Medical College's Dr. **Jeffrey Kelly Gets** \$2.6 Million Grant for AIDS Prevention

Milwaukee-Jeffrey Kelly, Ph.D., professor of psychiatry and behavioral medicine and director of the Center for AIDS Intervention Research (CAIR) at the Medical College of Wisconsin has been awarded a four-year, \$2,609,318 grant by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIH). The grant will be used to study ways to transfer successful AIDS prevention approaches from the research arena to field staff of community-based AIDS prevention organizations in 75 cities nationwide.

The intent of the project is to assist these organizations in adopting more effective HIV prevention approaches, and therefore benefiting more directly from findings of CAIR's HIV prevention research.

CAIR is the only center of its kind between New York and California and one of only three federally-designated centers in the U.S. for AIDS prevention research.

CAIR's research programs have shown that it is possible to assist individuals, groups and communities reduce HIV/AIDS risk behavior and thereby reduce HIV/AIDS-vulnerable populations, including inner city men, women, the chronically mentally ill, Lesbians, Gay men and homeless women and children.

"CAIR has developed a numberf of HIV prevention interventions that meet with consid-

A nationally recognized expert in costeffectiveness, Dr. Holtgrave's objective will be to identify how many HIV infections are averted by AIDS prevention intereventions and what types of AIDS prevention approaches provide the greatest benefit in relation to their

Racine Becomes Second Wisconsin City to Have Needle Exchange Program

Milwaukee.

Milwaukee-Racine has become the second city in the state of Wisconsin where a clean needle exchange program is operating to help stop the spread of AIDS.

The program, called Lifepoint Racine, is operated by the Southeast Wisconsin AIDS Project (SEWAP). It offers to exchange clean needles for used needles at two locations within the Racine city limits. The two exchange sites are staffed on Wednesdays and Fridays for a total of eight hours each week.

"Our sole purpose is to save lives," said Doug Nelson, executive director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), the statewide AIDS agency with which SEWAP and the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) are affiliated. "This is an aggressive strategy that can and will control the spread of AIDS cases among drug users, their sexual partners and infant children. We expect Lifepoint Racine will save hundreds of lives of men, women

and children over the next several years. MAP has operated a highly successful needle exchange program within the city of Milwaukee for more than 18 months-the first and only other needle exchange program in Wisconsin. Since its inception, nearly 2,000 of the estimated 5,000 active drug users in Milwaukee have benefited from Lifepoint. More than 18,000 clean needles have been exchanged in

'Racine, like Milwaukee, can succeed in slowing down the AIDS epidemic and save lives where many other cities have failed," Nelson said. "But we must be aggressive. Lifepoint Racine puts AIDS outreach workers on the front lines of the epidemic.

Lifepoint Racine is staffed by SEWAP employees who operate the program out of a van owned by SEWAP. To ensure that injection drug users can safely access Lifepoint Racine, they may anonymously exchange syringes.

However, exchangers must be at least 18 years of age and must present dirty needles equal to the number of clean needles they receive. Sites and times of Lifepoint Racine exchanges will be relayed only by word of

In addition to exchanging needles, Lifepoint Racine workers will help drug users access needed medical care and HIV testing and counseling. They will also provide drug users with HIV risk reduction counseling and will distribute AIDS prevention materials such as

The 'Ex-Gay' Ministries and Lesbians and **Gay Men Who Have Survived Them**

Part One of a **Three Part Series**

With bigotry the nails in political platforms, Republican presidential candidates from Bob Dornan to Phil Gramm to Bob Dole, try to out-God each other in today's hostile political climate, playing the theocratic game of who is more conservative and who is holier than thou in an attempt to woo the much sought after support of conservative religious organization such as Focus on the Family, the Traditional Values Coalition, and the Christian Coalition.

Calling the separation of church and state in the U.S. Constitution a "myth of the left," these organizations seek to reinvent "The Land of the Free" in their own image of "God's Country"-a decidedly unAmerican theocracy where religion becomes a litmus test for patriotism, just as the McCarthy era infused "The Pledge of Allegiance" with the term "one nation *under* God" to weed out perceived Communists. The Religious Right would like to see Gays, Democrats, Buddhists, the poor, African-Americans, the working class, and everyone else not like them to please close the door on your way out of

With this sweeping political and religious Fundamentalism comes a new wave of anti-Gay rhetoric which threatens to become law, cost.

pit, and radio and TV. Anti-Gay initiatives, military policies, rising hate crimes statistics, anti-AIDS policies, and proudly declared dis-gust are symptoms of the greater hatred and misunderstanding of homosexuals-as child molesters, perverts and predators-that anti-Gay zealots relish and spread feverishly.

The ex-Gay ministry is one such symptom, little talked about in the past few years, but sure to rear its controversial head as Ultra-Conservatives in Congress and elsewhere attempt to change how Gays and Lesbians are presented and treated by society at large, deciding which of America's freedoms certain Americans (read Gay) will be allowed to en-

Maine Voters Reject Far Right's Anti-Gay Measure 1 Amendment as Discriminatory

Portland, Maine-Voters in Maine on Tuesday, November 7th, rejected a discriminatory ballot measure, known as Measure 1, by a 52% to 48.8% vote. The defeated measure would have "forever" denied basic human rights to Gay and Lesbian citizens of the state.

Measure 1, the only anti-Gay measure on a state ballot this year, was the first such initiative to appear on a state ballot east of the Rocky Mountains. Last year, voters in Idaho and Oregon rejected anti-Gay measures pushed, as in Maine, but the forces of the Religious Right.

As reported earlier in Light, tens of thou-sands of dollars had been poured into Maine by various Right Wing and Religious groups from around the country

According to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), Measure 1 reflected a new strategy in terms of its wording. Taking a cue from the legal problems encourntered by Colorado's anti-Gay Amendment 2, the Maine measure did not specify "homosexuals" and was not a constitutional amendment.

Instead, it was designed to create a short list of who is included in civil rights laws and who is not, who is protected against discrimination and, by omission, who is vulnerable.

Those left off the list included Gays and

Lesbians, low income people, whistle blowers, workmen's compensation claimants, hunters, veterans, those seeking public assistance and many others.

As Light learned from Winnie Weir, Publishing Editor of the Community Pride Reporter, the statewide Lesbian and Gay newspaper, election day itself was "terrible.

Despite laws against such tactics, Right Wing zealots, Weir said, were taking pictures with a video cam at the polling places, presumably to frighten pro-civil rights voters

Following Gay Community Forums, MAP **Takes Immediate Action**

Client Advocate Position Created and Filled

Milwaukee—In a surprise announcement following the Gay and Lesbian community Forums hosted by the Milwaukee AIDS Project on November 1st and 2nd, the AIDS service agency announced on November 8th that it has created a full-time Client Advocate position to help resolve client problems and assure quick access to MAP services.

Having created the Client Advocate position, MAP Executive Director Doug Nelson immediately appointed Jerry Lishawa to fill it while a formal search is undertaken.

Lishawa is an openly Gay man living with HIV and a client with MAP for over four years. Hence he is very familiar with the workings of the agency.

Nelson said that Lishawa will have complete and total access to and be accountable to the executive staff at MAP. This will give him the power to find solutions to problems with dis-

"We have taken immediate action to solve client problems and concerns," Nelson said. "MAP provides a huge array of client services and it's clear from the Gay and Lesbian fo-

rums are having difficulty accessing them."
"That's unacceptable," Nelson said firmly.
"The Client Advocate will break down the

barriers, cut through the red tape, and get quick action on client complaints. Nelson was asked what he meant by "quick

He answered, saying, "We will take action

and get resolution within 24 hours.' Beginning November 9th, the Client Advocate can be reached by calling (414) 225-1595. Lishawa will answer all calls.

Nelson emphasized that case managers will remain as the clients' primary point of access to MAP.

"They are the professionals who know the systems and can get things done," he said.



"But if there's a problem getting through to case management, or housing, or legal services, or health services, or any other program, the Client Advocate is the person to call who will assure that action is taken.'

Lishawa has been Special Events Manager with MAP for two years and is a former Brewers Hill resident, hence familiar with the

"As an AIDS caretaker and a person with HIV," Lishawa said, "I understand the frustrations and fears of the disease. I look forward to doing whatever I can to help people

get the services that they need.' Lishawa added that his message for clients is that "I am on your side and I believe in MAP. I am determined to help clients get the services

they deserve.'

Thalidomide Heals Mouth Ulcers in AIDS Patients

Washington, D.C.-AP- Thalidomide, the tranquilizer banned worldwide for causing severe birth defects, heals the severe mouth ulcers that plague AIDS patients, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) announced on October 31. NIH found thalidomide worked so well that it has stopped giving a placebo to AIDS patients enrolled in a 30-hospital trial of the drug. Early trial tests showed 14 of 23 patients who got thalidomide had their ulcers heal, compared with only one of 22 patients who took a placebo. The trial, which eventually will enroll 164 patents will continue, however. Women who participate in the trial must agree not to become pregnant while taking the drug.

Homophobe Lou Sheldon Prays in U.S. House

Washington, D.C.-AP- Lou Sheldon of the Traditional Values Coalition made an appearance as guest chaplain in the U.S. House of Representatives and offered a prayer. The visit brought immediate protest from several members of Congress. "Sheldon has made a living bashing Gays, Lesbians and persons with AIDS," said Rep. Lynn Woolsey (D-CA), who was in the chamber when Sheldon began praying at the start of the House's business day.

Sheldon "preaches that Lesbian and Gay sexual orientation is the most pernicious evil today" and has written that "Gays and Lesbians live perverted, twisted lives that feed upon the unsuspecting and innocent, like our children," Woolsey said in a protest letter she is circulating among House members to send to Speaker Newt Gingrich.

Sheldon's prayer was innocuous in content, a formula prayer that followed strict guidelines set by the chaplain's office. He was there at the invitation of Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA).

Female Impersonator Running for Mayor

Palm Springs, CA-AP-Kitty Cole, a 6'5" former modeling agent who enjoys wearing women's clothes, could make a case for being a conservative candidate in the Palm Springs mayor's race. He thinks the desert resort should get back to basics. "I want to make Palm Springs the playground for mobsters and movie stars it was intended to be," said Cole who is the front runner in the field. Is this unusual? Not in a city that elected Sonny Bono its mayor, it's not.

Cole, a 26-year-old self-described "drag queen," and an openly Gay man, wants to reverse years of family oriented tourist marketing. His more eye catching proposals include marking no-parking zones with red or gold glitter and sponsoring celebrity croquet tournaments on city golf courses. He would also reopen the desert resort 100 miles east of L.A. to college Spring break revelers. Odds are, observers say, he's going to win.

New York Court Rules Gay Couples Can Adopt

New York, NY-AP-In a ruling hailed by Gay activists, New York's highest court declared on November 3rd that unmarried people—Lesbian, Gay or straight—have a right to adopt their partner's children. Since state laws recognize that single adults an adopt, regardless of sexual orientation, the right must also be extended to partners in Gay or heterosexual relationships, the Court of Appeals decided in a 4-3 vote.

"To rule otherwise would mean that the thousands of children in New York actually being raised in homes headed by two unmarried persons, could have only one legal parent, not the two who want themn," Chief Judge Judith Kaye wrote.

New York becomes the third state after Vermont and Massachusetts whose courts have recognized the right of a person in a Lesbian or Gay relationship to adopt the other partner's child. Ruth Harlow, attorney for the American Civil Liberties Union, said her group's reading of the ruling indicates that all unmarried couples—Gay or straight—have been given the right to adopt, not only the biological children of one of the partners, but non-related children as well. Religious zealots of the Far Right Wing condemned the ruling.

Gay Fraternity Offers Freedom for Membership

Minneapolis, MN-AP-Members of Delta Lambda Phi at the University of Minnesota believe that their Gay and Bisexual fraternity is the first of its kind with a house on a university campus. Delta Phi moved into the former Chi Phi fraternity, a Tudor-style house on fraternity row, in August. So far, 15 people live there, including eight members or soon-to-be members, two international students, two Lesbians, two straight women and one straight man. Fraternity President Rusty Robertson said the fraternity was started in 1988 and at the time, was the fourth Gay chapter in the country.

"This is a more comfortable environment that the dorms," Robertson said. "Everyone can be what they want to be, and they don't have to worry about being criticized for this or that." By living together in a fraternity on campus, Robertson aid Gay and Bisexual students can mix their academic and social lives.

Shane Morris of Alpha Tau Omega, a nearby fraternity, said having a Gay fraternity move in on the row has been uneventful. "Whatever trips your trigger as far as that's concerned, is fine," he said. Morris said he had visited the Gay fraternity, but wouldn't be attending its parties because "you won't find girls there."

Some Blacks Think AIDS is a Plot to Kill Them

San Diego-CA-AP-A survey of about 1,000 African-American church members in five cities found that more than one-third of them believe the AIDS virus was produced in a germ warfare lab as a form of genocide to kill Blacks. Another third said they were "unsure" if that was the case. The findings held firm even among educated individuals, said one of the survey's authors, Sandra Crouse Quinn, a health educator at the School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Rumors that AIDS was created to kill African-Americans have circulated for years, and the belief is endorsed by some Black leaders.

The belief that AIDS is a form of genocide has serious health consequences, Quinn said. "If they believe AIDS is a form of genocide, they are less likely to get tested, less likely to use condoms and less likely to participate in clinical trails."

Charles Hamilton, a political scientist at Columbia University said, "You have to put those beliefs in the context of general disaffection about the effectiveness of the system to deal with problems. We still see this in response to why drugs are so prevalent in the Black community: 'It's a conspiracy. If it weren't, the police would crack down on it.'"

erable success in helping people reduce high risk behavior," Dr. Kelly said. "However, we are concerned that information on how to conduct and implement these approaches does not always reach the front-line AIDS prevention staff of community-based organizations," he

"They often don't have access to scientific journals and detailed 'how to' information for conducting state-of-the-art HIV prevention strategies in their own communities," Dr. Kelly said.

The new grant project will enable CAIR to provide inventive, on-site training in state-of-the-science HIV prevention programs developed by CAIR to the staffs of 75 of the country's major community-based AIDS prevention programs.

Co-investigators on this grant are Medical College faculty members Anton Somlai, Ed.D., and Laura Otto-Salaj, Ph.D., assistant professors of psychiatry and behavioral medicine at CAIR; Timothy McAuliffe, Ph.D., associate professor of biostatistics and clinical epidemiology and director of CAIR's quantitative methodologies scientific core, and David Holtgrave, Ph.D., associate professor of psychiatry and behavior al medicine and director of CAIR's cost-effectiveness scientific core.

Holtgrave Receives Grant

David Holtgrave, Ph.D., director of AIDS Policy Research at CAIR has been awarded a two-year \$424,817 grant by NIH to conduct studies to evaluate economic, cost-

This information will be important to public health officials and AIDS prevention program directors who will increasingly be called upon to make decisions about cost-effectiveness and benefits of HIV prevention programs of different kinds.

"Because AIDS prevention organizations have only limited budgets and resources," Dr. Holtgrave said, "it is essential that they have information on the best programs to offer and can anticipate how many lives will be saved by these programs."

MAP's Two Community Forums Draw Crowd Ready to Express Their Views

Milwaukee—Approximately 100 people overall attended the two Gay and Lesbian community forums held by the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) on November 1st and 2nd, to express their views and concerns to MAP administrators.

As Doug Nelson, MAP's executive director said in part, in his opening remarks at both sessions, "We have sponsored these forums because we want to hear from you, we want to hear your concerns, we want hear your issues, your ideas and your suggestions as to ways in which MAP can better meet the needs of the Gay and Lesbian community in Milwaukee."

The first forum was held in the banquet room of the M&M Club. The second one was held at MAP's offices. Both forums began at 6:30 p.m. and lasted for two hours.

At each of the forums, at the head table, were Nelson; Neil Albrecht, Deputy Director of Programs; Andy Bagnall, the new manager of Lesbian and Gay Outreach and Kathleen Neville, a psychotherapist from the Lakeshore clinic in Shorewood who moderated the discussion. She quickly established an open and accepting atmosphere.

At each of the forums, the program directors from each of the service areas was present to give a brief description of their area. Then, the floor was opened for questions and comments.

Questions and comments at both forums were lively, sometimes emotional, but never angry. One person, part way through his comments, became so distraught that he left.

Though he came back later, it was clear how deeply he and many others felt, having taken Nelson words to heart: "We want to do a better job."

Many, if not most of the comments dealt with how the individual is treated by staffers at MAP

There were comments about case managers not seeming to be familiar with programs; case managers not communicating enough or not sensitively enough with their clients.

"A case worker talking to a person's answering machine," one young man said, "is not contact."

There were comments about the voice mail system at MAP. One person suggested that there should always "be a human voice at the other end of the line."

Nelson replied that with MAP the size that it is and must be, the voice mail system is necessary to assure that messages can be left and return calls made.

There were comments about case managers not being available; about the agency itself not being open on weekends, even though, as was pointed out, there is an emergency number that is always available.

There were comments too about calls to case managers not being returned and with the lack of follow up some had experienced after they or someone they knew had initially been assessed.

Questioning was sharp over why there was only one person to handle intake at MAP.

"If a person can't be screened right away,"
One person commented, "they should at least should be called back. People should not be kept waiting for a week or more."

It was pointed out that there are 13 case managers at MAP and that each one must handle 45-80 clients. Nelson said that MAP has begun a program for volunteer help for overburdened case managers modeled after the successful Gay Men's Health Crisis System in New York City.

At the conclusion of the forums, it became clear that the case manager is the face of MAP. It became clear too that people were feeling overwhelmed by bureaucracy.

"At the old building where MAP was," one person said, "there was always someone to talk with. Here, there's no one."

This may be only an impression, but it is valid nonetheless, symptomatic of people in need of individual attention by those with compassion.

At the conclusion of the second forum, Nelson promised that each person who had signed in would be sent a written report of the meetings and another report of what was being done to follow up on their suggestions, comments and complaints.

"We value all of your suggestions," Nelson told the group. "We want to be held accountable for them and we will let you know precisely what action we take to make the improvements you want."

Later, Chuck, a volunteer at MAP, expressed his pleasure that the crowd had been "good" at both forums. However, he was disappointed that it wasn't large enough.

"I've heard lots of complaints about MAP all these years," Chuck said. "So what I want to know is where were all the complainers. They've complained about everything, from hiring practices to racism, so where were they? Since those people weren't here, they should just shut up."

It was suggested mildly that maybe they doubted they'd get a hearing, but Chuck dismissed that out of hand."

"They talk loud enough outside," he retorted. "How come they weren't here when it might have counted.

"I want you to put in your report," he said heatedly, "that the volunteers here do a damned good job. We do the best we can, we do everything that we can. I don't want to hear any more from the bickerers."

Chuck was not alone in his comments. Other volunteers spoke up as well, agreeing with what he had said.

Federal Court Upholds Discharge of Gay Officer


Washington, D.C.- Citing the need for "great deference to the military," J. Young of the federal District Court for the District of Maryland in Baltimore ruled on October 30th that the "don't ask, don't tell, don't pursue" policy on Gays in the military passes constitutional muster as applied to Navy Lt (jg) Dirk Selland. J. Young ruled that the policy did not violate Selland's First Amendment rights of free speech or his Fifth Amendment right of equal protection under the law. Along with "Thomasson v. Perry," the decision is the second in the conservative Fourth Circuit to uphold Gays in the military policy. Selland has said that he will appeal.

House to Gay People: Die Lonely!

Washington, D.C- The U.S. House of Representatives voted on November 1st to repeal a D.C. law allowing hospital visitation rights and equal access to health benefits for two people living together as a family for more than six months. In voting to revoke the law, conservative House members repeatedly denounced the fact that the law included Lesbians and Gay men.

"This is a clear example of how anti-Gay extremism hurts everyone," said Human Rights Campaign (HRC) executive director Elizabeth Birch. "Politicians who purport to champion 'local control' and 'family values' have now revoked this local law that costs the taxpayers nothing and benefits local families—all because some of the people the law helps are Gay. Denying hospital rights to two people who live together and care for each other is about as mean-spirited as you can get."

The next day, Religious, anti-Gay zealot Lou Sheldon was brought in to offer prayer.



Interview With Rosemary Potter, Candidate for State Senate in 7th District

State Assemblywoman Rosemary Potter is running for the 7th District State Senate seat vacated by the death of John Plewa.

Potter is Milwaukee born and bred. She is a graduate of Bay View High and UW-Milwaukee. She has taught at Alverno College and Milwaukee Technical College. She has served as a Congressional Aide, and was district coordinator of Combined Health Appeal of Wisconsin.

The race in the 7th District is crucial because it will determine whether there is a pro or anti-Choice majority in the Senate.

Potter, a tremendously vibrant person, came recently to the offices of Wisconsin Light to be interviewed.

Wisconsin Light: Would you as a State Senator support State Representative Tammy Baldwin if she introduces a bill to

provide for domestic partnership?
Rosemary Potter: Yes. I would certainly support Rep. Baldwin's bill and I've told her that. I would certainly be a leader on it in the Senate. In my own experience family is defined as the individual wants to define it; that I want to promote a broad definition of family. I think that the domestic partnership bill does

WL: What is your position on Choice? RP: I'm pro-Choice. That's one of the key

differences between me and my opponent in this election. That's a significant difference right now because the Senate right now is split, 16 pro-Choice and 16 anti-Choice. So, whoever wins this Senate race will turn the tide and create a pro-Choice majority or an anti-Choice majority.

I also want to say that this is an important Senate race not only because of the 16-16 split, but because the Assembly just overwhelmingly passed a horrible bill—the 24 hour waiting period bill-and if it gets over to the Senate and I'm there, I can help kill that bill.

You know, this is just the tip of the iceberg for those kinds of bills and that way of thinking. So, this is just one of many abortion bills that will be leaving the Assembly and we can stop them in the Senate.

I believe that the majority of people in the 7th Senate District, even though they wouldn't call themselves pro-Choice, they want abortion to remain a legal option. Therefore, I think that I

reflect the majority's views.

WL: What is your position on school choice?

RP: I have consistently voted against private

school choice, tax money going to religious schools. I am for public school choice.

Right now, money taken away from the public schools and given to private schools, I don't think that'll solve the problems of the Milwaukee Public Schools. If they go down, I think it will have a devastating impact on Milwaukee.

I understand the concerns of parents who want to send their kids to private schools. I understand that people want to stay in the city and send their kids to private schools.

But I think we can improve public schools. I think there are four areas we can improve

We must increase security in the schools. We can hire more security

guards. We can give teachers more flexibility so that they can handle the discipline problems that they cannot handle now.

We can work with teachers to try and get flexible hours for parent-teacher conferences and so get the parents more involved in their children's education.

We, on the state level, must be more responsive to teacher's needs, ease some of their burdens, so that they can teach reading, writing and arithmetic.

WL: What do you believe about sex education and Gay/Lesbian issues in the

RP: I support a broad sex education courses. I've always supported that. We need comprehensive health and sexuality education in our schools. Ideally, schools would pull parents in to teach them how to talk to their children about sex issues. That way it doesn't have to come only from the schools. The parents and the schools should be partners in this.

Education for the Whole Person

As has been done around the country, I put together a Common Ground Group of pro-Choice and Pro-Life community leaders to see, with the help of a professional mediator, if we could find some common ground.

After a year of meetings, one thing that we could agree on was the idea of sexuality in education that talked about the whole person, not just one aspect of health over another, but the whole person.

That included someone's spirituality, their way of looking at the world. I think that's the way to go. Let's talk about education for the

WL: How to you stand on gun control?

RP: I'm for reasonable gun control. I use the word "reasonable" because I do not want to take guns away from hunters and people like that. What I mean is that the city of Milwaukee and other cities should be able to enact and enforce stricter gun laws than what the state requires.

From all the polls, we know that people don't want it easy for people to buy handguns and the like.

WL: Is there anything else you would like to say to our readership?

RP: Just that I am and always have been a supporter of Gay and Lesbian issues. I have worked with the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee. I have always co-sponsored bills that increase AIDS funding and I certainly support the AIDS community in their agenda. We must make sure that the budget repair bill increases the allocation for AIDS.

You can count on me.

Reflections On Sex and On Volunteers

"If you want to reach me as a young Gay man, especially a young Gay man of color, then you need to give me information in a vocabulary I can understand and relate to. I will be much more likely to hear the message if it comes from someone I can relate to.'

Pedro Zamora Being out and about on occasion, has its advantages. The scenery can be pleasant, there can be good conversation around "the flowing bowel"-and you see things, get a sense of what's going on.

For example, the other evening Jerry and I were out and who should we see but Erv from the BestD Clinic. He was going around, along with other Brady Street Clinic volunteers, making sure the bars had ample supplies of those new booklets they've got, the ones called Eros, that eroticize safer Gay male sex.

You may have seen them. They're in full color showing some of the hottest Gay male adult video stars in the industry having sex, safer sex, using condoms.

And, to my way of thinking, just as importantly, there good stories to go with the photos, smoldering stories in heated words.

These little booklets were snatched up as if each one were the only one ever to be produced-and looked at, then stuffed in pockets to be taken home.

Which is just my point.

Sex is a fact of life, a non-rational fact of life. It's all very well and good to give reasons why women and men should use devices meant to prevent the spread of disease—and we do give those reasons-over and over again. But those reasons, as valid as they are, operate on only one level.

you've ever been a teacher, you learn quickly, real quick, that knowledge doesn't necessarily change behavior-or even thought, sometimes. But if you can attach a fact to an emotion, it can make all the difference in the

I am persuaded that sex proceeds, not out of reason, but out of emotion, and if you are going to change behavior surrounding it, you have to eroticize that behavior. That's what BestD has been wise enough to do.

The Clinic is attacking the disease on two fronts: the rational and the non-rational which, in my opinion, is the right thing to do.

The puritans among us may wince and say "What if the Bible-bangers should find out? Let them find out. Since they're no more immune from AIDS than we are, perhaps what should be done is have booklets like Eros targeted at straights.

And there should be ones for women too. I understand BestD has that in the works.

Safer sex must be made attractive, seductive and sensual. A condom or a dental dam must be among the hottest items in the sexual rep-

In fact, I don't think it's incorrect to say that until we do eroticize safer sex, we are not going to fully accomplish the task of AIDS prevention that is crucially necessary.

The Brady Street Clinic is trying to do that. Applause, applause.

Condoms on Hallowe'en

Even if condoms become the hottest item around, they have to be available. There was Andy Bagnall, MAP's new Lesbian/Gay Outreach guy handing them out to Hallowe'en revelers in the bars around our town.

Into the bar he came like Don Quixote with Sancho Panza in tow, bright as a new penny, handing out condoms in bright orange wrap-

I watched as people took them, some a little sheepishly, but all willingly-and more than one person went to him to ask for more.

For a long time, I've maintained that MAP needed to have this kind of high profile in the bars, the kind Andy and his volunteers are providing. When "Mr. Right" or "Ms. Right" has just been "found" (Where have you been all my life?), and the emotions are hot, prevention devices should be close at

Andy needs women volunteers. How about giving him a call at MAP? (414-273-1991). The help you give could save a life.

Applause, applause.

The Thursday Night Group

There's a group of people I see every Thursday night when Jerry and I are out and about. They're volunteers at MAP, who get together to stuff envelopes, do whatever. We see them afterwards, when they stop in at a local watering hole to have a drink

They're great people. They're friends, obviously. They have a lot of fun helping out and just being together. Why not? There's nothing like a common task to bring people together.

Most people never see them or if they do, don't realize the good they accomplish, which is my point.

The "Thursday Night Group," as I call them, from all I've seen, are typical of the hundreds and hundreds of volunteers that work

MAP has its paid staff and they do good work. But the women and men who volunteer there, women and men who give up their time and spend their energy, all for free, all in the hope that somehow, somebody's life might be a little better because of the work they do.

When the final chapter on AIDS is writtenand it will be one day-the history books, as histories do, will devote chapters to doctors and researchers, legislators and all the rest.

But histories often miss the "rest of the story." Believe me, they do. And in this case, "the rest of the story" will be in the often unseen and mostly unsung work of people like the Thursday Night Group of MAP volunteers.

These people, and all volunteers like them, are good people, incredibly decent people, hard-working against great odds. All I can do is say "Thank you." And I do.

The Freedom to Speak

TO THE EDITOR:

In June, 1995, I had to give up ALL RIGHTS to my child in order for my spouse to adopt her. This was a result of four years of fighting the legal system for a same-gender joint adoption.

Angel? Threats were made to me by my ex-husband about taking back visitation if an adoption did not go through.

(He chose not to keep up his visits and only wished the adoption to go through so he would no longer be responsible for child support payments.)

Also, I believe that I am in poor health. (I have no health insurance and can not get on my spouse's health insurance because we are not legally married.) I was left with no other choice.

My spouse would have faced court battles in order to keep Angel from going to my ex-husband in the event of my death.

The day I gave up all my rights, I felt as if the unfeeling judges had pushed our family into doing something they had no right to do. A big part of me

The adoption process cost us approximately \$28,000 with us still owing approximately \$11,000. This is after two benefits held for us.

Many people have helped us or have been following the story. Many of these people do not know the end result of the adoption due to the gag order.

The legal system is still trying to push us (Gays and Lesbians) under the carpet! Well, I was quiet for months and months. It hurt me deeply to be told that I had had my freedom of speech taken away. It also hurts me deeply to be congratulated on the adoption, because people just don't realize what I had to do in court. To know that the state was getting away with pulling our wonderful family apart.

I went to the Press Gazette and told my story to reporter Kim Estep. The story was printed, Sunday,

November 5th, in the lifestyles section.

Because of the chance I am taking to make the Gay/Lesbian community more visible and fight for our rights, I would hope the community would stand

behind me. If need be, would you be able to contact other groups that would help out?

Speaking From the Right

There Are Some Sick People Out There

It appears that a nasty rumor is circulating in the Lesbian and Gay community regarding the Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin.

According to this rumor, which was heard by one of our members and which greatly upset him, the Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin sent a disgusting attack letter to Deb Price, the syndicated Detroit News columnist who first discovered and revealed the \$1000 Log Cabin Republicans contribution to Senator Dole's campaign for President.

I will not describe the full details of this letter since this newspaper can be obtained by children, but suffice it to say that it was graphic and disgusting in its use of filthy language and a sexually oriented enclosure.

The letter attacked her for "hurting" Log Cabin and hurting the Dole campaign by printing the news of the contribution and thus 'causing" Senator Dole's campaign to return the check. It referred to the enclosure and stated that the enclosure was "laced with

The letter did not appear on our letterhead, but was signed "Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin", contained our P.O. Box number, and was postmarked in Milwaukee. It did not include the name of the individual who wrote it

This letter was not sent by Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin. It was not sent by me nor with my authorization or knowledge. Personally, I doubt very much that anyone affiliated with Log Cabin wrote it, as such a person would have kept it completely anonymous so as to prevent it from being linked to Log Cabin.

I still do not know who wrote it, but I believe that it was written by someone who was attempting to discredit us, either from the Fundamentalist Christian movement or from the left of the Lesbian and Gay community. I continue to be amazed at the shameful lengths people will go to hamper our efforts.

Immediately upon hearing about this letter from our national office, which had been contacted by Ms. Price, I sent Ms. Price the following letter:

September 18, 1995

Dear Ms. Price:

I spoke with Kevin Ivers [of the national office of Log Cabin Republicans] on Friday regarding the obscene letter you received from an anonymous person claiming to represent Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin, and I wanted to let you know how sorry I am that you were subjected to this abuse.

That letter was not written by anyone authorized to represent Log Cabin, and I seriously doubt that it was written by anyone who is actually affiliated with Log Cabin.

When I served on the Madison City Council, I received a great deal of hate mail myself, but nothing so sick and disgusting as what you have received (I once received a cowpie in the mail, but that is not even in the same class as the letter you received).

The sick individual who wrote you that letter must be either extremely self-loathing and selfhating, as well as extremely ignorant (using a phrase like "laced with AIDS"?), or must be someone who is willing to do anything in order to discredit Log Cabin.

The fact that the letter was not on our letterhead leads me to believe that it was not even anyone on our mailing list who wrote it, let alone a member or officer, because only those people would have access to our letterhead (and then only by altering one of our newsletters), whereas our P.O. Box is readily available through the brochures we have distributed at pride events and the Gay Yellow Pages, among other things.

Of course, if I do learn that it was someone associated with our organization, that person will be removed from our mailing list and denied membership in the club (and I will have some choice words for him, although he really does not deserve the dignity of a response).

While it is really irrelevant to the issue, I should add that the author's viewpoint that you are responsible for the Dole campaign's returning of our check is nonsense and is not shared by our organization.

Senator Dole alone is responsible for his campaign's ridiculous, self-defeating efforts to placate the Fundamentalist Christians

While I am convinced that no one connected to Log Cabin wrote that letter, the fact remains that it was sent and it must have been very disturbing for you to receive.

It is an unfortunate fact that there are many sick individuals in our society, and it is not always possible to do anything about them.

Judge Sets January Hearing Date in Bottoms' Case, Orders Visitation Continued

Richmond, VA-A judge has set a January until the January 12 hearing, Boice said. 12, 1996, hearing in a child custody dispute between a Lesbian and her mother and admonished both parties to strictly adhere to a court-ordered visitation schedule

Sharon Bottoms is seeking to regain custody of her 4-year-old son from her mother, Kay Bottoms. The child's mother appealed the case all the way to the Virginia Supreme Court after losing custody 2 1/2 years ago.

Now the case is back in Henrico County Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, where it originated. Sharon Bottoms claims she should get custody of Tyler Doustou because her living conditions have improved since 1993 while her mother's have deteriorated.

Sharon and Kay Bottoms also are feuding over visitation. The younger Bottoms, who is supposed to see her son from 10 a.m. Mondays until 6 p.m. Tuesdays, alleged in court papers that her mother has not allowed her to see Tyler since late August.

Kay Bottoms countered with a petition alleging that her daughter violated a court order by allowing Tyler to stay overnight at an apartment she shares with her partner, April Wade. The elder Bottoms wants her daughter's visitation rights revoked.

"We think the order is being violated every time there is a visit," Kay Bottoms' lawyer, Richard Ryder, told Judge William G. Boice. 'The child is being subjected to unwholesome and unwarranted influences."

But the judge declined to hear evidence on the visitation matters.

I'm going to leave the visitation like it is and require you to abide by that order strictly"

Sharon Bottoms' lawyers had hoped Boice would hear their evidence about denied visita-

tion, but they were satisfied with his warning. At least it stops the bleeding for now,' said Donald Butler, a cooperating attorney with the American Civil Liberties Union,

which is handling Sharon Bottoms' case. He said if any more visits are denied, he will ask Boice for an emergency hearing.

'I don't think Judge Boice intends for us to wait another 11 weeks while Kay enforces her own brand of justice," Butler said after the


Boice also said he will order social workers to study the Sharon Bottoms and Kay Bottoms homes. Kay Bottoms, 44, lives in a mobile home in Spotsylvania County. Her daughter, 25, lives in Henrico County.

Each side has accused the other of lying about living conditions and visitation. In court papers seeking to regain custody, Sharon Bottoms' lawyers say Kay Bottoms is not steadily employed and that her trailer is cramped and at times has been without running water.

'She's been employed the whole time as a nanny, and Tyler is with her 24 hours a day,"
Ryder said. They have water and electricity, and Tyler has his own room."

Sharon Bottoms denied that Tyler has been in her apartment. "There's nothing true in what they're saying," she said.

Wade said she has not seen the boy since April 5, 1993, when custody was transferred to Kay Bottoms.

However, more importantly, I think that all the parties directly involved with this private mudslinging that voters aren't expected to know about, should be made aware that everyone knows what is going on here besides you.


This is very disheartening for a young per-

'Home for the Holidays' is a Pleasant Little Film That Will Bring on Many Memories

For many, many years.. far too many years to comprehend really, Glenn was responsible for preparing Thanksgiving Dinner (and Christmas Dinner come to think about it) for the Bishop clan.

And what a clan!! Turkey and stuffing. Turkey and stuffing. Can anyone say, cholesterol? Glenn often found himself at wits end. And, these people could not even tell time. When dinner is 5:30/ 6:00, it is rude to show

Regardless, it was with widely mixed emotions that Glenn found himself at Jodie Foster's latest directorial effort: Home for the Holidays.

Promotion materials suggest that Home for the Holidays is a human comedy that honors the timeless tradition of family gatherings. Okay, but perhaps "honors" is quite the right

Claudia Larson's life is falling apart. She's just been fired. Her rodent-like ex-boss takes advantage of the situation to make a pass at Claudia (Holly Hunter). Her precocious 15 year-old daughter is about to embark on her maiden (no pun intended) sexual experience. Throw in the annual Thanksgiving with the family and you've got a woman on the verge of a nervous break down.

Still traditions are, after all, traditions, even if Claudia cannot convince daughter Kitt to come along.

From the plane Claudia makes a desperate pitch to favorite (and Gay) brother Tommy (Robert Downey, Jr.) to join in the festivities and offer big sis his own unique brand of sibling support. She gets his machine.

The Larson clan isn't actually all that strange or unusual. Not really. Okay, maybe it is a bit strange that Adele (Anne Bancroft) and Henry (Charles Durning) seem genuinely, joyfully in love with each other. Nevertheless both possess prerequisite levels of neurotic, obsessive, passage/aggressive behavior sure to drive any son or daughter to a lifetime of prosac use and abuse

Loony Aunt Glady (Geraldine Chaplin) is everybody's eccentric old aunt or uncle, the kind that you can dress up but whom you can't take out. Anywhere. Even Joanne Cynthia Stevenson), the emotionally distant, ever-sobitter sister probably has counterparts in most people's families. There certainly is one in the Bishop clan.

Family fights and foibles during the holidays have often been a topic explored by TV sitcoms. The annual Thanksgiving special at the Roseanne household, for example, is a never ending source of absolute delight. Yet despite its familiar familial territory director Foster and her impressive cast gives Thanksgiving a unique and perceptive spin.

Home for the Holidays is a gentle, poignant little film that audiences across the land are sure to find easy if uncomfortable identification. Alternating dramatic moments with farcical interludes, Foster keeps the pace brisk and the tone light.

Especially effective in Home for the Holidays is crazy but lovable brother Tommy's "outing" by his resentfully repressed sister Joanne. Director Foster does a particularly nice

job in representing parental reactions to this perhaps not altogether surprising revelation. Robert Downey, Jr.'s portrayal of Tommy is fun and funny and blessedly free from the typical Hollywood stereotypes. Tommy first surprises the family by turning up for this boisterous revelry. But who Leo Fish, this dark and mysterious man who accompanies Tommy?

The entire ensemble cast is uniformly fine. Holly Hunter's Claudia is believably, appealingly kooky, somehow maintaining composure whatever crisis might arise. Charles Durning could play lovable, if slightly befuddled ol' dad Henry with one hand tied behind his back. Cynthia Stevenson skillfully makes Joanne sympathetic if not actually likable.

Holiday affairs, such as Thanksgiving Dinner should really be outlawed as cruel and inhumane treatment, to coin a phrase. In Home for the Holidays, Foster and the whole Larson gang are a perfect antidote for holiday blues.


Among most critics, Variety says, there is little disagreement over the value of Andrews' presence in the \$8.5 million show, whose opening was the most significant of the Fall. She is undoubtedly responsible for its whopping advance-either side of \$15 milliondepending on whom you talk to.

'The show will run as long as she stays with it and make money," said one otherwise disappointed Broadway producer, and the scribes concurred, while rolling out enough quotes to fill many an ad.

Another local pan came from the Wall Street Journal's Donald Lyons, who, in a snit, sniffed that "the songs debase and vulgarize formulas" and the plot offers "an oafish Broadway homosexuality out of Charlie's Aunt by way of La Cage aux Folles, and that 'Julie Andrews never makes the show's central conceit remotely plausible"-a point made by others, though in a more accommodating

That Andrews makes it all, was echoed by USA Today's David Patrick Stearns, who gave the show three out of four stars despite his conviction that Andrews "makes everything around her seem better than it is. At times, it's a feat akin to swimming with cement shoes."



'Persuasion' is One of the Most Charming Love Stories You are Liable to Find

Glenn Bishop has secretly read all of Jane Austen's marvelous romantic novels. The secret is out!

Persuasion was her last novel, written and completed not long before she died at the age of 41. While still cast with Austen's usual collection of delightfully vain and ridiculous characters and biting social commentary, Persuasion possesses a far more poignant, bittersweet tone than other Austen classics such as Emma or Pride and Prejudice.

A novel about lost love, Persuasion features in Jane Elliot, the Austen heroine most like the author herself. Jane Elliot (Amanda Root) is at the start of the novel at the ripe old age of 27, a time signaling the onset of spinsterhood. Eight years before Jane was in love with a dashing but penniless naval officer.

She was, however, persuaded by her good friend Lady Russell that this match was beneath the daughter of a Baronet. Unmarried and an outsider even to her father and sisters, Jane remains constant, perhaps resigned, yet never betraying even a hint bitterness to her

Enter one Captain Wentworth (Ciaran Hinds), a dashing naval officer and the object of many a proposed match with most, if not all of the eligible young ladies. All except plain, sensible Jane.

It will soon become apparent and certainly come as no surprise, even to those who have not read the book, that the dashing Captain Wentworth is the same dashing naval officer that left, broken hearted, eight years before.

But times have changed. The foolish Sir Walter Elliot (Corin Redgrave) has squandered the family fortune and finds he must now let the ancestral home, ironically enough to a retired Admiral. Captain Wentworth, conversely, has become quite rich in the war.

Has Jane Elliot remained in love with the man she turned down so many years before? Despite appearances, can Captain Wentworth have really forgotten his youthful love of Jane

In filming supposed classics, from Austen and Dickens to Shakespeare, Hollywood has in the past invariably fallen victim to a severe case of reverence. The norm: big name casts, meticulously recreated settings and enough fabulous costumes to cause even the most jaded drag queen to swoon masked whatever heart and soul that had made the work a classic in the first place

MGM's 1940 blockbuster Pride and Prejudice starring Lawrence Olivier and Greer Garson is a perfect example.

In 'Zombies From Beyond,' She Comes From Outer Space to--Milwaukee

New York, NY- 'They came, they conquered, they had their hair done!"

So trumpets Zombies From the Beyond, a campy outer-space musical set in Milwaukee, in which coiffeurs are as important as the conquest of Earth. Well, almost as important.

The show, a genial spoof of those dreadful sci-fi flicks of the 1950s, sets itself an impossible task. How can you make fun of something that already is howlingly funny? What could top Zsa Zsa Gabor in Queen of Outer Space or the classic Invaders From Mars?

The musical, now on view at off-Broadway's Players Theater, is appealingly tacky. Cardboard seems to be the dominant production value in the show, which has book, music and lyrics by James Valcq.

Let's see if we can keep the plot-no pun intended-straight

Zombina, a full-figured alien with a large voice, arrives in Milwaukee from outer space in search of a few good men. She needs to propagate her race, doomed by atomic explo-

The creature, who actually looks more like Joan Blondell than Zsa Zsa Gabor, has a piercing soprano that literally drives men wild. And turns them into zombies

Will handsome hunk of masculinity, Trenton Corbett, earnest inventor, become one of her slaves? Or will sweet yet determined Mary Malone, daughter of the commanding officer at the Milwaukee Space Center, find a way to save him? Can there be any doubt?

Valcq has written an easy-listening score, circa 1955. It's innocuous pre-rock 'n' roll, more Patti Page and Perry Como than Bill

Haley and the Comets. The cast could not be more delightful or dead-on target. Particularly effective are Susan Gottschalk as the outer-space lady with the awesome set of pipes, Claire Morkin as the unnervingly competent Mary Malone and Matt McClanahan as Mary's square-jawed suitor.

Director and choreographer Pam Kriger has a tough time sustaining the silliness for a full two acts. Yet whenever things threaten to run out of steam, designer James Schuette, who did both sets and costumes, offers up blissful bits of foolishness. For example, he spins a toy space craft across the stage. Or he puts Zombina in a gaudy pink outfit that would do an extraterrestrial Barbie proud.



'The Doom Generation' is a Movie for the Stupid, Directed by the Still Immature

Glenn Bishop vividly remembers Gregg Araki's very first cinematic effort: Three Bewildered People in the Night.

Later Araki dropped the "in the night" yet this nevertheless remained an absolutely wretched affair exploring the boring lives of, you guessed it, three bewildered people.

Long tedious scenes of adolescent whining were followed by even longer scenes of adolescent whining. That one of these dreary creatures was a Gay man ensured the film's inclusion in every noted Gay film festival across the land.

And yes, most of the scenes did in fact kiss but sounding more like Roseanne on smack (See Roseanne: This is your brain on drugs! Kids: Don't try this at home!!) With the word F*** in virtually every phrase

Ms. Blue utters, she emerges as quite the endearing, enchanting soul.

Foolishly in love (how can drugged, f***ed up teenagers know anything about love Glenn cynically asks) with Amy Blue is the woefully zoned out, low-rent Keanu-wannabe Jordan White (played with delicious simplicity by James Duval).

While making out in Amy's classic auto, a wounded and bleeding Xavier Red descends upon our heroically fornicating couple. Just like the proverbial bad penny, Amy and Jordan just can't seem to lose the charismatic, violent, presumably bisexual Xavier. Jordan and Xavier share an embarrassingly intimate moment as Xavier bleeds into and then returns Jordan's shirt.

The cast is now set: Xavier Red, Jordan

White, and Amy Blue. Red, white and blue -get it!

From mini-mart to sleazy motel, our intrepid protagonists cross the panoramic American landscape binge eating junk food, smoking endless cigarettes, screwing their brains and butts off and endlessly slaughtering various members of Araki's supporting cast of assorted losers.

Despite lacking anything resembling a plot or even a direction, The Doom Generation vividly refreshes the audience with some amazingly effective, excessively graphic scenes of violence.

When they're not blowing the head off of a Asian-American mini-mart or battling an evil group of naked rampaging neoNazis, Amy finds time to feast sexually upon the boyfriend she says she loves and the hitchhiker whose tattooed dick she clearly craves. Their sex is meaningless. In truth, this whole film is meaningless.

In this so-called heterosexual film, Araki resists any and all temptations to mature as a filmmaker. While there are always some intangible elements making any of his films watchable, in The Doom Generation, Araki seems to care little for telling a story. His characters are flesh-covered cut outs that it is impossible to care about.

Araki here seeks not to enlighten, but to shock, yet The Doom Generation emerges just achingly sad.

As any veteran Gay film fest junkie will tell you, only the truly brave or the truly stupid survive until the end.

Gay Director Greg Araki Sees Life on the Dark Side, More Bleak Than Anyone Else

New York, NY-Pushing aside his shaggy black hair, Gregg Araki glances out the window of his Times Square hotel and spots a billboard with a 30-foot-high picture of talk show host Sally Jessy Raphael.

She's smiling reassuringly, but Araki asks, 'Doesn't she look like a weird, scary drag queen?''

Araki, who gained art-house fame in 1992 with the downbeat Gay road movie The Living End, sees things a little differently from anyone else.

His latest vision of life on the fringes is The Doom Generation, his first non-Gay movie. It is a raunchy, violent comedy with eight sex scenes, a severed head and cameos by Christopher Knight of The Brady Bunch and Hollywood madam Heidi Fleiss.

"It's a love story," says Araki, who has a rifle target the size of an English muffin tattooed on his right arm. "Despite its explosive surface, it's about love, purity. ... It's love in the face of chaos."

Rose McGowan and James Duval star as the teen-age Amy and her sensitive, dim-bulb boy-friend Jordan. They go on the lam with a seductive drifter named Xavier, played by Johnathan Schaech, after he kills a convenience store clerk who threatened Amy with a shot-gun for defying a No Smoking sign.

Subsisting on cigarettes and fast food, the trio crisscrosses a desert wasteland of motels and convenience stores in Amy's car, a gasguzzling shrine to American kitsch. They flee neo-Nazi thugs and wrestle with their own three-way sexual tensions.

"You've murdered two people tonight! Doesn't that faze you at all?" Amy shouts at Xavier. He sneers back, "Yeah, I'm bummed, totally."

Despite the film's nihilistic trappings, Amy and Jordan share oddly tender scenes. They're genuinely in love-even though Amy flips a coin in front of Jordan at one point to decide whether to have sex with him, or with Xavier.

Araki, whose The Living End followed two HIV-positive Gay men on a similar flight to nowhere, insists his movies aren't pessimistic or bleak.

"I think they're much more kind of pop romantic. They, in their own dark and twisted way, are very innocent and naive, because they do very much cling to this notion of finding love in this cruel and hostile world."

For a man who spends so much time exploring the surreal, Araki says he had a surprisingly typical middle-class childhood in Santa Barbara, Calif. His father worked in a plant nursery and his mother in a doctor's office.

'My theory is that people who come from a broken home are searching for some kind of security and stability, whereas in my case, when you have that secure background, you can just take the plunge and make something like The Doom Generation," Araki says.

His parents didn't understand The Living End, and Araki doesn't know what they'll make of his latest effort.

`My parents are very understanding and supportive,' he says. `My mom always says, `Why can't you make nice movies?' '

Trimark Pictures has released The Doom Generation unrated, but Araki says _ only half jokingly--that it should be PG-13, so that teen-agers won't have any trouble getting in to see themselves on screen.

'At the screenings we had so far, I've had these kids, like these 13-year-old girls, come up to me-and they're the exact people that the Bob Doles of the world are trying to protect-and they want to take their picture with me.

"They're all excited, because the movie speaks to them in a way that most other movies don't," he says.

"The Doom Generation is for those kids... They're so much smarter and so much more sophisticated and so much more able to handle stuff like that than their parents are."



Clarenbach Addresses West Hollywood Fundraiser on Gay Role in Politics

West Hollywood, CA—"The Gay and Lesbian community has to grow up."

Somebody needed to say it. David Clarenbach, the straight-talking executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, decided that it might as well be him. "This is not a time to mince words," he said, speaking to a crowd at a fundraiser in West Hollywood in October.

Clarenbach, late of Wisconsin, is the antithesis of everything stereotypically Los Angeles or political. He is straightforward and forthright with his thoughts and ideas.

"I can only compare our battery of political and financial support with that of the real enemy," he said. "The Radical Right. The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund has 4,000 members; the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) has close to 100,000 members—If you just compare that with the Christian Coalition which has 1.2 million members—It's a different place of political existence.

"They are fighting with nuclear armaments and we've got sticks and stones. We can not compete against the Radical Right unless we are much better organized, much better funded and much better focused on what we need to

do."

In his opinion, part of what we need to do is to push out of our typical comfort zones and do things we haven't done before.

We need to support openly Gay and Lesbian political candidates, not just with our words, but with our wallets.

Be Done With In-Fighting

"We do not have the luxury of in-fighting," he said. "We don't have the luxury of sitting around in our nice comfortable safe enclaves, going up to Fire Island for the Summer, or sitting around in our self-contained ghettos known as Gay bars.

"There is nothing wrong with any of that stuff as a release or as a place to refuel one's batteries. But if you went into the average Gay bar in any community in this country and took an honest poll of the number of people in that establishment who have ever written a \$5 check to a Gay political organization, you would find a disturbing minority," he said.

How do you convince someone to contribute money to someone's campaign simply because they are Gay or Lesbian?

According to Clarenbach, you don't. "That ought not to be the standard by which we judge candidates that we support," he said. "It is not enough to be Gay or Lesbian and run for office. That does not warrant the support of the Gay and Lesbian community in and of itself."

That's why the Victory Fund has a strict list of criteria by which they judge candidates before endorsing them, he said.

Victory Fund Criteria

"They must be qualified; they must be capable of putting together a political organization that can win; they must be viable; they have to have demonstrated a base of support beyond the Gay and Lesbian community and once they are elected, they need to be prepared to serve."

Viable doesn't mean cautious though. "In my opinion," he said, "the worst mistake anyone can make in politics is to compromise with yourself. I know full well that compromise is a central part of the political process. Nine times out of ten, you will have to make some sort of compromise in order to make any progress. But the last thing we can afford to do is to compromise with ourselves."

Why is it, however, that someone in California, for example, should give money to support a candidate in Des Moines?
"What is in it for you to get a member of

the Arizona state legislature elected? What's in it for you, someone who lives in San Diego? Why do you give a shit?

"Well, I'll tell you. Laws are not ends unto themselves, they are means toward an end. No one presumes that because Wisconsin has a Gay rights law that that ends homophobia within the boundaries of the state of Wisconsin anymore than laws ended racism or sexism.

"But it is a necessary prerequisite. It is in your direct self-interest, it is an investment in your future to see to it that we elect a member of the Dallas city council," not only because of what he or she will do for the city of Dallas, but because of a much more important reason.

"In the bigger picture," he said, "it has been demonstrated that people are 80% less likely to condone discrimination against Gays if they know someone personally who is Gay or Lesbian.

"That is why the elected officials are such important role models." Not just because of what they do in office, he concluded, but because they make being Gay or Lesbian in mainstream society a commonplace occurrence.

have access to extensive support services through SEWAP. Those services include case management, legal assistance, housing and food assistance, among other things.

In addition to curbing or eliminating the spread of HIV, a goal of Lifepoint Racine is to get injection drug users off drugs and into culturally appropriate drug treatment.

In Milwaukee, 78 people were referred to inpatient drug treatment programs and at least 100 more accessed drug counseling services in Lifepoint's first year of operation.

In order to determine the potential effectiveness of a needle exchange program in Racine, ARCW has researched the impact and success of needle exchange programs in at least 46 cities nationwide

This evaluation revealed that such programs: Reduce HIV transmission by as much

- Do not encourage drug use by youth or by people who previously were not us-
- Do not lead to increased drug usage or more frequent injection by users;
- Are successful in getting more users into treatment;
- And, are successful in reducing the number of contaminated, potentially hazardous needles discarded in neighborhoods.

Lifepoint Racine is funded entirely by private donations.

The Far Right had an observer at each polling place and would challenge voters on the spot as to whether they were registered or not. This took time and the lines were long.

The reason for these tactics was that polls





taken just before the election were showing the pro-Gay and Progressive forces to be in the

On election day itself, a spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign's (HRC) David Smith, reported that exit polls were showing that pro-Gay forces were in the lead by a 41%-

Exit polls do not always really indicate how a vote will go. Progressive forces in Maine were crossing their fingers.

On election night, some 1,200 Lesbians, Gay men and their allies gathered in the Holiday Inn ballroom to await the results.

Several times during the evening, Weir said, the anti-Gay vote pulled ahead. "There was dead silence," he said.

But then, the tide turned and local TV stations began calling the vote as a victory for Gay forces. In the ball room, Weir said, people cried and people cheered all at the same

And, at the same time, the DJ put on the "Hallelujah Chorus" to thunder its majestic tones of triumph across the room.

Weir, obvious exhausted, said that as the election neared, "over 1,000 Gay and Lesbian volunteer fanned throughout the state. There were chapters supporting us and working in every county, he said.

To add their considerable weight to the fight for justice, HRC sent eight staff members to Maine and provided major technical and finan-cial assistance to Maine Won't Discriminate, the broad-based local coalition of religious, business and community organizations that working to defeat the anti-Gay measure.

Asked why he thought the Far Right lost, Weir said he thought that voters saw through Right Wing rhetoric about "special rights.

They saw it wasn't special rights, but clearly about discrimination," he said

NGLTF observers in the state added their belief that in this fiercely independent state, outside support of Measure 1 by extremist groups nationwide was resented.

In particular, NGLTF said, Bruce Fein, a Right Wing lawyer in Virginia who wrote Measure 1 and has worked closely with Radical Right groups in other states.

One of the things that surprised Wier was that many of the small, normally conservative towns throughout the state had voted against Measure 1. Asked why he thought that was, he chuckled and said he didn't know.

"That's what I'll be having my reporters look into in the next few days," he said.

Susan Hibbard, NGLTF's campaign consultant noted that the small town support had "changed the fear of being Gay or Lesbian" in

rural areas. She added that the issue "may have backfired" on the Radical Right.

"Intended to push Gays and Lesbians back into the closet," she said, "it instead galvanized us and our supporters."

Weir said that a victory rally is to be held in Maine's capitol, Augusta, on November 8t

Weir said the next step is to work for the passage of a law "like Wisconsin's," a law that protects Gay people from discrimination.

In a statement issued election night, Elizabeth Birch, HRC's executive director said, "Common sense and decency triumphed over extremism. Today's vote here in Maine is in keeping with the national trend. Americans are rejecting extremism."

However, Birch warned that "We must put this campaign in perspective. While this is a wonderful victory, Gay and Lesbian citizens of Maine have not moved one step closer to having basic equal rights.'

Weir and his jubilant Maine co-workers in the field realize this, but for tonight, they savor their victory and are glad.

"Maine is safe to come to," he said. "Maine is the way life should be.'





Most ex-Gay ministries appear far more tempered and compassionate in their practices than the fiery hatred spewed forth by public figures such as Lou Sheldon, Dornan, Jesse Helms, and Fred Phelps, but that veneer only hides a basic belief in complete harmony with the most violent Gay-basher.

Many progressive, but ultimately proheterosexual theologians, for example, make it a point to draw the biblical distinction between "invert" (homosexual by nature) and the

The largest ex-Gay ministries, Exodus, held its North American Conference, "The Journey Out," this Summer in San Diego, celebrating its 20 years of "success." For upwards of \$860, attendees could partake in classes, seminars and workshops whose titles only illustrate the relative ineffectiveness, insurmountable realities and failures of the ex-Gay ministeries:

"My Husband Is No Longer Homosexual, So Why Am I so Miserable,?" "Relapse Pre-"The Essence of Change: Obedi-Marriage and the Homosexual Strug-Ministering to Sexually Adicted and "Greater Love: A Wife's Response to Unfaithfulness.'

Led by those who claim to be cured, the Conference featured one workshop leader, Dennis Jernigan, who was, according to the Conference literature, "caught up in the sin of homosexuality until God broke Dennis' heart to the reality of His love . . . Dennis and his wife Melinda live in Oklahoma with their nine children.

Nine!? Even Douglas Houck of Seattle's Metanoia Ministry, an ex-Gay program under Exodus' umbrella, concedes that "dating, marriage, and child-bearing are not proof of transformation, nor are they the cure for homosexuality . . . Failure, slipping back into overt homosexual behavior or even a relationship,

November 9, 1995-November 22, 1995-WISCONSIN LIGHT-15 may occur. This too is part of the ex-Gay re-

Unfortunately, what Houck and his compatriots fail to see is that failure and facade are also part of the ex-Gay ministry, because sexual orientation-as race, gender, and lefthandedness-can not be changed.

Karen Gotzler Announces Her Candidacy for Alderwoman in Milwaukee's 3rd District

Milwaukee—Karen Gotzler has announced that she is running for City of Milwaukee 3rd District Alderwoman with elections to be held in February 6th for the primary and March 19th for the general election. The seat currently is held by Larraine McNamara-McGraw who announced that she will not be running again for that position.

If Gotzler is elected, she will be the first openly Gay or Lesbian elected official in the Milwaukee area. While this is a non-partisan election, Gotzler has received significant support for her race from both Democrats and Republicans. Her experience and leadership on city issues and the campaign's organizing ability add to the credibility of the race and the likelihood of her election.

Gotzler is well-known in the Milwaukee Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual community as a leader and organizer.

She came out at age 23 and has been active with Gay groups ever since. In 1979, she and her partner at that time, established Midwest Women's Music Distributors, Inc., a wholesaler of music by and about women, most of it Lesbian-identified. Midwest Music, as the company was later known, sold records, tapes and compact discs in a 13 state area and was part of the Women's Independent Label Distributors (WILD) network. In its biggest year, Meridian employed eight full-time staff.

In 1983, Icebergg Records was formed as a means of recording and getting music out, especially by Lesbians of color and other artists who didn't fit the traditional women's music mold. Gotzler and her partners recorded Casselberry-DuPress, Jasmine, The Washington Sisters, and Judy Gorman-Jacobs among others.

Icebergg also distributed recordings for several Gay men, including Charlie Murphy and Elliot Pilshaw. Icebergg won several national awards for production. During this time, Gotzler was a founding member of the Association of Women's Music and Culture (AWMAC).

Gotzler was involved for several years with the Cream City Business Association, a Gay and Gay-friendly business owners and professionals group in Milwaukee. She served on the Board of Directors and was its President in 1987, its highest membership year.

After 12 years in business, Gotzler took a position with the Wisconsin Department of Development as an economic development consultant. Initially, she handles minority

business certifications, including legal and financial document reviews and on-site visits.

In 1991, she became the financial consultant, assisting existing and start-up companies in obtaining bank loans, public financing and other funding.

Gotzler currently administers the Early Planning Grant program as well as providing technical assistance for Department of Development financing programs.

She serves on the loan committees of the Women's Business Initiative and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Economic Development Corporation.

Gotzler is a founding member of the Urban Economic Development Association and currently serves on the steering committee. For the last three years, she has been appointed by the Mayor's office to serve on the Milwaukee Overall Economic Development Program Committee.

In 1989, Gotzler recruited her partner, Kitty Barber, and several friends to create a network for Lesbians in Milwaukee. Those organizing efforts resulted in the birth of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee (LAMM). With Gotzler's leadership, LAMM grew to be the largest Gay and/or Lesbian membership organization in Wisconsin.

During her presidency, she also co-chaired the Lavender Network, a coalition of 27 diverse community groups to plan and coordinate responses and actions following the Dahmer murders.

Gotzler chaired the Police Proposal Task Group which submitted a 600 page proposal to Mayor John Norquist's Commission on Police-Community Relations, addressing policing issues and the Gay community.

In 1992, Gotzler led the effort to create the LAMM Education Fund to support community education efforts.

Also, with several key Gay men and Lesbians, Gotzler created the Human Rights League for Lesbians and Gays. She is currently its cochair.

Gotzler has been active with a variety of other community groups, including the Milwaukee AIDS Project, No Retreat on Civil Rights Network, American Civil Liberties Union and the Milwaukee Clinic Defense Coalition.

Gotzler's campaign will focus on 3rd District and city-wide issues. For example, her work as a trainer at the Milwaukee Police Academy has helped her develop a deep commitment to community-oriented policing as a total philosophy and not just a project in a specific neighborhood.

With her economic development background, Gotzler is uniquely positioned to emphasize job retention and creation as a means to a healthy local economy and a pro-active way of reducing crime and deteriorating housing.

Gotzler's work through professional and community circles with elected city officials and various city departments has given her the contacts to "hit the ground running" as an alderwoman. Gotzler will take her coalition-building and leadership skills to the Common Council.

Gotzler's campaign slogan, OUT FRONT is an apt description of Gotzler herself. She is "out." She is "out front" on experience by comparison to the other candidates in the 3rd District race and she has always been "out front" and willing to confront tough issues.

Gotzler's campaign manager is Chris Korsmo, a long-time pro-Choice advocate and political activist. Bill Dempsey, a long-time activist on union and labor issues and guitarist with MOOK, is serving on the campaign committee as key strategist and organizer. Attorney Steve Brondino is chairing the finance committee for the campaign.

The campaign has recruited over 100 volunteers to date, but more are needed.
