothers McMullen plays it straight, in all senses of the word. Burns and company are quite earnest in going through their romantic paces. While there really isn't anything new here, Burns has invested his first directorial effort with a marvelously fresh approach and has collected a winning group of fully-developed, three dimensional characters who are impossible to care about.

Burns has also incorporated into **The Brothers McMullen** a delightful mix of some wonderfully warm and humorous dialogue and situations. Barry's warning to his naïve little brother Patrick of every woman's goal of male emasculation, with the able assistance of a handy banana, absolutely has to be the funniest thing done with a piece of fruit in any movies we've seen in ages. Could the horrendously kitschy sweaters that would appear to be Sally's dowry and Patrick's future, finally make Patrick see the light?

The Brothers McMullen is an intelligent, wryly wise film intended for grown-ups (albeit heterosexual grown-ups) compared to the usual teen-aged mentality most Hollywood flicks seem to fall victim to. Attractive male leads, some delightful Irish music, and a happily ever after glow, make **The Brothers McMullen** a "thumbs up."

Throughout the Milwaukee metro area, their promotion of the Walk has been everywhere through posters, bus cards, billboards, newspaper ads and television spots.

"They've made a huge difference," Nelson said. "They bring both a deep commitment and a welcomed prestige to the AIDS Walk which is rallying people from around the state who want to help in the fight against AIDS."

She died before a new heart could be found, but it intensified the debate over the use of tissue from other species in human beings.

A pair of experimental liver transplants have been tried as well, but each recipient died within weeks of the operations at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

Like Baby Fae, who was born with a fatal congenital heart defect, Getty is a terminal patient. He has been infected since 1979, Maloney said, and agreed to the baboon experiment.

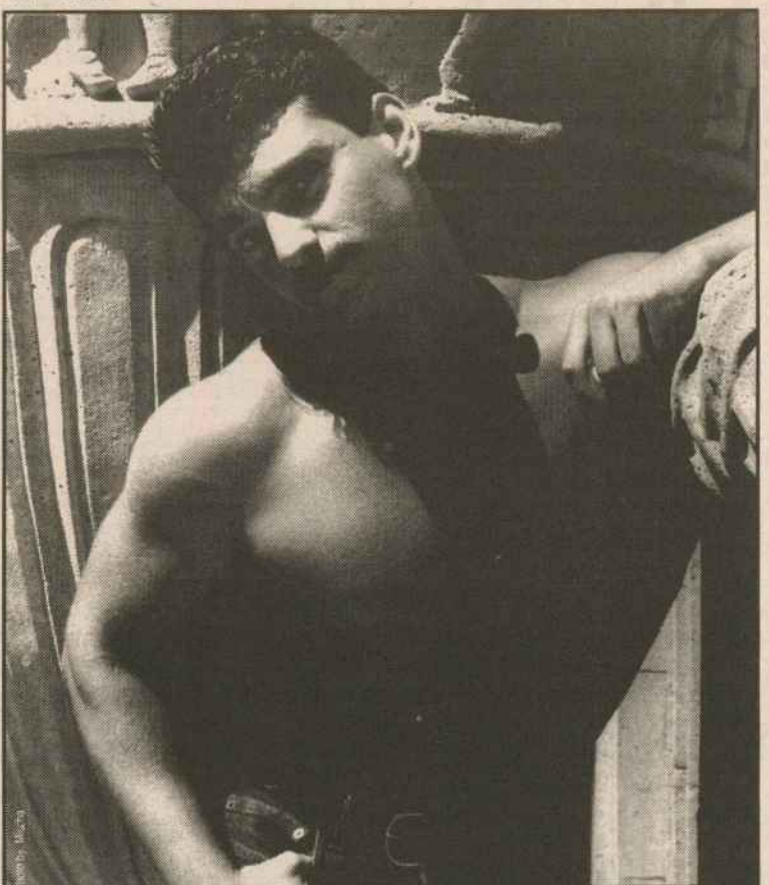

A New Stadium?

TO THE EDITOR:

Either the people of Wisconsin and especially Milwaukee have elected a collection of idiots to public office, or we have an equal number of smart politicians who are perfectly willing to betray the public trust.

If our governor, mayor and county executive were not either stupid or corrupt, the stadium deal would never have been proposed. The escape clause that the Brewers wanted would have killed the deal, but they never needed it because they already have it. It's called Chapter 11.

Remember Bud Selig said previously that if he gets a new stadium with the increased revenue, he can hire better players: that's where the money is going.

Within a few years, he will probably default on

the WHEDA loan and file for reorganization. WHEDA will have to eat a lot, if not all, of its note balance, and the stadium authority will have to reduce the rent. They can't get a new tenant. There aren't any. WHEDA will have to take what it can get, or it will get nothing. If they don't, the team will be gone; either moved or liquidated—but gone.

It doesn't take too much imagination to figure out a way for the proceeds to go to the stockholders at the expense of the creditors. It takes even less to reopen elsewhere, or even here, under a new corporate identity obtained in Delaware.

I cannot believe that Thompson and Selig did not discuss this possibility in some form during their talks. It's such an obvious ploy: Selig gets an almost free stadium; GMC and the Chamber of Commerce get the money, and the taxpayers get copulation sans affection.

We can afford this? Sure, right after creating hundreds of homeless by ending general assistance and by not building schools to replace the ones that were old when I moved here in 1942. We have no shame. NONE!

If our upstart legislators give us this deal, at least their voters will be eating a hunk of the WHEDA loan.

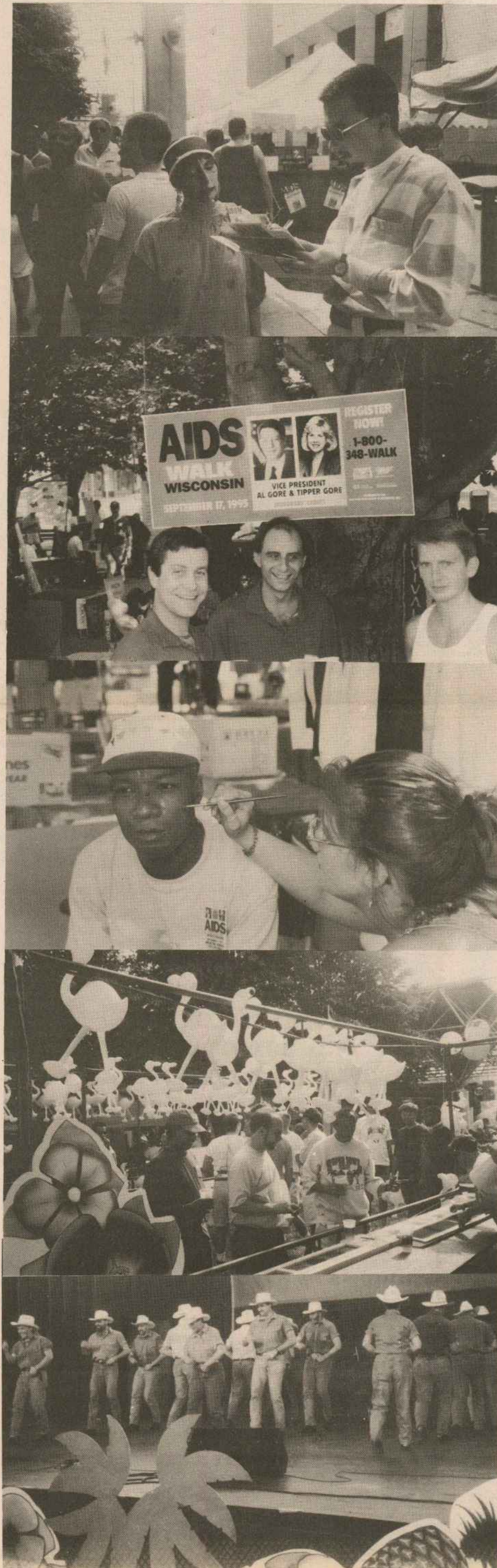
